### WHY THE CENSUS MATTERS FOR ALASKA

- Determines federal funding allocations to over 70 programs
- Maintaining federal funding is critical in light of state and local budget gaps
- Organizations across the public, private, and nonprofit sectors rely on accurate census data



of annual federal funding allocations within Alaska are determined by Census data "Private sector businesses rely on accurate Census Bureau data to help us determine how and when to invest in the many Alaskan communities we serve. #### **Threats to an Accurate Count in 2020**

- Geographic barriers
  - Census Bureau will not conduct P.O. box outreach to remote Alaskans in 2020
- Language barriers
  - Census forms and other materials will not be translated into Alaska Native languages
- Barriers to connectivity
  - 2020 Census will be the first to push online responses
- Prevalence of historically hard-to-count populations

#### **Mapping Hard-to-Count Tracts**



Alaska will be one of the hardest states to count in the 2020 Census.

### **EFFECTS OF AN UNDERCOUNT IN 2020**

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Reduced federal funding that compounds state and local budget gaps Lack of accurate data to plan and invest in communities across the state



Reduction in essential services like road repairs, education, etc.

#### **Fewer Resources for the 2020 Count**

- Slow ramp-up of federal funding and the ongoing government shutdown have created uncertainty about the sufficiency of federal resources
- Fewer Partnership Program staff have been hired
- Communications materials won't be ready until late 2019
- States across the country are allocating resources to fill gaps in federal funding and help ensure an accurate count
