FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2016 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**Analysis**

This proposed legislation amends the requirements for reporting workplace accidents to include an amputation or loss of an eye to ensure compliance with AS 18.60.030(6), which requires Alaska's standards to be at least as effective as federal standards. Changes to federal workplace accident reporting standards became effective January 1, 2015. The reporting requirements are designed to help ensure the division receives prompt notice of workplace accidents to allow for investigation and analysis to help prevent similar accidents.

There is no fiscal impact to the department anticipated as a result of this legislation, as many of the most severe accidents are currently covered by Alaska's existing reporting requirements.
