RE: House Bill 105

Dear Representative Thompson:

On behalf of the National Federation of Independent Business/Alaska, I wish to respectfully inform you of our opposition to House Bill 105. In a recent NFIB/Alaska member ballot our membership voted overwhelmingly to oppose any increase in the felony theft threshold. The National Federation of Independent Business is the largest small-business advocacy group in Alaska.

NFIB/AK members recognize that \$500 is a significant amount to a small business, and the state shouldn't be making it easier for thieves to steal from them by raising the felony theft threshold to \$1,500. There is substantial evidence that theft rings are becoming very sophisticated; they are aware of the felony limits and will steal up to that amount. Thus, while there might be potential savings in judicial processes, businesses would see a tripling of the amount of theft in goods. Instances of individuals "stealing to feed their families" are rare, and the courts and prosecutors have enough discretion to handle these circumstances appropriately. We believe that simply inflation-proofing crime is poor public policy.
