




AIAS Structure

Created over 50 years ago by Ch88 SLA 1961 - (AS 37.15.410-550)














Annual Revenues and Operations, Maintenance and Debt Costs

\$130.4M in Operating/Other Revenues




Costs are covered by adjustments to rates and fees – self sustaining system


Monthly Cargo & PAX CMGTW

As of December 31, 2014






Passenger Activity

Operating Agreement with Carriers

- Ten-year Operating Agreement established July 1, 2013
 - 30 Airlines are Signatory
 - Signatory Carriers
 - Share financial risk in exchange for capital and operating input
 - Discounted fees
- Signatory Carriers organize and engage AIAS as Airline Airport Affairs Committee (AAAC)
 - Co-chairs are representatives from UPS and Alaska Airlines
- AIAS has authority to issue revenue bonds



Strategic Planning & Marketing

- System planning/responses to previous management reviews
 - Strategic Plan (2015)
 - Business Plan (2014-15)
 - Marketing Plans / System Branding (Ongoing)
- Proactive communications
 - Work with sister State agencies; Convention and Visitors Bureaus and Economic Development Corporations to strategize opportunities
 - Attend passenger and cargo conferences to promote AIAS
 - Pursue Asian carriers

Rural System Scope and Scale

- 247 DOT&PF owned/operated airports & seaplane bases
- 172 gravel & 47 paved airports; 27 Sea Plane Bases & 1 heliport
- 19 Part 139 certificated airports
- Primary access for 82% of Alaskan communities off the contiguous road system
- Rural System is <u>not</u> self sustaining; primarily funded by GF, some revenue via leases






FY2016 Governor's Endorsed Budget Functional Breakdown

Airport Improvement Program (AIP)

FAA airport capital improvement project funding program (~\$176.2M)

- Cargo Entitlement (\$15.1M)
 - Earned by airports with more than 100 million pounds landed weight
- Primary Passenger Entitlement (\$31.2M)
 - Earned by airports with more than 10,000 passengers (enplanements)
- Non-Primary Passenger Entitlement (\$7.6M)
 - Earned by airports with less than 10,000 passengers annually
- State Apportionment (\$20.5M)
 - An area/pop. formula used after cargo/passenger entitlements calculated
- Alaska Supplemental (\$21.3M total less Muni Sponsors = \$16.7M)
 - Legislative amount based on 1980 amounts
- Discretionary (\$85.1)
 - What remains divided among 50 states

Aviation Challenges--Future

- Evolving federal agency relationships
 - Increasing regulatory pressure (FAA, TSA, EPA)
 - Lessening awareness of, and appreciation for, Alaska realities not present in lower 48
 - FAA AIP funding uncertainty
- Increasing cost of winter maintenance chemicals
 - Federal ban on a common chemical used at large airports
 - Approved chemical almost twice as expensive
