As a lifelong Alaskan and business owner in Anchorage I have found it appalling that we do not have a qualified licensure for manicurists/pedicurists in the state of Alaska. You can be sure that most of the general public does not have any information or knowledge that they are receiving services from businesses that rarely have any professional training on procedures, sanitation, safety or contra indications for services.

I owned an accredited Reflexology and Acupressure school for 12 years and required <u>500</u> hours of training before students could work with the public. We used no sharp instruments, we worked with just our fingers, and we had non of the sanitary issues that the manicurist profession does.
