Dear Representative Geran Tar and Members of the House Transportation Committee,

I am writing you today in support of House Bill 357 in naming the Bragaw Street overcrossing of the Glen Highway, after my Mother, Insook Baik. My Mother immigrated to the United States from South Korea in the 1980's and has been a resident of Anchorage, Alaska for the past 40 years. Growing up in impoverished, post-war Korea, she moved to the United States to provide a better life for her children and chose to stay in Alaska because of the sense of community and resilience she felt here. She told me that Alaskan's were warm yet tough. They were the type of people that were proud of where they came from and that always looked out for one another. As a newly immigrated young woman with an infant child, she learned to drive, speak English and navigate this new world. As a single mother, she raised three children who are proud West Anchorage High School graduates, who have all gone on to graduate from top tier universities. She taught us the importance of being proud of not only our Korean heritage but of also the pride and responsibility of being Alaskans and Americans. She led us with her strong Christian morals and always reminded us of our duty to leave the world a better place and to always give back to those who needed it.

My Mother came from nothing and taught us that everything we had was given to us by the Grace of God and that we had an obligation to help our fellow man with everything we were blessed with. It is with that generous spirit that she has been leading her life to this day. For the past 15 or so years she has been providing free Thanksgiving meals for the Mt. View community. The funds which primarily have been provided by herself. Close to 1000 meals are given each year and meals are given without judgement to provide hope for those in the community that need it. When I ask her why she chooses to do this on Thanksgiving, when so many people would prefer to be relaxing at home, she always tells me of how thankful she is for where she is today and she wants to provide that for other people that need it. What started as her, our family and the Mt. View Shell gas station's employees, giving out a couple hundred meals has grown into volunteers from throughout the Mt. View and Anchorage Korean Community turning out to provide almost 1000 meals for those in need and inspiring more local community members to do the same. During my most recent visit back home, an Uber driver and I were chatting and I told her who my Mom was. She was like "Oh I know who she is! She is an angel! I always show my kids the articles about her every year and tell them they need to give back as well."

In addition to this, my Mother spends her time away from work giving back to the community through donations and scholarships and volunteers her time with a Christian missionary program teaching Korean young adults to give back to their communities and beyond. In this day and age, where anti-Asian rhetoric and an anti-Immigrant mentality can feel so prevalent, I feel proud to have my mother as a representation of what the American dream really is and the good that we can do in this world. At first when she was approached with the proposal to name the bridge after her, she was humbled and slightly embarrassed and was like "Why, me? I am just a small Korean woman?" But after reflection, she told me that she hopes that one day after she is gone, someone will say, who is this Insook Baik the bridge is named after and they will read of her deeds and be inspired to do the same.
