Sponsor Statement

House Bill 114: Benefits for Workplace Death and Permanent Impairment

House Bill 114 addresses an injustice that came to light when Abigail Caudle, a twenty-six yearold electrical worker, was killed on the job in 2011. Because Ms. Caudle was unmarried and had no dependents, the workers' compensation system paid only for her funeral expenses. HB 114 directs that when a worker dies without a spouse or minor children, then either relatives who depended on that worker for support, or the worker's estate, will receive a respectful amount of compensation.

HB 114 also solves the problem of inadequate financial support of children after their single parent dies on the job. Currently, teenagers may receive only a few months of financial assistance before their support is cut off when they turn eighteen. The bill continues payment of the death benefit for five years after the child reaches legal adulthood.

Finally, HB 114 brings more equitable compensation to workers for permanent injuries, such as loss of an arm. One-time payments for permanent, partial disability have not increased since 2000, and their value has been eroded by inflation. The bill increases the payments to off-set past inflation, and provides an annual adjustment based on the Anchorage Consumer Price Index.
