In order to implement this provision, an appropriation is necessary to properly record the loan forgiveness payment as an expense in ADWF.

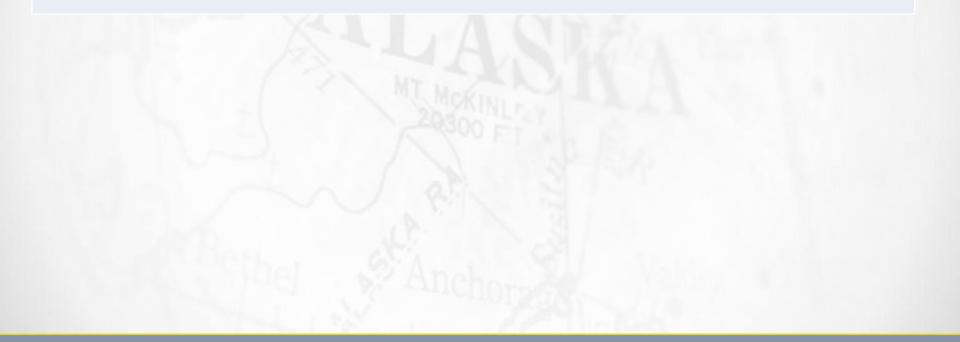
