Analysis

Bill Language:

The bill is primarily intended to give the Tanana Valley Sportsmen's Association and the University of Alaska Fairbanks Rifle Team a way to raise operating funds. The bill does not limit the conduct of a big bull moose derby to these organizations, so any interested permittee could apply for a permit to conduct this type of derby. Participants would first obtain a hunting license and then pay a derby entry fee. Derby operation would be similar to that of a fish derby, and would be controlled by house rules. The bill will not materially affect the gaming program. It will simply be one more type of permit that the Gaming Group can issue. The public sector will be affected only by having one more way to support the activities of not-for-profit organizations. The bill will not affect the private sector because the private sector, outside of not-for-profit organizations, does not qualify for the permit required to conduct a gaming activity.

Revenues:

Department of Revenue estimates that a big bull moose derby will generate minimal revenue under \$1,000.

Expenditures:

Department of Revenue can implement and administer the provisions of this bill utilizing existing resources.

Regulations:

Regulations would be needed to specify the need for house rules, a winner prize receipt requirement, and other matters to ensure any big bull moose derbies are conducted in the best interest of the charities.
