Analysis

This legislation expands the mandatory sentencing range for a first-time conviction for vehicle theft in the first degree. This bill places the sentencing floor at 120 days and a ceiling at two years of incarceration. Increased penalties in felony cases often result in increases in contested hearings.
Cases with increased penalties require more litigation throughout all stages of litigation, but particularly increase jury trials, contested sentencing hearings, and post-conviction litigation.
The Agency cannot predict the number of vehicle theft cases which would also be first time felonies for clients appointed counsel. The Office of Public Advocacy, therefore, submits an indeterminate fiscal note subject to review of estimates from the Department of Law on potential caseload impacts.
