Senator MacKinnon:

On behalf of the Alaska Peace Officers Association (APOA), I am writing to reiterate our strong support of HB23 (rather than SB48) moving forward in its current form as you review this critically important legislation. APOA strongly supports the implementation of medical insurance for the families of fallen peace officers and firefighters.

Specifically, HB 23 provides a mandatory benefit to <u>all</u> eligible peace officers and firefighters. It recognizes that families of all public safety officers, whether state or municipal employees, killed in the line of duty will receive this benefit and be treated equally.

Additionally, HB 23 provides medical insurance benefits to spouses of public safety officers killed in the line of duty until they are eligible to receive a major-medical insurance coverage by other means, or the spouse reaches Medicare eligibility, whichever comes first. It does not limit a spouse's medical coverage after a random 10-year period, like SB 48. HB 23 therefore recognizes that families making the ultimate sacrifice will keep this benefit unless they have other medical insurance coverage.

APOA has significant membership within the ranks of municipal peace officers and firefighters, along with those who serve the State of Alaska. It is therefore essential to us that all peace officers and firefighters be assured that their families receive ongoing health care in the event of death in the line of duty.
