> Implement reforms identified by the Alaska Criminal Justice Commission to address violence prevention, services, and victims' rights. This is a new request for FY2018. It was not included in the FY2018 Governor's budget due to oversight.

Section 163 of SB 91 implements reforms identified and recommended by the Alaska Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC) in its Justice Reinvestment Report by adding uncodified language instructing the Council on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault (CDVSA) to create or expand community-based violence prevention programming and services for victims of a crime involving domestic violence or sexual assault. This section was added in direct response to the concerns and concepts expressed during the Justice Reinvestment Initiative Victim Service Roundtables and interviews with victims. Victims and survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault, Alaska Native elders, victim Service Roundtables and interviews with victims. The criminal and civil justice systems came together and agreed on ten recommendations to address violence prevention, services, and victims' rights. The recommendations were rolled up into the ACJC report as priorities for violence prevention and victims' services in rural/remote areas of Alaska.

This request is Year 2 funding as estimated per Fiscal Note 31 associated with SB 91. This is expected to fully fund the program in future years.

**EXPLANATION:** This amendment reduces the FY 18 general fund request in this allocation by 50%. During Public Safety subcommittee hearings questions were asked as to the current cost of various testing procedures compared to the costs of such procedures prior to the construction of the new crime lab. The Department was unable to provide answers on this subject. A letter has been received from a former 30 year lab employee which states prior to the first lab, forensic lab costs were "virtually zero". The letter states this was accomplished by law enforcement agencies around the state sending evidence to the FBI lab in Washington DC.

This amendment reduces the FY 18 general fund budget request of \$4,969,000 by 50% and requires the Department to solicit services at the federal level for laboratory testing to reduce state operating costs. It is assumed there will be some charge at the federal level for these services, however, the costs should be significantly less than those currently incurred by the state.

**EXPLANATION:** This amendment reduces the amount provided to grantees of the Village Public Safety Officer (VPSO) program based on the inability of the grantees to hire an average of ten VPSO's annually. The Department subcommittee overview document for the VPSO program states the average cost of an existing VPSO is \$183,596. VPSO turnover substantially exceeds the number of VPSO's hired and using ten as an average number of VSPO's that cannot be hired is a conservative number. There are currently 53 filled positions of the 78 budgeted VPSO positions that grant awards are based on. A chart is attached depicting the turnover of VPSO's and the number of VPSO's hired by fiscal year. This amendment makes a reduction of \$1,835,960 to this allocation based on an average of 10 vacant Village Public Safety Officer positions at an average annual cost of \$183,596 per VSPO.
