HB 19 Section summary

Section 1 – Change in statute to reference new section that will be created with this bill to allow for Permanent Motor Vehicle Registration (AS 28.10.155)

Section 2 – Allows for Permanent Motor Vehicle Registration

- (A) Allows for the owner of non-commercial motor vehicles 8-years old or older the option to obtain a permanent registration for the vehicle in lieu of the normal biannual registration.
 - This is only allowed in boroughs or municipalities that elect to opt-in by the passage of an ordinance. (Page 2 line 1-2)
 - Permanent registration is non-transferable expires when vehicle is sold.
 - Requires the DMV to issue a plate, tab and permanent registration form after fees have been paid.
- (B) Establishes a \$25 fee, in addition to the normal registration fee to obtain permanent motor vehicle registration.
 - Also references the collection of Motor Vehicle registration *Tax* (a function the DMV performs for local municipalities)
 - AS 28.10.423 Refers to the fee that is charged for registration in communities with emission control inspection fees (Anchorage was the only one, but they repealed there inspection requirement)

Section 3 – References the Senior Exemption for registration upon application for one vehicle also extends the exemption to fees for certain vehicles and the motor vehicle registration tax.

Section 4 – Allows for Permanent registration of non-commercial trailers. Allows for the owner of non-commercial trailer the option to obtain a permanent registration for the vehicle in lieu of the normal biannual registration.

- This is only allowed in boroughs or municipalities that elect to opt-in by the passage of an ordinance. (Page 2, lines 30-31)
- Permanent registration is non-transferable expires when trailer is sold.

 Establishes a \$25 fee, in addition to the normal registration fee to obtain permanent registration for a trailer

Section 5 – Allows for the collection of the \$2 fee on vehicles obtaining permanent registration in parts of the state that have an emission control fee in place.

Section 6 – Adds permanent registration to the motor vehicles and trailers that have to pay a Motor Vehicle Registration Tax if registered in a community that has implemented such a tax. (page 4, line 15)

Section 7 – Allows municipalities and boroughs with a motor vehicle registration tax, to establish a motor vehicle registration tax for eligible vehicles and trailers by the passage of an ordinance. (Currently the MVRT is paid on a scale based on the age of a vehicle and levels out once the vehicle is eight years old. Each community may either adopt the rates listed above in section 6 or adopt their own scale of fees.)

Section 9 - Establishes an effective date of Jan. 1, 2015
