Analysis

This bill changes the minimum operating requirement for alcohol licenses from 30 eight-hour days per year to 240 hours per year.

This bill allows beverage dispensary - tourism licenses (BDL-tourism) to transfer ownership as long as they have maintained a dining facility or kitchens in the majority of their rental rooms, and have maintained the number of rental rooms that were required at the time of initial licensure.

In addition, this bill creates a third category of business that qualifies for a BDL-tourism license: roadhouses, lodges, inns, or similar businesses with 10 or fewer rental rooms that serve food or drink to tourists and the traveling public, are located on a designated Scenic Byway or All-American road, and are more than 25 miles outside the boundary of an incorporated city or a unified municipality.

The Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office does not impact fiscal impact from this legislation.
