BILL NO. HB159

Analysis

HB159 would exempt a contract between a health care provider and an individual patient or the patient's representative from the regulation of insurance when a health care provider agrees to provide routine health care services to the individual patient for a fee during a specific period. HB159 establishes additional criteria that must be in the agreement for the agreement to be valid. HB159 also establishes definitions for "health care," "health care provider" and "routine health care services."

The Division of Insurance does not anticipate a fiscal impact from this legislation.
