Analysis

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This legislation directs the University of Alaska Board of Regents to establish a foundational curriculum for first year lower division courses to ensure credits are transferable between programs within the university. In establishing the foundational curricula, the Regents shall consult each campus director; evaluate transferability of all lower division courses offered; identify major areas of study based on workforce demand and academic need; publicly disclose criteria used to evaluate foundational criteria and major areas of study; describe foundational courses, credits and completion standards for each program by area of study; regularly update foundational criteria as necessary; provide technical assistance to each campus with regard to implementation of foundational curriculum and credit transferability; annually report to the legislature on the implementation, success, course transfer rates and any associated cost-savings to students.			
The fiscal impact of this legislation cannot be determined at this time. The Board of Regents has established policies on academic program integration (10.04.010), general education requirements (10.04.040), and transfer of credit (10.04.060).			
Establishing common curricula for general education requirements, integrating programming across the system, eliminating duplication, responding to shifting state needs, and accommodating the many students who take courses from more than one campus, are all top priorities of the board. It is in the interests of both the university and its students, to provide the maximum articulation possible between programs and campuses.			

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
