EXPANDING EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR RURAL HIGH-SCHOOL STUDENTS

BACKGROUND

Alaska has over 100 small remote rural high schools that are mostly off-the-road-system and spread throughout the state. Because of their location and limited capability and capacity to deliver what students need, these schools are consistently among the lowest performing schools in Alaska and unable to efficiently deliver programs that prepare students for work, training, or college.

A sampling of school-district graduation rates shows that urban and on-the-roadsystem high schools graduate roughly 75% of their students, while small remote rural schools graduate about 55% of their students.

Unfortunately, students in these schools have few options; unlike urban students, they live in remote villages and cannot change schools or attend technical high schools.

 Lack of educational opportunity is the largest single factor impacting the success of students in small remote rural high schools.

THE CHALLENGE

Providing access to high quality educational experiences to students in small rural high schools will require greater creativity and flexibility in education delivery.

THE SOLUTION

Some rural districts have developed innovative and highly successful programs that meet the needs of students, families, and communities and prepare students for post-secondary education and training or entry into the workforce.

Recent changes in Alaska statute and education regulations provide a more flexible framework for residential education in Alaska allowing school districts to operate <u>variable</u> <u>length</u> district-wide education programs that are eligible for residential stipend funding.

Statewide Programs

Traditional statewide residential programs operating on an August to June school year work exceptionally well for many students. With approximately 700 students enrolled, these programs are thriving in Alaska. However, not all parents want to send their children away for nine months and not all students want to go. They shouldn't have to.

District-wide Programs

District-wide programs, often referred to as Residential Learning Centers (RLCs), provide high-school students in remote rural schools with new options. District-wide programs are cost effective, balance educational access with a youth's need to be connected to family, community, and culture, and produce high rates of student success as documented by their graduation rates.

These programs:

- deliver variable-length programs ranging from two weeks to a semester;
- keep education dollars in the school district, students enrolled in their village school, and students graduate from their village school;
- are local programs developed with input from students, parents, communities, employers, and leaders.

Chugach School District, Lower Kuskokwim School District, and Nome and Bering Strait School Districts are currently operating variable length residential programs. Data shows these programs produce higher graduation and success rates for students.

Combination Programs


Under the statutory and regulatory changes, districts may operate residential programs that combine the traditional residential programs with the recently approved variable-length programs. This flexibility allows districts to provide both short- and long-term programs and better meet the needs of their students. Several school districts are considering or developing combination programs to retain their students and better meet their educational needs.
