The leaks in the roof are also pouring onto equipment including a \$80,000 pipe cutter.

CAPITAL BUDGET SB-160**

This testimony is with regard to the Jesse Lee Home Building Restoration Project and the “Balto School Educational Development Plan. The total budget estimate for the project is \$16,900,000. Already \$3,000,000. has been secured through the State and if the buildings are fully restored there is supposed to be a Federal Historic Tax Credit available of \$3,400,000. There is an estimated budget gap of \$11,000,000.

I am opposed to the restoration plan as well as the “Balto” School Educational Plan. First, engineering reports indicate the presence of hazardous materials and deteriorating conditions on this 90 year old structure. We do not know what the reconstruction costs are really going to be. The 2 million dollars the Friends of the Jesse Lee Home are now in the process of spending has not brought us any closer to the **ACTUAL COSTS OF THE RESTORATION OR HOW THE SCHOOL IS TO BE FUNDED.**

This project is **NOT ABOUT HELPING KIDS!!** Think of the benefits this 17 Million Dollars would have in really helping and supporting kids. Just in this session of the legislature, proposals have been brought forward to broaden the **SCHOOL MEAL PROGRAMS; EXTRA FUNDING FOR SCHOOLS THROUGH OUT THE STATE; EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT (PRE-KINDERGARTEN);** and other real enhancements to our education system.

The Methodist Mission helped and supported kids in Seward for 40 years. Their organization moved to Anchorage following the 1964 earthquake and a parent organization is still providing social services to kids with no parental support. It was not the building but the people providing the care and the life long cherished friendships that was the life blood of the home and that lives on today. Not a broken building that has not been occupied for 48 years. For many children, the Jesse Lee Home was not a happy place.

Regarding the education model for another type of Boarding High School, it appears the FJLH are “re-inventing the wheel”. Here in Seward, we have the Kenai Peninsula School District providing K through 12 education; We have the Alaska Vocational Technical School; The Sealife Center; My question: HOW AND WHO IS GOING TO FUND THIS SCHOOL???
Now is the time to determine the direction and the financial viability of this whole project.

I have lived in Seward all my life and attended High School with kids from the Jesse Lee Home back in the 40's. I graduated from Seward High School in 1951. I have close friends who spent their childhood at the home, many of whom have passed on. These buildings have been condemned, vandalized, and vacant for 48 years. They are a BLIGHT to the community of Seward and should be razed.

Dear Representative Stoltze and Corresponding Committee Members,

I am writing out of concern for a portion of the Governor’s Budget earmarked for rehabilitating the Jesse Lee Home in Seward into the “Balto” Leadership School. My concerns aim towards the aggressive funding request on such a large project where building rehabilitation costs and school operations are yet to be accurately defined. Without the plans being thoroughly reviewed and fleshed out, this legislature could easily be allowing money to go down a black hole leaving Seward and the State with a black eye of wasteful spending and poor over-sight.

The current \$5M appropriation with a potential additional request of \$6M is pre-mature to answers that the public should have before a project of this magnitude is launched. Currently \$16.9M is estimated for the building project, however there is nothing validating or substantiating this figure, as it is likely estimated too low given the physical status of the building.

The Jesse Lee Home has been sitting vacant for nearly 50 years. Consequently, but as expected, the structural assessment report produced by Schneider & Associates identified initial structural shoring and bracing as serious and / or critical. Such repairs are needed at minimum to make the building safe to work in, while structural calculations to determine the building’s structural integrity and load-carrying capacities are still pending.

\$3M of State funds have already been allocated towards the Jesse Lee Home project. Currently an RFP is out to provide a conceptual architectural plan, and provide a detailed cost estimate of re-habilitating the aged structure. From this effort more expertise will be brought in to assess, confirm and adjust the original \$16.9 cost estimate for rehabilitating the building.

As a lifelong resident of Seward, and one who believes in balancing fiscal responsibility with reasonable projects, I strongly urge you to allow FJLH more time to define feasibility costs of building rehabilitation, and its operational plans for the leadership school. In order to make good fiscal decisions with our tax dollars, it should be incumbent on lawmakers and the Governor’s office to request the best available information on the Jesse Lee Home developments before approving more funds towards this endeavor. Unfortunately that information is not yet available to justify the requested appropriation before you. So please be wise and allow more time and less money for the necessary information to be produced and more accurate fiscal decisions to be made.
