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


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Essential Services – A Safety Net for Vulnerable Alaskans




 The number of people applying for public assistance continues to grow



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
Division of Public Assistance

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Effective Fraud Deterrence

 The Fraud unit's combined cost avoidance, direct savings and fraud claims recovered for all completed fraud investigations totaled over \$5.38 million, a 14% increase over the prior year.



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Key Division Challenges

- Provide timely, accurate and effective delivery of services despite:
 - Steady increase in the number of applications for assistance, the growing number of households and individuals qualifying for public assistance, and changes in federal program policies

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Addressing Division Challenges

Business Process

 New work process changes have improved customer service, increased efficiency, and significantly reduced the length of time between receipt of applications and benefit determinations



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Addressing Division Challenges *Program Integrity*

 Alaska received the highest accuracy rate in the nation from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and second place for accurate case closures and application denials



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Division of Public Assistance

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Key Division Challenges

- The goal to promote self-sufficiency is more difficult to achieve
 - Significant % of the Temporary Assistance caseload face multiple or profound challenges to selfsufficiency and require services that are more intensive

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Addressing Division Challenges

Work Services

- "Families First" services aimed at addressing challenges and increase family's income.
- "Work First" services are provided to emphasize quick entry into the work force.
- These Work First and Families First services are referred to as Work Services.

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Key Division Challenges

- Stabilize Alaska's child care rates
 - Regular increases to child care subsidy rates that keep pace with growing costs are essential to promote the support access to quality child care for low income families



> % of low-income Alaskans that receive heating assistance






