The Arctic Winter Games are a prominent international sport competition for young athletes in the northern and arctic regions. Currently, nine contingents participate in the biannual games, including northern territories of Canada, Russia and Europe. Team Alaska has been a participating contingent in the Games since 1970.

- Since the Games' inception, approximately 6,000 Alaskans have been members of Team Alaska, and more than that number have participated as volunteers working at Games hosted by Alaska Communities.
- Over 300 Alaskan youth represented Team Alaska in the 2012 Arctic Winter Games in Whitehorse, Yukon Canada, where Alaskan athletes earned a total of 190 medals!
- The 2014 Games will be hosted in Fairbanks Alaska. Over 2000 athletes, representing nine territories, will participate. Team Alaska will comprise of 306 athletes and 75 volunteer coaches and staff.
- At the 2014 Games, Team Alaska will compete in 20 sporting & traditional dance and music events, including the Dene<sup>1</sup> and Inuit Games<sup>2</sup>.

<sup>1</sup> Dene games consist of the following events: finger pull, snowsnake, stick pull hand games and pole push

<sup>2</sup> Inuit games consist of the following events: one-foot high kick, two-foot high kick, Alaskan high kick, kneel jump, sledge jump and triple jump. Older competitors participate in the arm pull airplane, one hand reach, head pull and knuckle hop.

## **How are athletes selected to participate in Team Alaska at the Arctic Winter Games?**

Team Alaska athletes must be a resident of Alaska, and between the ages of 11 and 18 years of age<sup>3</sup>. Athletes must comply with athlete eligibility policies as defined by the Athlete Eligibility Policy in the AWG International Staging Manual.

All 20 sports have established procedures for selecting sports teams. These procedures are reviewed bi-annually, a process that will be complete at the end of February 2013. The Sport Coordinator selects the athletes, in collaboration with the coaches and confirmation by the Team Alaska Chef de Mission.

Each athlete must provide, at minimum, the following information in order to apply for Team Alaska:

- A written application is submitted to [www.awg.teamalaska.org](http://www.awg.teamalaska.org). There is no fee to apply.
- The application packet must include:
  - Copy of birth certificate or photocopy of passport
  - Two contactable references
  - Recommendation from a coach who has coached the applicant
  - Tape, DVD, or youtube URL required if the coach is unable to see the athlete play in person

Team selection is based upon the following standards:

- Playing Experience
- Coach's recommendation
- References
- Skills evaluation of tape, DVD, youtube URL, or live performance
