I am writing to express deep concern over the proposed elimination of the WWAMI program. I would like to share my experiences growing up as an Alaskan with dreams of becoming a physician.

There can be no question that Alaska struggles to have enough doctors to meet the many and varied needs of Alaskans. When I was in middle school, a close friend had a bout with cancer. She had to spend several months down in Seattle getting care, missing huge amounts of school. Her family's suffering must have been awful- at least one parent had to stay in Anchorage with the other children while their oldest was in a strange city thousands of miles away. Today, we might have the capacity to treat her cancer in Anchorage, a wonderful accomplishment. But taking care of my friend and children like her, as well as continuing to develop new solutions to Alaska's unique health care obstacles, requires a constant supply of doctors willing to make Alaska their home.

I first heard about the WWAMI program in middle school, when I started exploring the possibility of becoming a doctor. It was to my very great surprise to learn that the program based in my hometown was ranked first in the nation for training primary care doctors. I had no idea that I could learn to be a doctor in my hometown, much less at one of the best schools in the world. At that moment, my dream of becoming a doctor in a small Alaska town suddenly seemed like it could come true.

I went to Rogers Park Elementary, Goldenview Middle School and South Anchorage High School (go Wolverines!). The excellent education provided there allowed me to win a National Merit Scholarship and with it, a full scholarship to the University of Utah. I maintained my Alaska residence throughout my undergraduate education and was overjoyed to have the opportunity to return to Alaska for medical school after graduating from college. I firmly believe that Alaska has primary education opportunities on par with any other state. It would be a terrible shame to cut the program that motivates so many students to excel and return to Alaska to make their homes.
