Doyon's Alaska Hire Preference

- Doyon employment policy preference
 - Doyon shareholders
 - Shareholders of other ANCS
 - Alaskans
- Alaskan status verified when apply for job
- Work with unions on training and referral preference for shareholders

Doyon's Alaskan Employees

- 90% of workforce is Alaskan
- Track through employment information system
- Some union, most non-union
- Alaska hire (in percentage terms) has been steady
- Shareholder hire is increasing

Doyon's Alaska Hire Initiatives

- Scholarships for shareholders
- Funding for roustabout, security, food service, and management training
- Partnership with University of Alaska and vocational-technical programs
- Outreach to 7-12 graders and villages
- Strong employee recruitment, career development, and retention programs
- Advocacy for educational tax credits

Policy Changes

- Target resources at University and vocational-technical on programs that support industry
- Implement state policies to reduce Alaska's high cost of living
- Improve tax climate in Alaska for private investment, resulting in more production and more jobs
