House Bill 9 Private Investigators

Honorable Representatives:

I have been working as a private investigator in Alaska for the last twenty years, but started my career several years earlier in Oregon as a surveillance investigator. I do not have a storied background like many of my colleagues, but have worked cases for State and Federal agencies, as well as countless law firms and many of the largest insurance companies. I would easily meet or exceed the PI licensing requirements of probably any state, yet am adamantly opposed to House Bill 9 as it is written.

As a past Board member of Alaska Investigators Association for a number of years, I was directly involved with the group's efforts to bring PI licensing to Alaska. For several years, public & private investigators from around the state grappled with how to fairly protect the public and our profession. We studied the licensing requirements of other states and devoted countless hours to discussion. Despite our best efforts, I think by default we ultimately adopted the stance "the marketplace best regulates our profession", given how few private investigators were working in Alaska at that time.

Having written that, I can appreciate the intent of HB 9. No one wants harm to come to another due to the actions of a rogue individual. However, there are still very few persons working as investigators in Alaska and as several of my colleagues have already addressed in their letters, e-mails and phone calls, HB 9 is fraught with numerous problems. As a matter of fact, rather than I dissect it line by line, allow me to go on record that I firmly agree with the detailed opinions of HB 9 already offered by investigators Frank Wake, Tres Lewis, Steve Christopher and Mike Miller. All are well known throughout the state as investigative professionals with the highest degree of integrity, and after reading their opinions I can only agree with their insight.

If the intent of HB 9 is to protect Alaska's citizens, it should not be written to benefit a few while bringing extreme hardship to the rest. Find a way to fairly protect the public <u>and</u> our profession, and most investigators will probably agree with your efforts.
