## IS YOUR SURFACE TRANSPORTATION PROJECT ELIGIBLE FOR ECONOMIC STIUMULUS FUNDING THROUGH THE ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND PUBLIC FACILTIES?

## **REMEMBER:**

- All surface transportation stimulus projects must have followed Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) regulations during project development
- All surface transportation stimulus projects must be obligated by February 17, 2010; 50% of the projects must be obligated by July 1, 2009

Communities wishing to have projects considered for stimulus program funding through the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT&PF) must be able to answer **yes to all** of the following:

- Have environmental documents (NEPA categorical exclusions, environmental assessment etc) been prepared in accordance with FHWA regulations and received FHWA approval?
- Have right-of-way and/or construction easements been acquired according to the Uniform Act and has FHWA approved the right-of-way and/or construction easements?
- Have necessary agency permits (wetlands, state historical preservation office etc) been acquired?
- Have agreements been reached and documented to address utilities such as water and sewer, fuel lines, or power lines that need adjusting or relocating?
- Can the final plans and specifications be delivered by or to DOT&PF no later than December 15<sup>th</sup>, 2009 in order to provide enough time for FHWA approvals, advertising and bidding?

If your project meets **all** of the above criteria - contact you legislator.
