FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

BILL NO. SB 203

Analysis

This bill amends the definition of “prohibited weapon” in AS 11.61.200 to include devices designed, made, or adapted to convert a handgun into a firearm capable of firing more than one round automatically with a single function of the trigger. The bill applies to offenses committed on or after the effective date of the Act.

The Alaska State Troopers already investigate and enforce offenses involving prohibited weapons under existing law. The conduct addressed in this bill falls within current enforcement responsibilities and does not change how cases are investigated or prosecuted.

The Department of Public Safety does not anticipate any additional costs, staffing needs, or operational impacts associated with implementation of this bill. The fiscal impact is zero.
