As a young, third-generation Alaskan, one who plans to build her life and family here, the economic future of our state is of the utmost importance to me, and I am paying close attention.

I support the House fiscal plan as it stands today: HB 115, providing for an income tax, will allow those with more to give more back, while lessening the impact on those less economically stable; the PFD cap at \$1,250 (although with reservations - I know the PFD is a great boon to many low-income families, especially rural ones or those living subsistence lifestyles); and doing as much as possible to prevent further budget cuts that could affect the livelihood and well-being of our people, including limiting cuts to education, the University, and state employment.

In that vein, I strongly encourage you and your colleagues in the Capitol to preserve education funding, especially as both houses collaborate to find a plan that everyone can agree on. The education of Alaska's children should be of the utmost importance to everyone who wants a strong future for this state, with bright, creative leadership for tomorrow - which should be all of you. Please protect, and help to create, the leaders, teachers, cultural stewards, and innovators of the next generation.

Further, I oppose the just-introduced SB103, the elimination of the Alaska Performance Scholarship. I was one of the first recipients of this scholarship, back in 2011, and greatly benefited from the program. Because of the generosity of the APS, I stayed in Alaska for college, instead of attending an institution in the lower 48, and studied at the University of Alaska Southeast. Because of the APS, I was able to spend three years in a degree-seeking program locally, one year studying abroad, and graduate with two internships and zero student debt under my belt. This is a rarity in today's world of ever-increasing tuition and student loan debt. Upon my graduation, the University provided me with support and assistance in finding a job. I would like to ask you to please consider the following:

Institute a simple 10% flat income tax and a seasonal sales tax. Taxes are how the rest of the 49 states raise money to fund government. A flat tax is a consistent tax rate applied to all tax brackets and everyone would pay the same tax rate regardless of income. The flat tax would be imposed on wages only, with no tax on capital gains or investments. Due to its simplicity, there would be no deductions, no need for tax preparation services or an army of people to process returns, which would save money. Good Afternoon -

I am writing to provide public testimony on HB 115 regarding a state income tax. I believe that a state income tax is a step in the right direction. However, I strongly disagree with the current tables and breakdown that are being proposed for single vs married rates. As a single income household, I already have to pay an out-sized amount of my income to basics. I do not have a second income to assist with mortgage payments, property tax payments (which I happy to pay as I understand sustaining a community means investing in public services such as education even when I may not use many of them myself), utilities, and any other expenses that a household routinely incurs that are shared by married households with a dual income. The proposal that singles pay higher income tax rates/amounts than married individuals in the same tax bracket is a tax on being a single household.

In talking with a legislator's office in Juneau, it has been shared that the single rate is higher to offset the dip in the PFD that will hit married households doubly. I strongly disagree that these two forms of income for the state should be considered together in terms of impact. They are both income sources, yet they are separate issues. They both impact Alaskans, yet one may be long term and one may be short term. As such, these income sources and impacts should be considered separately. There is a possibility that the PFD will be phased out altogether at some point in the future. While most would not like to address or even think about this as a long term possibility, it is a reality that the state may have to face. Income tax, however, will likely remain after the PFD has been retired. The impacts need to be considered separately and equitably. A static dollar amount reduction of the PFD is essentially a flat tax and hits lower income families harder. It is a tax on having a low income.

While I do agree that instituting an income tax is a step in the right direction to close the deficit and I also agree that a reduction or complete elimination of the PFD altogether may also be a step in the right direction, I disagree with the current coupling of their combined effect on Alaska households in order to inform the proposed tax obligations across incomes and single/married households.

- Please adjust your proposal to institute an income tax equitably across married and single households.
- Please adjust the reduction in the PFD to impact households across income ranges equitably, as well.

Right now, while these proposals generate income for the state, they very clearly show a bias for those who are well off and married.
