Subject: ACoA Letter of Support, SB 10

Dear Senator Kawasaki:

The Alaska Commission on Aging (ACOA) is pleased to offer support for SB 10, to extend the "Statewide Suicide Prevention Council" to June 30, 2027. Alaska has one of the highest rates of suicide in the U.S., and among older Alaskans specifically, there is a high rate of suicide. According to 2017 data from the Alaska Bureau of Health Analytics and Vital Records, Alaska's age-adjusted suicide rate for people age 65+ is 27.3, twenty-five percent higher than the age-adjusted suicide rates for older Americans at 19.7. Nationally, elderly white men have the highest risk of suicide with a rate of 32 suicides per 100,000 each year, using firearms as the most common means to complete this act (National Institute of Mental Health, 2016). Although older adults attempt suicide less often than those in other age groups, they have a higher completion rate.

The higher rate of senior suicide in Alaska parallels the higher risk of suicide among younger Alaskans. While reasons for the higher rates of suicide among Alaskan seniors are not completely known, there is some evidence to suggest that colder, darker northern climates are more conducive to depression, which is one of the leading causes of suicide. Depression in older people often goes untreated as it may be more difficult for seniors to access behavior health care in many Alaskan communities while others view depression as a "normal part of aging." In addition, Alaskans age 65+ self-report higher rates of binge drinking, obesity, and frequent mental distress than seniors in the lower 48. These behavioral health conditions may contribute to depression and the higher rates of senior suicide in Alaska (Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey).

The Statewide Suicide Prevention Council created a Statewide Suicide Prevention Plan, 2018-2022 that is intended to be custom-fit to each community and group. Strategy 2.7 of the Suicide Prevention Plan recommends that senior service providers should become familiar with the warning signs of suicide as well as risk factors for suicide such as substance abuse, violence, and depression. Senior centers and other senior service settings offer a primary environment for seniors to address those conditions and feelings, as well as their feelings about suicide. Strategy 3.7 of that plan recommends the state and communities participate in efforts to de-stigmatize suicide and improve access to treatment in order to prevent mental health crises. Seniors do not always access behavioral health services that are provided in community settings and are more likely than younger individuals to live in isolation and choose not to seek help.

The Statewide Suicide Prevention Council is working towards breaking the silence and stigma surrounding the problem of suicide in Alaska that are contributing to suicide and preventing people from accessing the help they need. This work needs to continue to effect change and turn the curve in Alaska. The Commission supports the work of the Statewide Suicide Prevention Council and appreciates your leadership on SB 10.

Dear Mr. Jimmie:

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN), I am sending this letter to support the Alaska Native Health Board's (ANHB) efforts to amend SB 10 "An Act extending the termination date of the Statewide Suicide Prevention Council; and providing for an effective date," through the addition of a representative to be nominated by ANHB and its Tribal Behavioral Health Directors Committee. Suicide prevention, education, and awareness have been priorities of AFN for many years. AFN representative William Martin serves as a Vice Chair for the Statewide Suicide Prevention Council (SSPC). We fully support the continuation of the SSPC and the work of ANHB.

AFN is the largest statewide Native organization in Alaska. Our membership includes all 12 regional for-profit corporations, all 12 regional non-profit organizations, 171 for-profit village corporations, 191 federally recognized tribes, and several tribal consortia that contract and compact to run federal and state programs. Our mission is to enhance and promote the cultural, economic and political voice of the entire Alaska Native community. AFN serves as the principle forum and voice of the Alaska Native community in dealing with critical issues of public policy and government.

Alaska Natives and American Indians are the only ethnic population specifically listed as at-risk for suicide by SAMHSA. Since suicide disproportionately affects Alaska Natives and American Indians, AFN supports ANHB's efforts to add a seat to the SSPC to include a subject matter expert in prevention who has program experience in the tribal health system. The individual's knowledge and experience would add tremendous value to the work of the SSPC. Suicide is preventable, and an additional tribal representative on the SSPC would be a critical resource in providing a unique perspective to promote resiliency and raise awareness.

Dear Legislators,

The Juneau Suicide Prevention Coalition is writing in strong support of House Bill 22 to extend the State Suicide Prevention Council (SSPC) until June 30, 2027. It is critical that the important work of the SSPC be reauthorized and funded throughout this time period.

The suicide rate in Alaska continues to be extremely high. In 2017, Alaska's suicide rate was the second highest in the country. The problem of suicide continues to escalate in our state; our suicide rate increased by 13% in the period from 2012 to 2017. Suicide is the leading cause of death among Alaskans ages 10 to 64, and the sixth leading cause of death overall in our state. Given the severity and magnitude of suicide in Alaska, it is essential that our state continue to dedicate resources to support suicide prevention strategies.

The SSPC has been an excellent resource to help guide statewide suicide prevention efforts, including those efforts by our Coalition in Juneau over the past ten years. The recently revised "State of Alaska Suicide Prevention Plan" 2018-2022, "Recasting the Net – Promoting Wellness to Prevent Suicide in Alaska" provides a framework for suicide prevention from the individual to community to statewide levels. Council members come from a cross-section of our population to ensure representation of different perspectives. The statewide prevention summits the State Council has co-sponsored were especially valuable for building relationships between our widespread communities and fostering collaboration and resource sharing.

Suicide is a complex public health problem. The SSPC has been instrumental in fostering communication to break the silence and stigma surrounding the difficult social problems contributing to suicide and preventing people in distress from receiving the help they need. There are many challenges and much work ahead. The SSPC has built a solid foundation for continuing and expanding the good work of Alaskan communities to find the best ways to nurture healthy citizens who value life and can be part of a healthy Alaska. Please continue to authorize and fund the State Suicide Prevention Council.
