Out of every 100 adult women who reside in the State of Alaska:


48 experienced intimate partner violence (IPV):

37 experienced sexual violence:



Intimate partner violence (composite)	47.6%	40.4%	9.4%	6.4%
Threats of physical violence	31.0%	25.6%	5.8%	3.0%
Physical violence	44.8%	39.6%	8.6%	5.9%
Sexual violence (composite)	37.1%	33.1%	4.3%	2.9%
Alcohol- or drug-involved sexual assault	26.8%	22.6%	3.6%	2.0%
Forcible sexual assault	25.6%	23.5%	2.5%	1.6%
Any Violence (composite)	58.6%	50.3%	11.8%	8.1%

- Intimate partner violence decreased by 32%.
- Sexual violence decreased by 33%.
- 6,566 fewer women experienced intimate partner violence in 2015 than in 2010.
- 3,072 fewer women experienced sexual violence in 2015 than 2010.
