WHEREAS, cuts to all segments of government are expected for FY 17 but the proportion of the proposed reduction for public broadcasting is disproportionate in comparison and will adversely affect the availability of service across Alaska, especially in rural Alaska where public broadcasting is often the primary means of emergency information, regional information sharing, entertainment and community information.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Haines Borough Assembly respectfully requests the Governor of Alaska and the Alaska Legislature consider less severe cuts to the Alaska Public Broadcasting Commission in FY2017 budget.

Senator Stedman and Representative Kreiss-Tomkins:

The Local Emergency Planning Committee for the Petersburg Borough assists in preparing for emergencies by maintaining an Emergency Operations Plan.

The committee is made up of local officials; police, fire, public health professionals; and representatives from the community and the media.

KFSK public radio is the only 24-hour media service in the Petersburg Borough and its signal reaches the entire population. In the event of an emergency, KFSK plays a vital role in the dissemination of information from first responders and officials involved in the management of the emergency response.

As we are all aware, the State of Alaska is facing a fiscal crisis resulting in difficult budget decisions. KFSK expected, and indeed realized, a deep cut to its state operating grant in FY16.

The Petersburg Local Emergency Planning Committee needs KFSK to remain strong in order to continue to serve its mission to keep Borough residents informed. In the event of an emergency, it is the only media source that citizens can rely upon to receive life-saving and time-sensitive information that is a necessity in emergency situations.

We urge you to support public broadcasting by keeping the reduction of state funding for public radio stations to a minimum. Large cuts to small radio stations could dismantle the emergency response network that is vital to keeping Alaskans safe during emergencies.
