So I would appreciate knowing are there complaints about naturopaths' over prescribing medication? Are there investigations pending into naturopaths' prescribing the wrong medication or other allegations of wrong doing? Because without those, I am baffled to find an explanation for these objections, except as a response to those who see themselves as in competition with holistic practitioners. And if that is all there is to it, then add my name to the list of people who no longer believe that government works for them. I thank you for listening and encourage your continued support of this legislation specifically, and of naturopathic medicine in general.

Testimony of (in support): Wayne Aderhold

Our family uses ND's almost exclusively for our primary care and in a typical year we spend between \$8000 to \$9000 dollars for their services and the supplements prescribed for us, with more than 50% of this total being towards the supplements and "out of pocket" (not reimbursed by insurance).

The supplements "prescribed" and paid for 100% by us are for the most part "for professional use" only and also unknown to the allopathic physicians. We do not consider these supplements to be "drugs" but they are certainly meant to be prescribed by a physician who is trained and understands their proper use (an ND).

I have been following the testimony on HB 266 and a few things are clear:

- You have not gotten a single complaint against ND's or naturopathic medicine from patient/consumers : they all express supreme trust in their ND's safe practices and encourage integrated care by ND's working with MD's
- Despite the flaws in the law (poor language & no ND Board) naturopathic medicine has proven itself inherently safe since 1986 on its own (with no MD or legislative oversight or interference)
- The MD's speaking against the bill are grasping at any linguistic straw or "what if" they can find to scare up non-existent problems
- the progressive MD's express willingness to work WITH ND's, treat them as equals, and state a desire toward improved overall care for US (the patients)

If you fail to pass this bill out of committee and into law you will be aiding the ASMA opposition in their covert efforts to restrict legitimate professional business in Alaska and in the process wrecking my family's primary Healthcare system. Please be responsible to your State's needs: pass this bill now !

Chair Olsen and Honorable members of the House Labor and Commerce Committee,

For the record, my name is Dr. Daniel Young. I have practiced naturopathic medicine for 20 years, 17 of those years have been in Eagle River. I am currently the Vice President of the Alaska Association of Naturopathic Physicians. I appreciate your time and effort to address our concerns.

I am testifying in support of House Bill 266.

To be licensed in Alaska, a naturopathic doctor must have attended a four-year, graduate-level naturopathic medical school that is accredited by the Council on Naturopathic Medical Education. The CNME, is a member of the Association of Specialized and Professional Accreditors. This body, which is regulated by the U.S. Department of Education, oversees accreditation of allopathic (MD), osteopathic (DO), and naturopathic (ND) medical education. Naturopathic doctors are required to pass rigorous NPLEX professional board exams which include pharmacology and pharmacotherapeutic modules. Naturopathic doctors are educated in all of the same basic sciences as an medical doctor, but also study holistic and nontoxic approaches to therapy with a strong emphasis on disease prevention and optimizing wellness. In addition to a standard medical curriculum, the naturopathic physician is required to complete four years of training in clinical nutrition, homeopathic medicine, botanical medicine, psychology, and counseling.

Just as medical or osteopathic doctors are considered to be the experts in their fields, so are naturopathic doctors experts in the practice of natural medicine. We have practiced in the great state of Alaska for 26 years. We have an impeccable safety record. We provide excellent patient care. Anyone who says otherwise is mistaken.

Pertinent to the issue before us, Naturopathic doctors study pharmacology ( how drugs work in the body)and pharmacotherapeutics (how to use drugs therapeutically). Naturopathic doctors also study pharmacognosy (the study of medicines derived from natural sources) which more than prepares them to utilize natural substances in their practices. Further, the required pharmacology board exam ensures entry level competency. Although our current Alaskan law prohibits it, we ARE well trained to use natural substances whether they are prescription or not.

Our current statute, and the regulations that explain it, have had the due force of law. It is not a good statute but we have been able to function within its tenets. You have been well educated on the history of our statute and regulations by Dr. Jasper. Over recent years we have attempted to modernize our law to reflect the level of our education. Every time, our progress has been stonewalled. Opponents disseminate misinformation based on opinion, bias, ignorance and fear. The bill before you moves existing regulation into statute and preserves the current practice of naturopathic medicine in our state. It allows the thousands of patients that we serve to continue to access the healthcare that they choose. It protects naturopathic doctors from bureaucratic intrusion that threatens our practices and our businesses.

If this piece of legislation fails to pass, Alaskans will be hurt. Naturopathic doctors will no longer be able to provide the care that their patients have come to rely on. We are here to protect THEIR right to access the care that we provide. Please move House Bill 266 out of committee.
