I would like to speak against the amendment (Rep Talerico) to eliminate the \$250,000 to support the Best Practices Initiative.

- DEED is beginning a process to "reinvent" education with *Alaska's Education Challenge* referenced by the Governor in the State of the State message.
- That process will see five committees looking at every facet of the system: Improve Student Learning, Ensure Excellent Educators, Modernization and Finance, Inspire Tribal and Community Ownership, and Promote Safety and Well-Being.
- There will be State Board members chairing each committee which will be made up of Alaskans from across the state.
- With the severe budget reductions in DEED (37%) they will be hard pressed to execute any planning to improve education.
- A portion of the funds will used to help districts collaborate and bring the best of education to other districts.

This appears to be a good investment in our education system and begin to do exactly what the Legislature has been requesting of the department.
