FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

Analysis

In addition to beer and wine, the bill would allow for the service of spirits at golf courses under AS 04.11.115(a).

Under AS 04.16.049(a), a fourth subsection is added to allow an underage person over the age of 16 to enter and remain on the golf course licensed premises for dining or golfing; or if the person is under the age of 16 and accompanied by a person over the age of 21 years, and the parent or guardian of the underage person consents.

Under AS 04.16.060(e) subsection four as described above prohibits the misrepresentation of the person's age or having obtained the consent of the parent or guardian.

Eight golf courses possess liquor licenses issued by the state. Under the current statute, licensees are permitted to serve beer and wine only. This bill provides the current licensees the option of adding spirits to their menus. The Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) Board has not encountered violations on golf courses in relation to service of alcoholic beverages. This legislation will require minor revisions to 3 AAC 304.670, but is expected to have no fiscal impact on the ABC Board.
