Building a Culture of Education In Alaska



Problem: *Educational attainment*

- Alaska lags the nation in educational attainment
- Educational attainment is strongly correlated with
 - income
 - health status
 - community engagement, and
 - economic development



Plan: *Increase educational attainment*

- Partner with employers
- Partner with K-12
- Improve internal processes



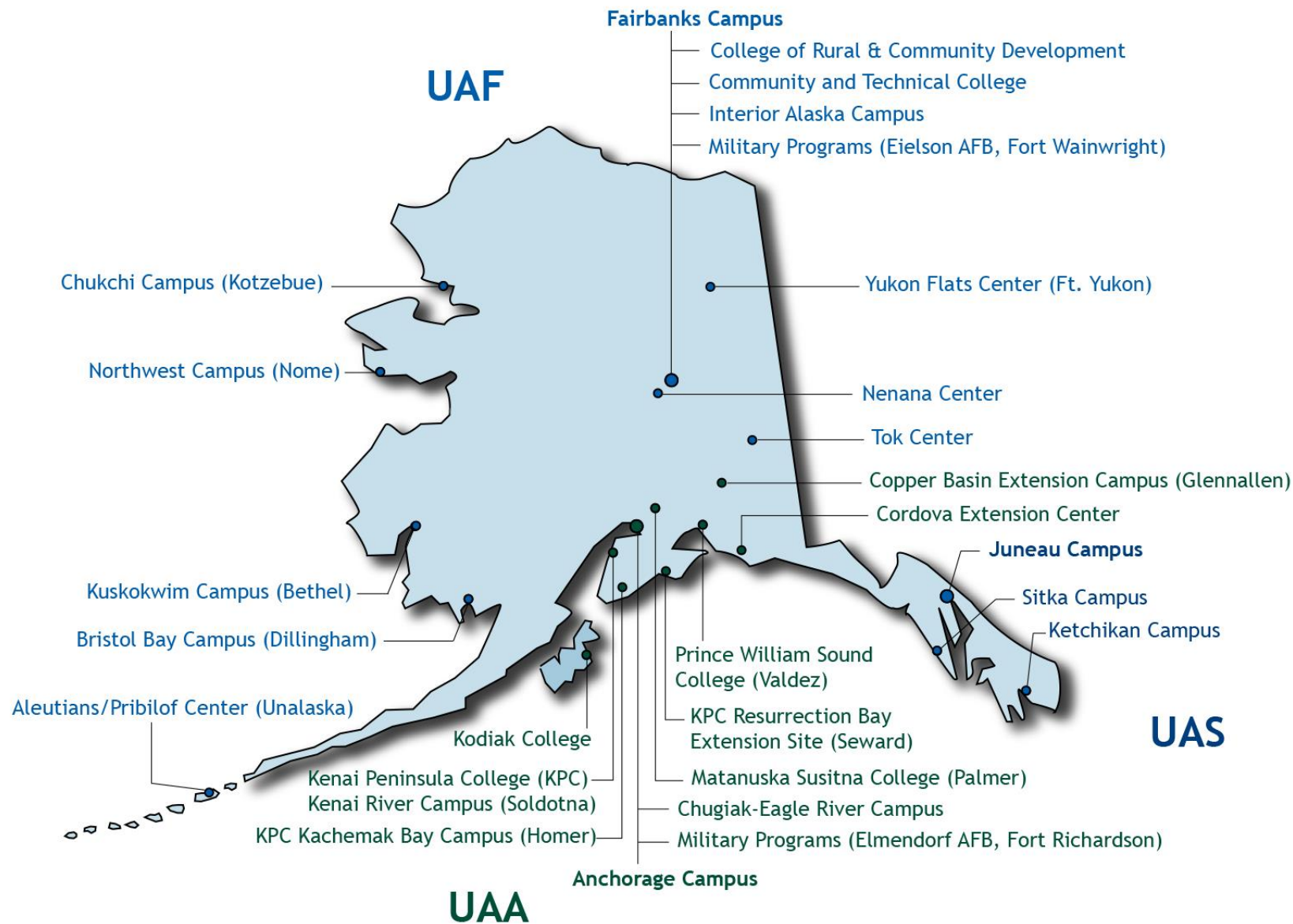
Effective Solution: *Bridging programs*

- Improves college access
- Provides equity across socioeconomic lines
- Encourages college readiness
- Increases likelihood of postsecondary enrollment and completion
- Increases cost effectiveness of public investment in education
- Strengthens “agency” among students

BOR Dual Enrollment Policy

Policy (P10.05.0125.) – adopted September 2015

Dual enrollment refers to enrollment at the university by a student who is simultaneously enrolled in a K-12 (or homeschool) for which the student may receive credit at both the K-12 and postsecondary levels. The university encourages dual enrollment.

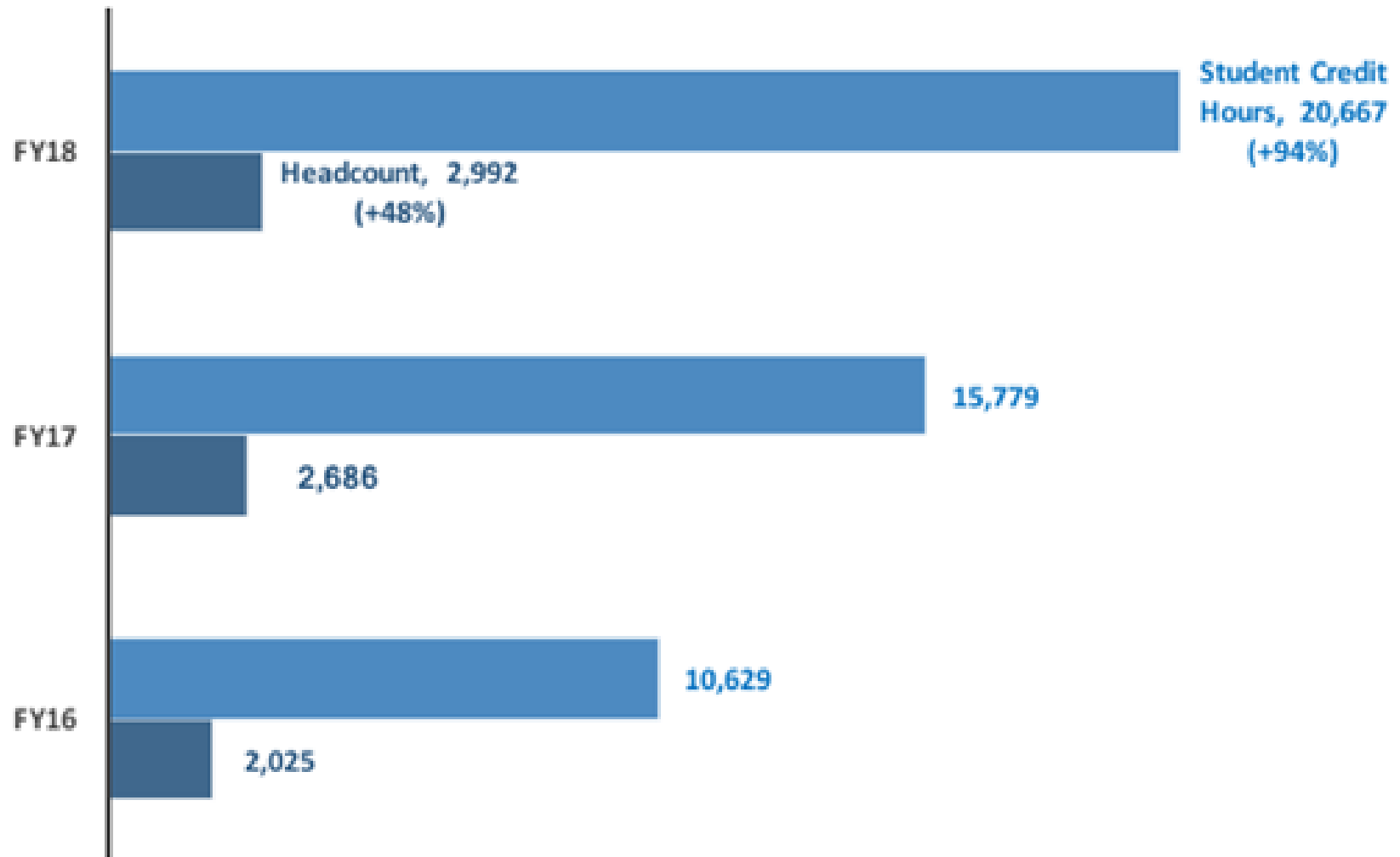
University Dual Enrollment Regulations

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Middle College Programs

Purpose

To reduce barriers of higher education attainment by providing **college access** to traditionally **underserved populations**.

University and School District Partnership

- Partnering school district covers tuition and fees
- Dedicated high school counselor and college academic advisor

Program Model

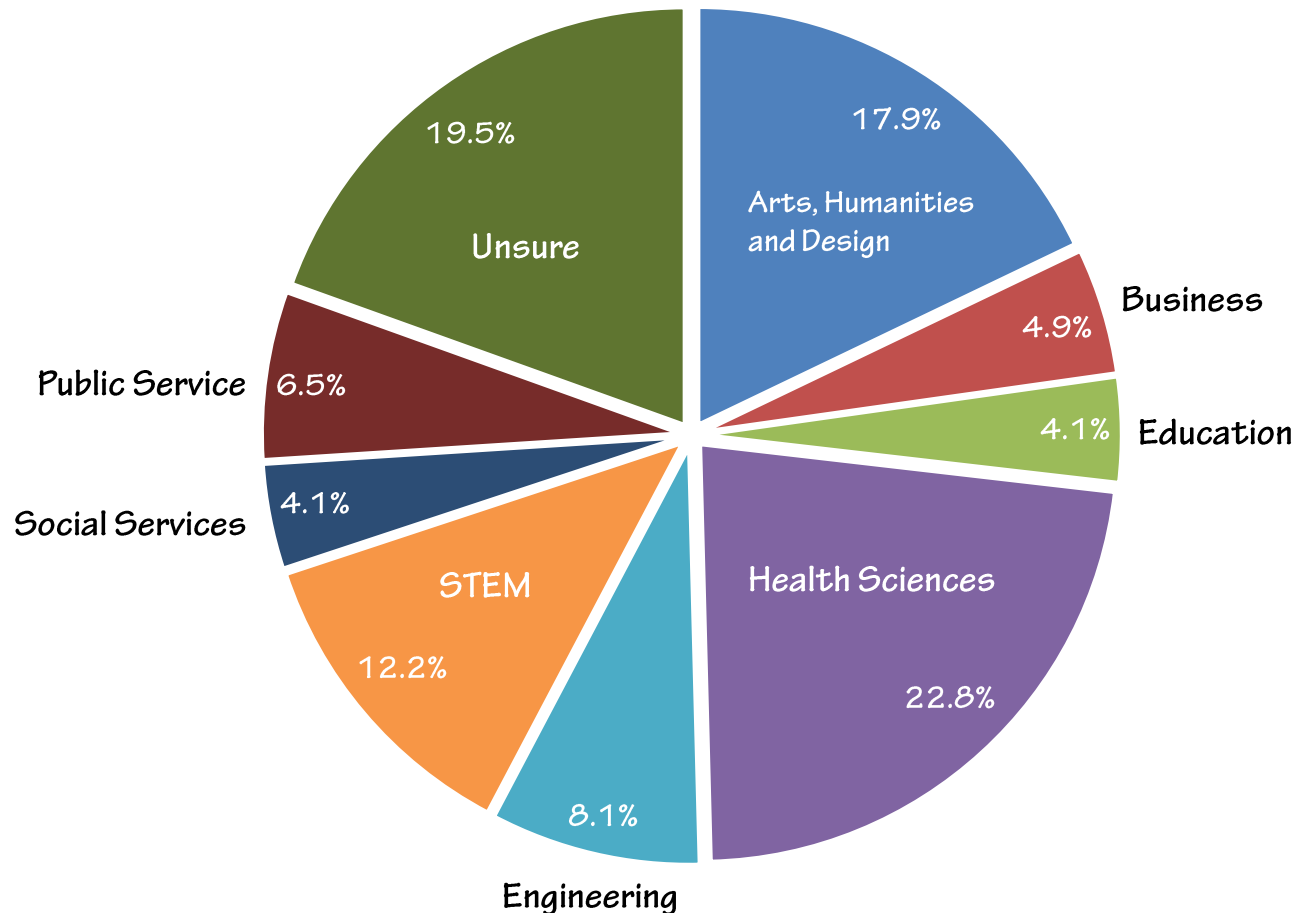
- Satisfy high school graduation requirements while earning college credits toward a degree
- Full college classroom integration

Middle College Programs by the Numbers

Eligibility

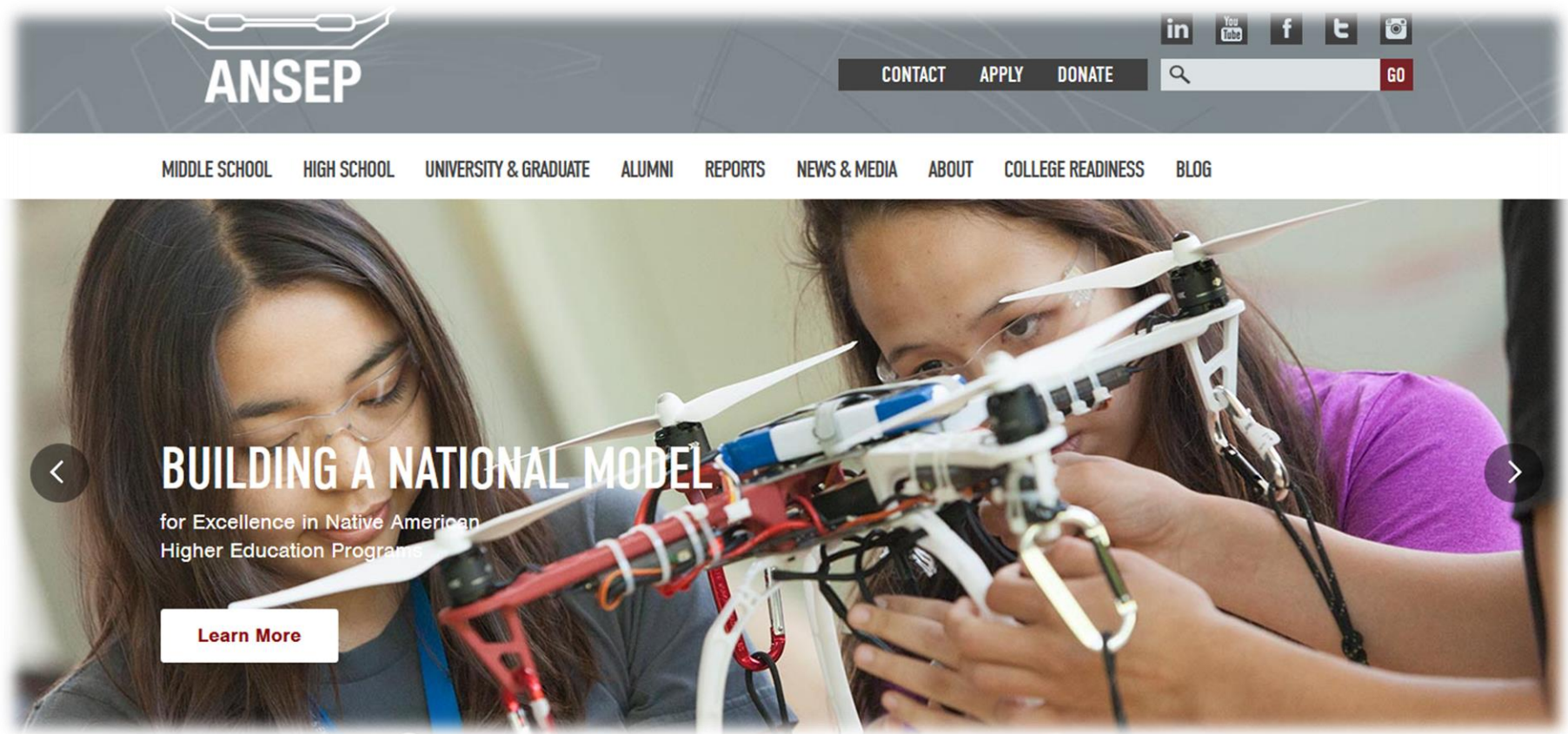
- Place into college-level Writing and/or Math
- Grade Point Average (GPA) 2.5 or above

Student Success Outcomes

- Middle College students average GPA is a 3.0 in comparison to their first year college counterparts 2.6
- 53% of newly admitted students identify with one or more ethnic minority group
- 30% of newly admitted students identify as being the first in their family to go to college
- Nearly 60% of graduates attend UA

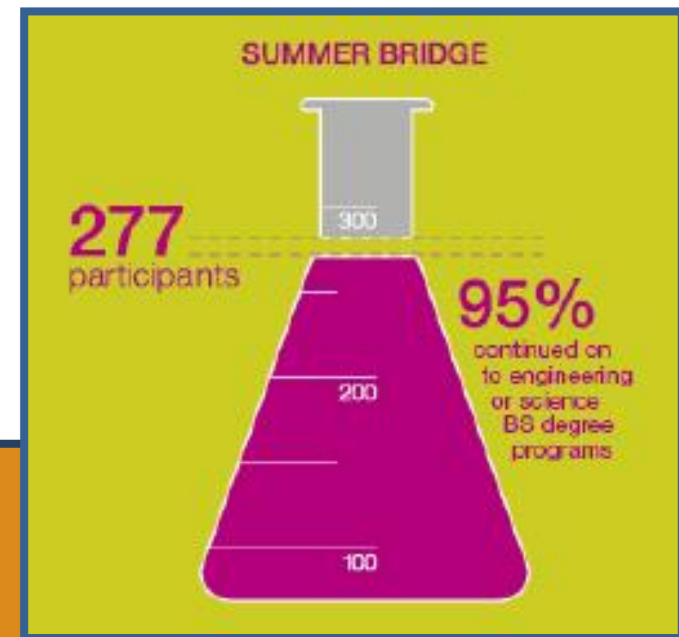
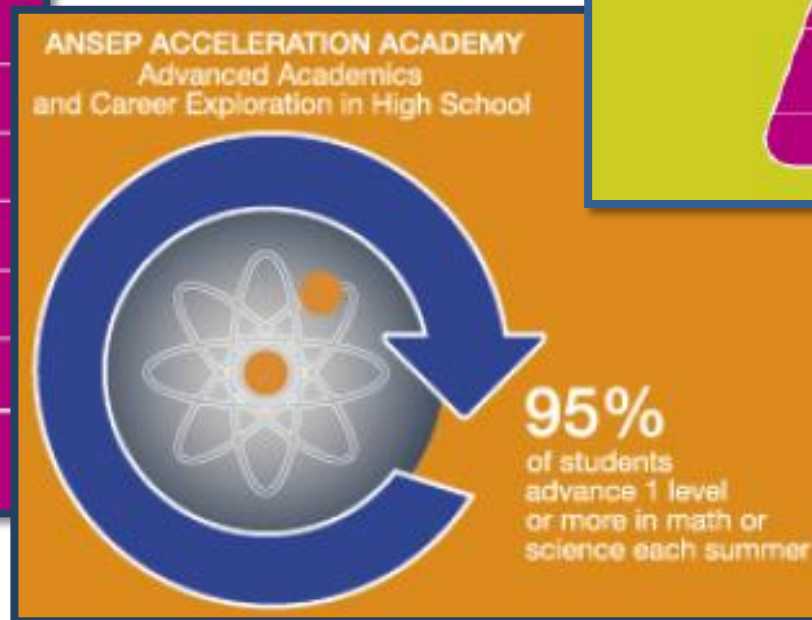
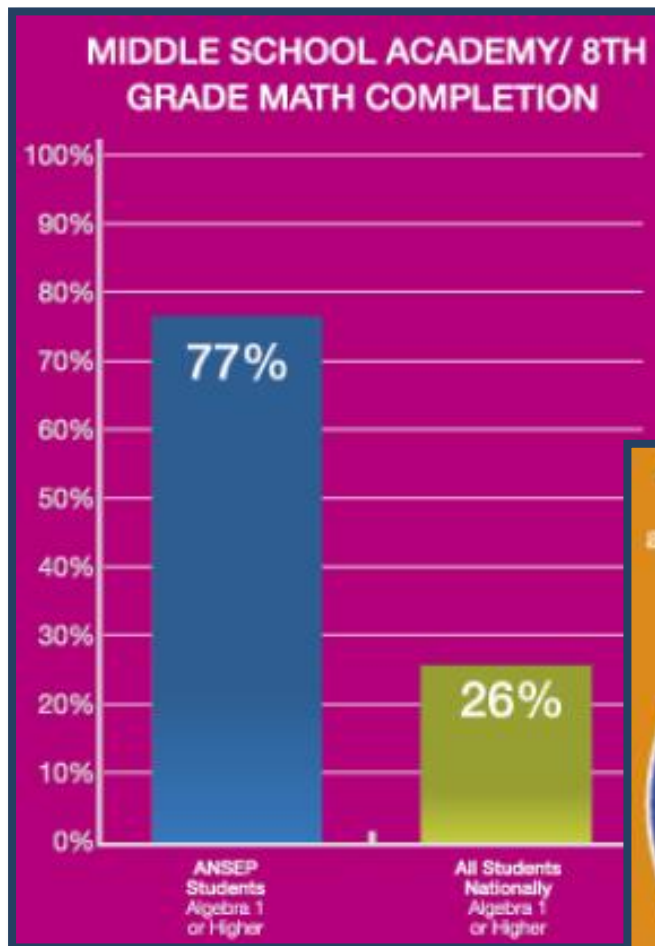

Alaska Native Science & Engineering Program



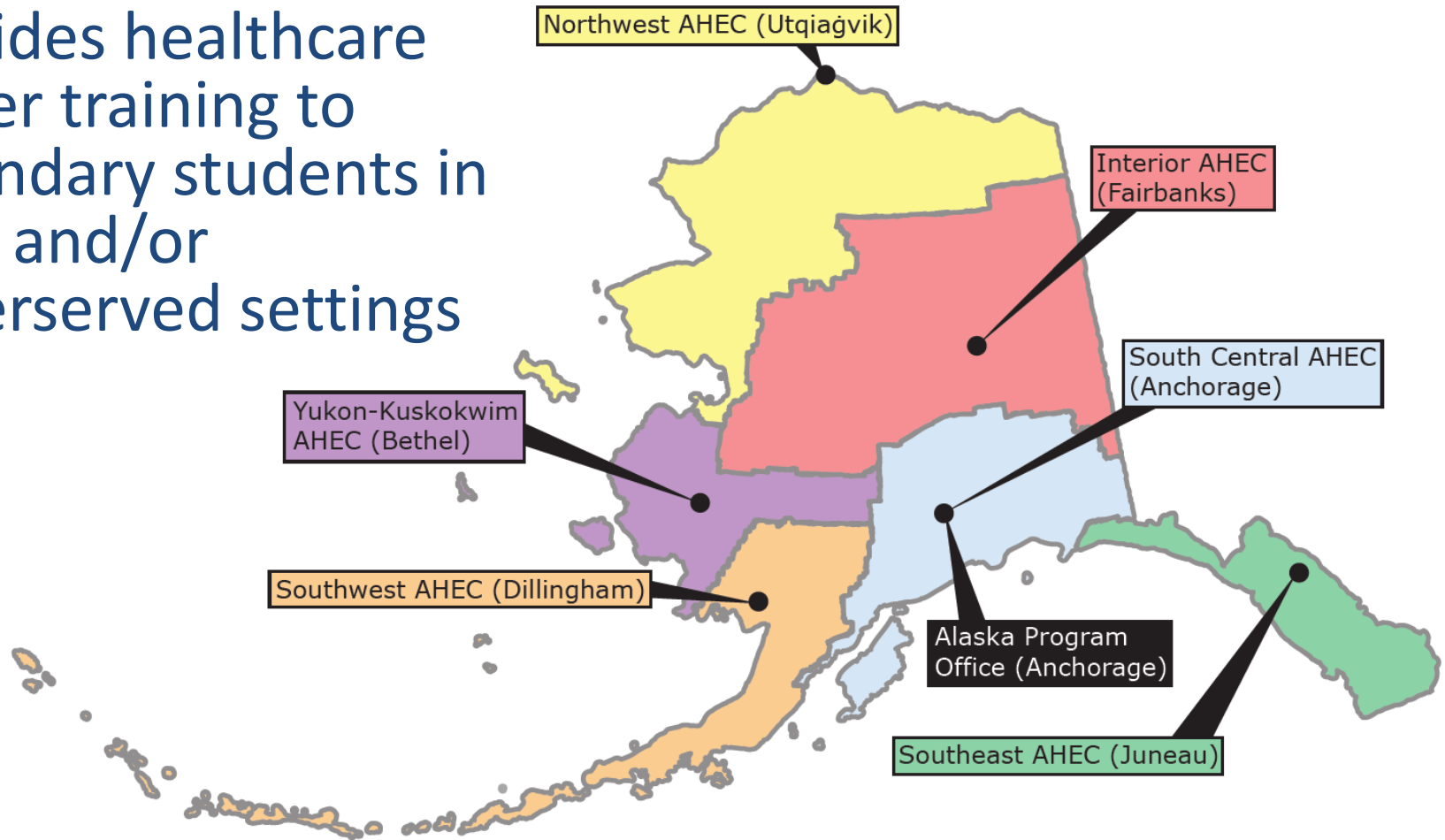
ANSEP places Alaska Native students on a leadership career path to science and engineering occupations.

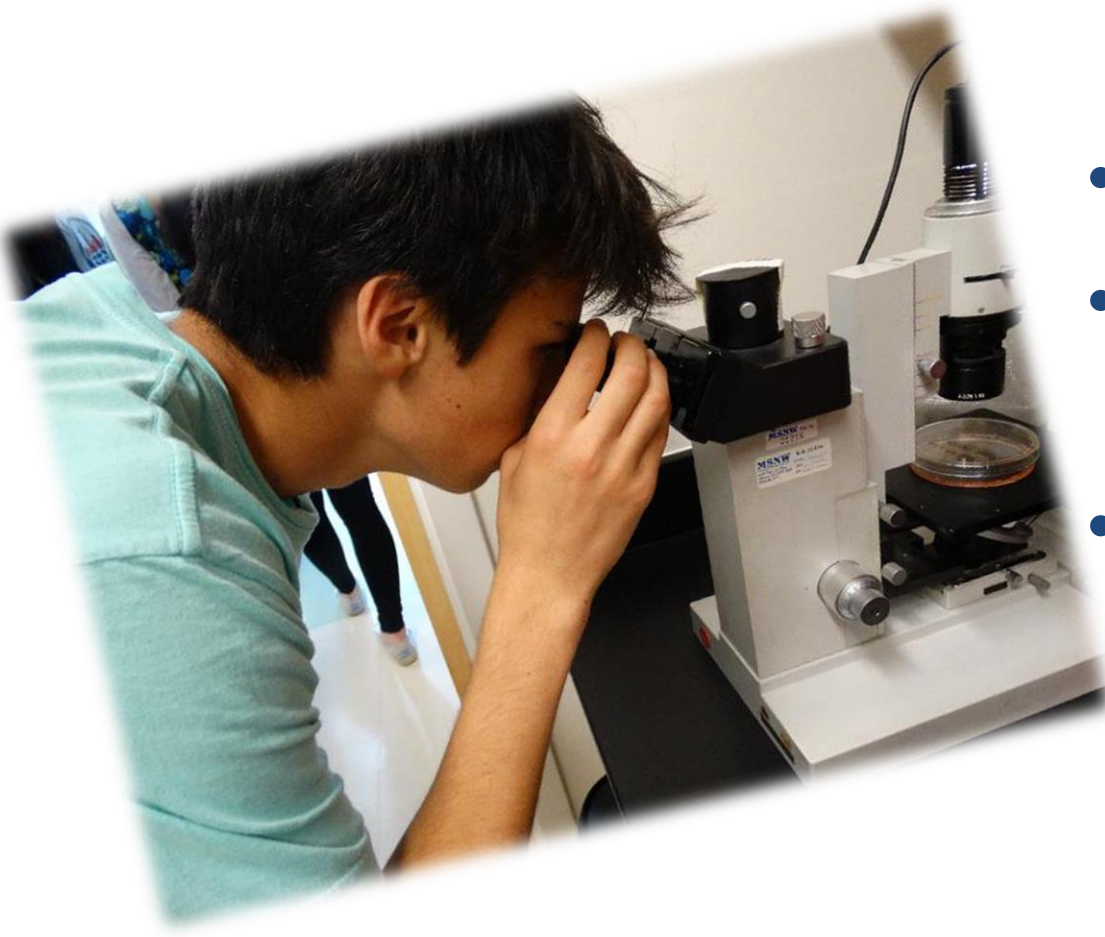

- 794 students
- 167 students earned 469 college credits
- 560 certificates earned

Educators Rising Alaska by the Numbers

- Became a national state affiliate in April 2017
- First year participation (AY18)
 - 164 students
 - 28 school districts
 - 65 schools



Kenai Peninsula College
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JumpStart Program

KPC offers high school juniors and seniors the chance to take college credits for only \$71 per credit.

Students can take up to six credits per semester, completing up to 30 credits or an associate's degree while still in high school.



JumpStart by the Numbers

- Total number of students served in AY18 = 346
- Total number of credits for AY18 = 1,450
- Kenai Peninsula Borough School District covers ~\$200K in tuition annually



Rural Alaska Honors Institute (RAHI)



Founded at the request of the Alaska Federation of Natives in 1983 to prepare rural and Alaska Native high school students for academic excellence and college success.

High school students attend a 6-week summer session on campus and earn up to 11 college credits.



RAHI by the Numbers

(1983 - Present)

- 143 Certificates
- 270 Associate Degrees
- 463 Baccalaureate Degrees
- 118 Masters Degrees



- 9 Law Degrees
- 15 Doctorate Degrees
- 32 Professional Certifications
