Chief Administrative Law Judge (2014-present)

Appointed by Governor Parnell. Oversee the operations and management of the State's central panel of administrative law judges (Anchorage and Juneau), who hear cases in more than 80 categories. This includes: developing policies and procedures; supervising the office; employing judges and staff; establishing case management and performance standards; managing the budget; providing peer review and training for judges; conducting alternative dispute resolution; hearing cases and writing decisions; considering complaints alleging violations of the Code of Hearing Officer Conduct (applicable to all state hearing officers and administrative law judges); and reporting to the Governor and Legislature on the activities of the office. The chief's duties also include monitoring State agencies' administrative hearing processes and reviewing their hearing-related regulations; providing training to executive branch adjudicators; and recommending changes in the law to improve administrative adjudications.

Selected Accomplishments:

- restructured support staff to increase efficiency;
- selected, designed, and implemented the roll out of a computerized case management system (allows OAH to track and monitor case due dates and achieve a paperless file for high-volume cases);
- created an unpaid intern program to provide law clerking support and achieve greater productivity per dollar of budget;
- spearheaded a pilot project which resulted in an automatic mediation program. This
 medication program lowered the cost of the Medicaid services hearings, saved hundreds
 of thousands of dollars in agency costs, and won a Denali award for cost-savings
 initiative in 2016;
- reduced and then eliminated OAH's significant backlog of cases from 2014-2017. In 2017, OAH for the first time in its thirteen-year history finished the calendar year with no overdue cases:

- began an outreach program to municipalities and school districts to supply hearing officer
 and mediation services on an as-needed basis, generating additional income and fulfilling
 those entities' need for cost-efficient hearing officer and mediation services. The
 referrals from these entities quintupled in two years as word spread of OAH's low-cost,
 high quality, and timely services;
- prepared an ALJ training manual for new ALJs to decrease the amount of time needed for a new ALJ to come up to speed;
- began using contracts and part-time work to create flexible capacity to respond nimbly to spikes or dips in caseload; and
- collaborated with DOA-IT in 2018 to develop new software to allow OAH to have the best online research tool for administrative decisions of any central panel in the United States.
