Dear Senator:

As a member of the Alaska Workforce Investment Board (AWIB) as well as a concerned Alaskan, I am seeking your support of SB 84 as it designed to:

- Increase the base student allocation (BSA) for the next school year
- Specify the BSA increases for the next three years
- Add additional funds for Career and Technical Education

Last year the AWIB passed a resolution in support of the Alaska Career and Technical Education (CTE) Plan (Resolution #10-03). SB 84 has the intent of providing funding for CTE as well as allowing school districts to better manage the planning process by providing specificity about the next three years BSA.

Although the proposed substitute SB 97 would most likely increase education funding in the short term; as a community revenue sharing allocation tied to oil price (revenues), there is no predictability for the future. It also does not directly support CTE as there are no directions for spending the funds.

To sum up, the predictability and direction for the funding in SB84 makes more sense than a one time or short term influx of money with no guidelines for spending attached.

My name is Jackie Smith. I live in Rural Alaska. I have a child who is in Jr High. I am a concerned parent.

I am asking you to please pass SB84.

Alaska is receiving a strong financial return from high oil prices and it is appropriate to invest more in Alaska's future through K-12 education.

The tremendous benefits that districts, teachers, support staff, families and students enjoyed with our recent three-year forward funding package that allowed for more precise budget planning and eliminated much of the upheaval that occurs with staff layoffs and program reductions.

SB 84 provides additional funding over 3-years that will assist all districts in addressing ever increasing inflationary costs and help invigorate vocational/career tech.

SB97 is a good solution for high energy costs and when available in FY13 would be a welcome tool to assist school districts and communities with high energy costs.

The cost of living in Rural Alaska is outrageous. We are paying \$8.99 for gas & heating fuel in Noatak. When we get our next load of fuel our cost is going up. We will be paying over \$10 a gallon for gas & heating fuel. They are going to cut 2 teacher positions in our school next year. They are both Jr High teachers. Like I said I have a child who is in 7th grade. Next year they are going to be 36 students in Jr. High and one teacher. I don't see how my Son will get the adequate education he needs to enter high school.

Senate President Stevens and Finance Committee Members:

As the principal of Service High School in Anchorage, and I write to encourage the passage of essential K-12 education bills, SB 84 and SB 97. Both pieces of legislation, in their original forms, will help offset inflation and enable school districts across the Alaska to continue at least three key practices that serve Alaska's children well:

1. Early hiring of teachers. The Anchorage School District hires approximately 70 percent of its teachers from Outside. With forward funding, and the ability to offer competitive but reasonable compensation packages, we have been able to successfully compete for the best teachers in our nation. Alaska, just as it does for the oil industry, needs to be an attractive option for professional educators in which to invest.
2. Re-emphasis on Career, Technical, and Vocational Education. Designated funding for C&TE, rather than block grant funding that needs to be spread thinly, will allow us to capture more students whose acumen and interest lies in the vocational fields. Concentration on college readiness will continue, but through the vocational programs both current and in development, we will be able to accelerate more students' readiness to learn by offering them increased relevant curricula. The result will be a more prepared workforce.
3. Extended school day and school year. With the sharp increase in public education students coming from economically disadvantaged families (see ASD Profile of Performance, p.9: http://www.asdk12.org/depts/assess_eval/POP/0910/POP_0910_District.pdf) the need is greater than ever to extend the school day and year. Non-traditional, C&TE (again), and remedial programs are essential to meet the needs of this often underprepared population. The modest increase in the BSA in SB 84 will help provide resources to continue our programs that extend beyond the regular school day.

After regular school hours, Service High School currently offers carpentry, Certified Nursing Assistant, Personal Care Assistant, physical education, and credit recovery classes. We scramble for dollars to fund teachers, materials, and transportation – all necessary to sustain the programs. Keeping students here at school after hours engaged in learning has been a huge benefit. Finding resources to sustain these programs has been a challenge.

Passage of SB 84 and SB 97 will help offset inflation and allow districts in Alaska to continue to meet the needs of our changing public school population. I urge you to act in support of both bills.

I am writing to urge you to support HB 84. It does three very important things:

- 1) Increases the base student allocation (BSA) by \$110 for the next school year
- 2) Specifies the BSA increases for the next three years (very helpful for planning purposes)
- 3) Adds additional funds for Career Tech and Vocational education (1% of the BSA each year)

Our schools already face cuts due to the loss of stimulus funds. The SBA increases covers the cost of inflation in wages and materials. Textbooks cost at least \$100 each and schools must supply them. Students must have heat and electricity, which are both expensive in this state and with the current state of affairs those costs will outstrip inflation. Without the increase this year, pupil to teacher ratios will need to be increased. Our schools also need dedicated career and vocational funds to create sustainable programs to meet the diverse needs of Alaska.







I am concerned that if the Senate does not fund the **ALASKA PERFORMANCE SCHOLARSHIPS** that a lot of our most talented Seniors will leave the state to go to school outside and not return.

The Alaska Scholars Scholarship for the top 10% is awarded and not used by most of those that receive them because they are heavily recruited by schools outside. Those that are only a few grade points below the top 10%, even those with 4.00GPA, are left without the same options to go to school in state, funded by the state.

What we are effectively doing is exporting our future.

I also would like to say I do Support SB84.

The increase in the base student allocation in the last few years has helped our school district fund programs that are making huge differences in our children's lives. Math is the best example I can give. In my school there are a number of students who fail to learn when class sizes are too large. Every day I see 5-6 different at-risk students going to math tutoring class at 8:30 a.m.--their own time! They WOULD NOT be passing a math class without this one-on-one instruction.

. We will go backwards if this allocation does not keep up with inflation. Understand that every child is unique, they do not learn new concepts in a one mold-fits-all concept.

. Kids are Alaska's future. We should fund programs that

are making all the difference in our children's lives now, and in the future. . Vocational and technical training are critical to Alaska's future. These programs not only keep kids in school, they also provide a trained workforce for our economy and support business. If vocational and technical training is not funded, individuals will suffer, and Alaska's economy will suffer. Every year I am asked to write a letter of recommendation for a student who wants to be admitted to a school to learn auto mechanics, or nursing. Not every student wishes to pursue college, we need to keep the appropriate curriculum open for them to succeed.
