





State Libraries, Archives and Museums by Fund Source

Alaska State Libraries, Archives and Museums Library Operations

Statutes: AS 14.56; AS 24.05.135; AS 40.21; AS 40.25.115(e); AS 44.27.020

Regulations: 4 AAC 59; 2 AAC 96.200(c)

Contribution to Department's Mission:

Provides access to information, trains school and public librarians, and preserves the history of the state.

FY2019 Governor's Budget (changes from FY2018 Management Plan):

- \$9.8 (\$0.5 Fed; \$9.3 UGF) salary and health insurance adjustments
- Transfer out \$1,030.0 UGF to the Andrew P. Kashevaroff Facilities Maintenance component for operations and maintenance costs of the Andrew P. Kashevaroff Facility
- (\$135.9) DGF decrement to reduce the School Broadband Access Grants (School BAG) program to align budget with anticipated expenditures

FY2019 Budgeted Positions:

• 25 permanent full-time (PFT) and 1 non-perm

Information Services

- Provides library and reference service to state government;
- Serves as a depository for state and federal publications concerning Alaska;
- Offers consulting services on technical topics to Alaskan libraries, archives and museums;
- Coordinates the Talking Book Center to provide audiobooks and records the official election pamphlets for Alaskans with visual disabilities; and
- Coordinates statewide library projects such as SLED (Statewide Library Electronic Doorway) and is a major participant in the Alaska Library Catalog.

FY2017 Information Services Statistics

- Answered (with the Historical Collections) 21,815 reference questions from state employees, library staff statewide, researchers and the public;
- 832 Alaskans with visual or physical disabilities checked out or downloaded 50,536 audiobooks and magazines, an average of 60.5 items per person;
- A total of 16,447 Alaskans downloaded 401,462 audiobooks and e-books from the Alaska Digital Library, an average of 24.4 items per person;
- On the SLED databases, Alaskans did 7,028,465 searches for proprietary information and accessed over 610,276 full-text articles concerning languages, science, social science, English, arts & music, health, engineering & technology, and math.



Historical Collections

- Contains over 100,000 Alaskan books and serials, microfilmed newspapers from 120 Alaska communities; more than 500,000 photographs; and manuscript collections comprised of personal papers, private diaries and correspondence of a wide variety of Alaskans;
- Continues to digitize images to add to the 18,000 Alaskana photographs on Alaska's Digital Archives at: http://vilda.alaska.edu/cdm/index
- Continues to post sound recordings, videocassettes, and films on the Historical Collection's YouTube channel;
- Participates in the Library of Congress' National Digital Newspaper Project to digitize and make searchable 100,000 pages of pre-1923 Alaskan newspapers;
- Builds relationships with potential donors to continue adding historical materials to the collections; and
- Provides in-depth research assistance and photo duplication services to students and teachers, government employees, genealogists, academic researchers, and authors and publishers.

FY2017 Historical Collections Statistics

- Answered (with Information Services) 21,815 reference questions from state employees, library staff statewide, researchers and the public (an increase from 17,966 in FY2016);
- Added 1,206 Alaska State publications to the collections; and
- Filled 292 requests for 682 high quality photo images.

Library Development

- Provides consulting services to public and school libraries;
- Consults on special topics, such as library grants and statistics, library technology and E-Rate, and summer reading programs and early literacy;
- Supports the Alaska Library Network, which manages the Alaska Digital Library for e-books and audiobooks;
- Provides continuing education (CE) for library staff; and
- Manages a wide range of statewide library services to Alaskans, including books by mail, talking book services, SLED's statewide databases, the Alaska Library Network, and the Ready to Read Resource Center.

FY2017 Library Development Statistics

- Awarded 206 grants totaling \$1,983,677 to 88 libraries and library organizations statewide;
- Answered 3,625 reference questions;
- Made 16 site visits to libraries;
- Offered 99 training workshops, seminars and webinars; and
- Trained 1,539 library staff during these events.

E-Rate

E-Rate consultant:

- Provides support to all of Alaska's 54 public school districts, 7 private schools, 1 state-run school, and 2 education service agencies to obtain E-Rate funding;
- Provides support to 88 public libraries to obtain E-Rate funding;
- Evaluates and verifies School BAG applications; and
- Represents Alaska's needs at national meetings concerning this complex funding program.


Total broadband cost for Alaska schools and libraries during current year

School Broadband Assistance Grants (School BAG)

- Library Development cooperates with the E-Rate consultant to solicit and review School BAG grant applications, process grant awards, solicit grant reports, and request refunds of unspent School BAG money.
- In FY2015, School BAG initially awarded \$4,950,000 to 28 school districts. Awards were prorated at 79%. Some districts were not able to upgrade their internet networks quickly, so the districts returned \$1,277,776 in unspent School BAG funds.
- In FY2016, School BAG awarded \$3,586,170 to 28 school districts. Awards were funded at 100%. A total of \$985,844 in unspent School BAG funds were returned.
- In FY2017, School BAG awarded \$2,470,463 to 28 school districts. Awards were funded at 100%. A total of \$93,342 in unspent School BAG funds were returned.
- In FY2018, School BAG awarded \$2,210,419 to 26 school districts. Awards were funded at 100%. The school districts will file their grant reports in April 2018 and will send refunds in August 2018.

FY2019 Governor's Budget decrement in School BAG funding:

- The FY2019 Governor's Budget contains a decrement of \$135,900 DGF to the School BAG program to align budget with anticipated expenditures.
- The cost of internet in some rural districts is decreasing, so some districts are no longer eligible for School BAG funding because their annual internet costs have fallen below the November 2014 benchmark established by state law (AS 14.03.127).



• Some districts are now able to get more than 10 mbps at a price close to what they were paying in November 2014, so they are choosing to forego School BAG funds in favor of getting more than 10 mbps for their schools. E-Rate still pays the lion's share of their internet costs, so the districts are able to absorb the increased cost of many more mbps without School BAG funds. Their internet needs and the lower cost for internet and E-Rate support have allowed some districts to go beyond the 10 mbps limit of the School BAG program.

In addition to no cell service, all of our public pay phones were removed from town about six years ago. The internet at the public library is the only source of free connectivity, of any kind, for visitors, and fishermen in our area.

New Component for APK Facilities Maintenance:

• \$1,030,000 in unrestricted general funds transferred to a new component called Andrew P. Kashevaroff Facilities Maintenance. Any and all costs related to the operations and maintenance of the APK building will be directly posted to this new component. The benefit to this is that no Reimbursable Services Agreement (RSA) will be necessary to move funds from EED State Facilities Rent to Library Operations to pay these costs.



• In FY2017, the APK was under warranty until May 2017, so the costs for FY2017 came in below the proposed \$1,030,000. In FY2018, we are expecting to use the entire allocation of \$1,030,000 by close of fiscal year.

FY2017-FY2018 Division Highlights

The Alaska State Museums received the 2017 National Metal for Museum and Library Service from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). Nominated by Senator Murkowski, this award is the Nation's highest honor for museums and is a tribute to the State Museum's efforts to help local museums improve their programs and services.

The Division and KTOO recorded 10 lectures by artists, authors, and researchers and posted these *At the APK* television shows on *360 North* http://www.360north.org/at-the-apk/.

The Historical Collections received 34 collections of historic photographs, manuscripts, and other materials from donors, such as a collection of original negatives from the family of Juneau photographer Leonard Delano.

Library Development completed a five-year evaluation of how federal funds from the IMLS were used in Alaska from 2012 to 2017 and then assisted the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries as it wrote a new five year plan on how federal funds from IMLS will be used to develop library services in Alaska from 2018 to 2022.

Library Development worked with the early literacy program at DEED to purchase a statewide contract for access to all of Sesame Street's e-books, which all Alaskans can access for free at: http://sled.alaska.edu.

The Alaska State Archives significantly increased their online presence after working with their database vendor, Minisis, to create an Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). Minisis allows the public to search all unrestricted holdings held by the Archives.
