Analysis

This legislation creates the crime of reckless driving in the first degree which is a class C felony. A person commits reckless driving in the first degree if they drive a motor vehicle in a manner that creates a substantial risk of harm to a person or to property and, as a result of their driving, a pedestrian or bicyclist is injured.

The Department of Law does not anticipate a fiscal impact.
