FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2018 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

BILL NO. HB075

Analysis

HB075 establishes a new gun violence protective order under AS 18.65, *Police Protection*, and requires healthcare providers to report annually by December 31 any serious threat of self-harm or violence against another person involving a gun to the Department of Health and Social Service (AS 18.65.843). The report may not contain any personally identifying information. The department must summarize data in an annual report to the legislature by January 31. The law is repealed February 1, 2020.

The Epidemiology Section of the department would be responsible for implementing the healthcare provider reports of threat. Although temporary, the law would require up to two reporting cycles. The department would have to build and staff a new database to compile the provider reports and create a report to summarize the information. If the intent is for a simple depository of the providers' reports in PDF format, then the cost of the database can be absorbed by the section and does not require an appropriation. Given that the reporting is temporary, the data set being collected is limited, and infrequent annual reporting, estimated staff time to tally the reports would be negligible and could be absorbed within current resources. This is on the understanding that the department is not being asked to analyze or otherwise maintain the information contained in these reports, and that the reports would be accepted as-is when received from the provider. More in-depth analysis would require epidemiologic and advanced statistical capacity the department does not have resources for currently.

Additionally, the department would need regulations to establish reporting guidelines, and prescribe the format and submission process. This will ensure file compatibility and uniformity in order to streamline the posting process and minimize administrative burden on the reporting entities and the department. Regulations will need to be in place by December 2018 in time for the first reporting cycle.
