Good afternoon,

I hope this letter finds you well.

May I count on you to support HB 103? The opposition has been making false & misleading claims about optometry being a danger to the public.

To become an optometrist, I earned a Bachelor of Science in Biology at Hawaii Pacific University in 2008 and then went on to earn a doctorate in Optometry at the University of Missouri-Saint Louis in 2013. My education and my fellow optometry colleagues' education is similar to the education pathway of a dentist. We attend 8 years of university and then can proceed to an optional 1-2 year residency.

I moved to Alaska to deliver much needed eye care to the Native Alaskan population. As an optometrist, I do very little of what the ophthalmologists do. Ophthalmologists are the specialists like the cardiologists are to the family doctors, or oral surgeons are to general dentists. Optometrists and Ophthalmologists must work together to provide the best care possible for the Alaskan public. Because there are 160+ optometrists in the state compared to Ophthalmology's 24 or so, Optometrists treat the majority of primary eye care patients. We consistently refer patients to ophthalmologists when the patient needs specialty surgical skills.

The limited "ophthalmic surgery" that optometrists perform is minor and includes procedures such as foreign body removal and drilling rust out of corneas. This is very important especially for workers living in small towns and villages away from Anchorage, Wasilla, and Fairbanks where the majority of ophthalmologist practice. The limited "ophthalmic surgery" would also include injecting steroids into eyelid cysts which we have been thoroughly educated through school and continuing medical education course.

Ophthalmologists voice 2 concerns about Optometrists regulating their own profession: Optometry is a danger to the public & optometry has insufficient training - both of these concerns are false.

HB103 will allow Optometry's board to regulate its own profession. Optometry is the only medical profession in Alaska that doesn't allow its board to regulate its own. In the future as new technologies and drugs are developed, the board can determine if optometrists are adequately trained, qualified and able to provide safe and effective care without having to resort to statute change for routine regulatory issues.

Please support this bill. HB 103 will control costs and improve access to eye care for Alaskans. Thank you from the bottom of my heart for your time and efforts to improve the quality of life for all Alaskans.

And it boils down to: If a professional can demonstrate they have the judgment, competence and skill to provide certain services, they should be able to do that."

Our education is similar to dentistry, with 8 years of university and optional 1-2 years of residency.

HB 103 does not allow optometry to do anything beyond our education and training.

We only perform minor procedures, like removing corneal and conjunctival foreign bodies, for which we are fully trained at accredited colleges. My name is Nathan Frank, OD, and I am writing to ask for your support of HB 103, which will allow the state board of optometry to regulate the profession of optometry for the safety of all Alaskans.

There has been little mention of what an optometrist undergoes to earn their Doctorate of Optometry degree. I'd like to provide a brief synopsis of my background to help you understand my point of view. I attended four years of undergraduate education, followed by four years of optometry school, and finally completed an accredited residency affiliated with The Johns Hopkins Hospital in order to specialize in Ocular Disease. In addition to this formal education, I have lectured at numerous continuing education classes, attended hundreds of hours of continuing education, and frequently spend my free time reading the newest and most up-to-date eye care research. Additionally, I continue to train internal medicine and family practice residents at my current practice, Ophthalmic Associates—where I work as the only optometrist alongside four ophthalmologists. As you can extrapolate from my professional experience, optometrists are physicians (as defined and accepted as under Federal Medicare law) and should possess the right to treat patients accordingly.

As a resident and practicing optometrist, I've worked directly with ophthalmology in a group setting at three different private practices spanning Maryland and Alaska. In this time, I've learned the patient benefits most when optometrists can practice to the fullest

extent of their knowledge and training. Passing HB 103 will allow optometrists to maximize their skill set and provide the best care to patients. I would like to point out that HB 103 does not authorize optometrists to do any procedures; it only gives the state board authority to regulate the profession for the safety of the public. I am not writing because I wish to perform surgeries, I am writing to you simply to ask you to pass this bill to ensure I can practice within my realm of expertise. Just as a family practice physician would not perform open-heart surgery or an occupational therapist would not diagnose a congenital deformity, optometrists are not attempting to do anything beyond their scope of education and training, as is clearly stated in HB 103.

Passing HB 103 will immensely benefit the greater population of Alaska. Not only will the multidisciplinary nature of eye care continue to flourish, but also Alaska citizens will experience increased access to affordable eye care. Optometrists provide the vast majority of eye care throughout Alaska, including remote towns and villages. In addition to increased access to eye care, the population will experience reduced costs when most eye care can be provided locally by optometrists.

By allowing optometrists to effectively regulate their scope of practice by passing HB 103, you will improve patient eye care in Alaska. Thank you for your time and consideration of this matter.

Dear Senators,

Please support the optometry bill SB36 / HB 103. I hope to add more context to this topic.

Optometrists, in addition to training to correct visual acuity, also have trained to diagnose and treat ocular disease, including relevant pharmacology. They currently prescribe medications. The statements that I am hearing from the opposition, that only 15-hours of training would then qualify an optometrist to perform surgery, are misrepresentations and should be clarified with some context from the bill (AS 08.72.181). These references of hours are all in the reference to continuing education for maintaining a license, not surgical training. (1) 8 hours is required specifically for pharmaceuticals. (2) 7 hours of continuing education is for injection of nontopical pharmaceuticals (not injections to any components of the globe.) These specifications are in the context of the minimum 72 hours of general optometry continuing education, of which 48 must include pathology and pharmacology. I do not interpret this language to suggest that surgery is licensed after 7 hours of training. Also, if optometrists opt to prescribe controlled substances in their practice, they must first obtain a DEA license.

A relevant portion of text that precedes the excerpt above defining ophthalmic surgery is important to consider. See below of Sec 5 from HB 103

- Sec. 5. AS 08.72 is amended by adding a new section to read: Sec. 08.72.278. Limitation on practice. (a) A licensee may perform the services of optometry as defined in AS 08.72.300 only if the services are within the scope of the licensee's education, training, and experience as established by regulations adopted by the board.
- (b) A LICENSEE MAY NOT PERFORM OPHTHALMIC SURGERY unless the procedure is (1) within the scope of the licensee's education and training from an accredited school of optometry; and
 - (2) authorized by regulations adopted by the board.
- (c) In this section, "ophthalmic surgery" means an invasive procedure in which human tissue is cut, ablated, or otherwise penetrated by incision, laser, or other means to treat diseases of the human eye, alter or correct refractive error, or alter or enhance cosmetic appearance; "ophthalmic surgery" does not include the procedure described under AS 08.72.273. [08.72.273. Removal of foreign bodies. A licensee may remove superficial foreign bodies from the eye and its appendages. This section is not intended to permit a licensee to perform invasive surgery.]

I suspect that those opposing this bill are concerned by the word "unless" in line (b) above and its trailing clause (1) within the scope...of training...from an accredited school of optometry. I offer this: the vast majority of optometrists were not trained in surgical procedures and thus would not suddenly be performing surgical procedures upon the passing of this bill. I understand that this clause enables the statutes to accommodate the future advancements in optometry training – as any of us would expect in our own respective fields. I do not

interpret the above to allow surgery without formal training. I also understand that the definition of ophthalmic surgery was incorporated to appease opponents of these legislative efforts.

My father, an optometrist practicing for 43 years including 39 years in Alaska, explained that this is a decadeslong issue (as you are likely aware). The greater point of this issue is that of **professional autonomy for the practice of optometry.** I understand that the medical, dental and nursing boards all have language in the state statues that allow them to adopt regulations for their respective professions. If you care to read, item 6) of <u>AS 08.72.300</u> is the proposed language to allow the board of optometry to regulate their profession – rather than undergoing the entire legislative process for issues that are more appropriately regulated by a governing board. Indeed, this is how other boards regulate their professions, but is still subject to legislative approval. I found nearly identical language in the nursing statutes.

Before you oppose or approve this bill, first please consider: (1) the content of the bill, (2) all other governing boards of medical professions (medical, nursing and dental boards) have autonomy to regulate their own profession, except optometry and (3) mutual respect among medical professionals is also important for the safety patients. That includes respecting the autonomy among those professionals whom share in patient care. Obstruction of professional autonomy is then the opposite: disrespect. This is important to me both as an Alaska resident and a medical student (a future physician) currently doing my clinical training, where I am learning that effective patient care is shared patient care. Optometrists will continue to refer their patients with ocular pathology in need of specialized ophthalmic care to the capable and surgically trained ophthalmologists in our state; I see no indication that this bill will change that arrangement of shared eye care.

In Opposition of HB 103/SB 36

Dear Senators:

I'm writing you this letter in opposition of SB 36/HB 103 relating to the practice of Optometry in the State of Alaska. This bill will give the Board of Optometry sole and full authority to grant it's members the right to perform surgery for which they have received no formal training.

I am a board certified Ophthalmologist who has been practicing in Alaska since 2009. In 2013, I found myself in a similar situation that the Optometrists currently find themselves. I was interested in performing specific surgical treatments for diseases of the eye, which included injections of medications into the eye and laser treatments of the eye for which I didn't have the necessary training to do safely and correctly. In my situation, I chose to apply to and was accepted into a two year vitreo-retinal surgical fellowship, which required moving myself and my family to Ohio for two years. The Optometrists in Alaska have no such option given that there are no surgical fellowships that exist in Optometry since Optometry is not a surgical specialty.

During my vitreo-retinal fellowship between 2014 and 2016, I worked an average of 60 hours a week including nights and weekends. I interacted with well over 10,000 patients with retinal disease and performed thousands of retinal surgical procedure both in the clinic and operating room. I trained under the mentorship of 9 vitreo-retinal specialists who collectively had over 120 years in clinical practice. During my fellowship, I directly supervised and trained Optometry residents at the VA Eye Clinic in Cincinnati, OH who were doing a one year Optometry residency at the VA after competing four years of Optometry school. Under my direct supervision, the Optometry residents assisted in the retina clinic with the workup and diagnosis of patients. At no time did an Optometry resident ever perform a surgical procedure in the clinic or in the operating room nor was that expected of them to learn. They did not spent time observing lasers or injections being performed. I nor any of my mentors gave lectures on how to perform surgical procedures to the Optometry residents. The laser and injection procedures in the retina clinic and surgical procedures in the operating room were performed by me or by the Ophthalmology residents under my direct supervision. This system worked well for the Veterans with the Optometrist and Ophthalmologist working together to see patients and diagnose eye disease and then when necessary having a qualified Ophthalmologist perform any surgical care (eye injections, lasers, incisional surgery). This is essentially the same as the model for eye care that currently exists in Alaska.

As written, Senate Bill 36/HB 103 will change this model by allowing Optometrists to give themselves ever expanding surgical privileges and ultimately circumvent the training that I and my colleagues have undergone to provide a high level of safe and skilled surgical care for the eye diseases we see in our clinic on a daily basis. No Optometrist currently practicing in the State of Alaska has undergone the training to safely and correctly perform injections directly into eyes, lasers into eyes or any more extensive surgical procedures and weekend courses won't make them qualified for these surgical procedures.

In summary, SB 36/HB 103 should either be rejected in it's entirety or be amended to include a definition of eye surgeries to exclude from the Optometrist scope of practice. Again, there is no substitute for the extensive training that I and my colleagues have received, which allows us to appropriately and safely treat eye disease with our surgical expertise. Thank you for your consideration in this matter.

Senator MacKinnon:

I am currently a staff civilian optometrist, credentialed at the 673rd Medical Group at JBER, where I provide eye care to the active duty family members, military retirees, and their family members, along with four other optometrists and two ophthalmologists. I have served in multiple modes of practice during my 32 year career: private solo optometric practice, group optometry practice, multi-disciplinary ophthalmology practices, vision center opticals, and as a credentialed military optometrist at three USAF hospitals. I served twenty years in the USAF as an optometrist, and finished my career serving as a Medical Group Commander for the Alaska Air National Guard in Anchorage. I retired from the USAF as a Colonel in 2013. In my experience as a USAF optometrist , optometry and ophthalmology is organizationally separate, and has been for years. Optometry practice as primary eye care providers as part of the Aerospace Medicine Squadron, and Ophthalmology is organizationally in a separate chain of command in the Medical Operations Squadron. Both professions are autonomous, and support each other efficiently and successfully, each profession contributing its expertise to the best overall eye care of the patient. This is EXACTLY how having two autonomous boards would operate in the State of Alaska with two self regulating, self-autonomous boards. It is already a model that has been time- proven to work best for both the interests of the patient, and the respective eye care professions. HB 103 will create this same model of success in the civilian medical eye care sector.

Optometrists deserve the same right to self regulation that other allied health professions such as dentists, and nurse practitioners currently enjoy. HB 103 ensures that optometrist will practice within the limits of their accredited training. There are other checks and balances beyond statute, that already currently exist that ensure that ALL eye care practitioners practice within their level of training and experience, and these checks and balances will be unaffected by the passage of HB 103. Presently, malpractice insurance insurance companies will only insure practitioners against lawsuit if they practice within limits of their accredited training, experience, and state board licensure. Moral respect for the well being of a patient, and the code to "first do no harm" already puts a self-imposed limit on every healthcare provider to practice within the limits of their training, experience, and comfort zone. Finally, medical treatment facilities, such as the one I currently work in, or surgical treatment facilities, likewise will not allow practitioners clinical privileges to treat or perform surgery, if the practitioner cannot demonstrate to the facility credentialing committee that they have the necessary training AND experience to perform those requested privileges.

Optometrists have an excellent safety record, as evidenced by some of the lowest malpractice insurance rates among healthcare professionals. The groups which oppose HB 103, and the right for optometrists to self-regulate, and practice freely within the limits of their training, are motivated, in my opinion, not by a concern for public safety, but rather, from an unfounded fear that ophthalmology will lose market share in the practice of their medical-surgical specialty, or that

patients will have difficulty determining which providers provide the best eye care. Rest assured, the same forces that currently guide patients who seek out the best providers of eyecare- namely professional reputation in the community, and colleague referrals will continue to operate after HB 103 passes. In my experience, Optometry and Ophthalmology has always worked well together when the providers of each respective profession recognized that they were interdependent, both unique, and complimentary, and when they both practiced synergistically in their respective zones of expertise, interacting in a professional, respectful, amicable, and collegial manner. When the contentious dust over HB 103 settles, and it passes with your support, we will all continue the noble work of providing the very best eye care that we can to our patients. HB 103: Written Testimony of Support for Hearing May 10, 2017

My name is Jeff Gonnason, OD. I was born and raised in Ketchikan & Craig and I was the first Alaska Native optometrist. I have served on the State Optometry Board under two different governors, and as Past President of the Alaska Optometric Association. I have volunteered at the Alaska Native Medical Center and Southcentral Foundation - you have a support letter from Katherine Gottlieb of Southcentral Foundation and other Native groups in your packet. I practice in Anchorage and performed clinics out in the villages in my younger days.

To be absolutely clear, HB 103 does NOT authorize any optometrist to do ANYTHING:

It only updates 40+ year old statutes to allow the optometry board to regulate practice under their <u>sworn duty to protect the public</u>. The same as Alaska Dentists and Advanced Practice Nurses, so that Optometry does not have to return for legislation for every advance in new technology. Of the 4 <u>independent prescribing professions</u>, only optometry has been treated unfairly for so many years. The Alaska Optometry Board deserves to receive the <u>same level of trust and respect</u> as these other health care professions.

This bill authorizes optometry board autonomy — The same as the dental board and advanced practice nursing board:

The Alaska Legislature establishes statutes by which all licensed health care professionals practice, and creates regulatory boards to protect the public by regulating the details of practice. The optometry board would never authorize any practice outside the scope of education and training, and doctors of optometry are held to the same standard of care as any medical provider treating patients. Section 5 of HB 103 is crystal clear on this topic. The optometry practice definition in Section 6 of HB 103 is modeled after the wording of the Alaska Dentistry statute.

• Every one of the ophthalmologists & medical organizations that have testified on this issue for the past 40 years have only the same 2 demeaning arguments:

- 1. Optometrists are a danger to the public.
- 2. Optometry's education is not adequate.

Both of these statements have proven patently untrue.

Optometry education and training is identical to the dentist model with 8-10 years of university level education and residency - Optometrists are "real doctors" the same as Dentists are "real doctors":

4 year professional program after acceptance, with the first 2 years of sciences and final 2 years of clinical experience and passing National Boards. Many also take a 1-2 years additional residency in a specialized area. How optometry and dentistry are different from medical school is that the first 2 years of sciences are similar - in fact optometry & dental & medical students often train together or have the same professors at the universities - but the second 2 years of clinic are different. Because medical school must cover the entire range of the body, more clinic time is spent on the priorities of vital organ systems of heart disease, cancer, stroke, etc. Because the eves and teeth are so specialized, optometry and dental school clinics are mostly devoted to ocular and dental training. Optometry school covers systemic diseases with ocular manifestations such as diabetes or hypertension and to make appropriate referrals, and focuses on treating eye diseases and appropriate use of medications. Alaska optometrists have been prescribing Rx medications for 25 years, including prescribing Rx scheduled narcotics when needed for the past 10 years with zero issues of harm. Alaska optometry also supports limiting opioid use, and will keep the supply limitation in regulation per Section 4 of HB 103.

• The prerequisites for optometry school meet or exceed the requirements for medical school admission:

The Optometry Admission Test (OAT) parallels the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) and the Dental Aptitude Test (DAT). Through the primary care doctoral program in optometry school, the graduate is <u>educated to make professional judgments</u> and is quick to consult with other providers when a patient needs advanced services outside the scope of practice. The opposition claims optometrists "don't go to medical school" but neither do dentists or advanced nurses — they also have their own very specialized education.

• Optometrists are defined as "Physicians" within the federal Center for Medicare:

They are held to the same standard of care as they treat Medicare patients. The malpractice claims for optometry are far lower than other professions, and the Alaska rate is about \$400/year for \$4 Million coverage. There has never been a case of patient harm before the State Optometry Board involving prescriptions or treatment, yet the opposition has testified for over 40 years predicting terrible public harm which has never come true.

• The ophthalmologists are always comparing their advanced sub-specialty education to optometry education:

Optometrist are trained in very few of the procedures that ophthalmologists perform. The clinical education of an optometrist does not have to parallel that of an ophthalmologist any more than the education of a <u>family physician needs to parallel that of a neurosurgeon</u> or heart surgeon. Ophthalmologists are vitally needed, patients need their advanced expertise for cataract surgery, retina surgery, severe trauma, etc. These are all vital secondary and tertiary care <u>conditions that optometrists do not treat and do not propose to treat.</u> It is regretful that the opposition resorts to scare tactics trying to frighten people. <u>Risk of harm to the public has never been an issue with optometry.</u>

Optometry is also vitally needed in Alaska:

Approximately 150 doctors of optometry practice all over Alaska, and serve over 80 remote villages. Optometrists provide the <u>vast majority of primary eye care</u> in Alaska. Local optometrists are called upon with <u>hospital privileges</u> at rural clinics for their expertise. <u>Travel and treatment costs greatly increase when routine eyecare is provided by urban specialists</u>. Alaska needs the best new doctors of optometry, and antiquated state statutes are a barrier to attracting the best and brightest to our state.
