FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

BILL NO. HB 180

Analysis

HB180, the Alaska Money Services Act, modernizes the Alaska Uniform Money Services Act by including virtual currency business activity and other alternative payment systems under the definition of money transmission and adding the use of the Nationwide Multistate Licensing System and registry (NMLS) for licensing and renewal of money services businesses.

Registration through the NMLS is not anticipated to materially impact the revenues collected by the division. There are 91 money services businesses currently licensed in the State of Alaska and five incomplete applications in process.

Regulations will be amended to recognize the requirement that businesses use the NMLS registry, include an annual assessment based on volume, and impose fees for late filed reports. These regulations changes will be included in planned regulations packages.

The Division of Banking and Securities does not anticipate fiscal impact from this legislation.
