She has cluster allergies to include entire food/plant families. When she was a baby, I was unable to nurse her. She had allergic reactions to donor milk due to the foods eaten and passed through the donor Mom's milk. She was also allergic to ALL infant formulas here in the United States. When she was 3 months old, one of my Aunts found a formula out of Germany that would ship to Alaska for me to try with her. It was expensive, but my baby was able to eat without having a horrible allergic reaction. When she was just over a year old, I tried her on regular milk from the store. She had an allergic reaction. I tried her on organic milk from the store, she had an allergic reaction. I tried her on lactose free milk from the store. She had an allergic reaction. It seemed like my nightmare with milk for her, would never end. It didn't make sense to me, because the formula she was on from Germany, was cows milk formula! So, I started looking into local farm shares. I found our first farm share for goat milk. We were with that farm share for just over a year and it was amazing for both of my children! Neither one had issues with their stomachs hurting and my baby, now almost 4, wasn't having any allergic reactions. We got to know our farm share, knew exactly what they were feeding so I didn't have to worry about an allergic reaction due to cross contamination in their feed. We have been with our current farm share for 2.5 years for raw goat and Jersey cow milk, plus added another child to consume the raw milk. We get chicken eggs through the farm share that I don't have to worry about causing an allergic reaction in my middle daughter and have 4 ducks of our own that also reside at the farm. It had made a world of difference in my family's life, having the wonderful love and care given into the attention to details of the amazing family that we have our farm share with in Meadow Lakes, Alaska.

Because of low nutrient intake his growth and emotional development was greatly hindered, but worse and more concerning was his physical condition. His bowels were not working properly and his blood sugars would not stabilize. He was rarely well and sleep was fitful and filled with night terrors including screaming, hitting, and crying. It was terrifying and heart wrenching. At some point I felt inspired to have him drink raw goats milk, a whole food filled with live bacteria (that support a healthy gut bacteria balance) and helps to keep bowels working properly. Dear House Finance Committee,

I run a small herd share operation with two cows. At present, there are approximately fifty members in my herd share. I would welcome the opportunity to make raw milk products for my herd share members for several reasons.

First, making raw milk products during my cows' peak milk production would allow me to have fewer herd share members. Less people means less for me to manage every day. Matching the members picking up milk daily to the milk supply takes a great deal of attention. When the cows are at peak production, I am generally at my busiest. Finding and educating new herd share members is time consuming. I hesitate to put on additional people when I know the milk production will be dropping off within a few months. Due to the nature of raw milk and the lack of insurance available to producers, I want to know my customers. They are hand-picked for the most part. This takes time as well, but I feel it is worth the effort in the long run.

Secondly, being able to make product would help me develop a plan for moving forward. There is a giant chasm between running a raw milk herd share and building a Grade A facility. Being able to make foods such as yogurt, cheese, and butter would help me better understand both the skill set needed and how my herd share members feel about those products.

Lastly, I believe a farmer needs to lead by example. By making excellent raw milk products, I can show my herd share members what is possible. Additionally, when members make milk products, they are actually increasing their own food security. Raw milk is highly perishable, but many milk products are stable and capable of storing for a long period of time. It's a win-win situation.

Greetings to the members of the House Finance Committee (Co-Chair Representatives Foster and Wilson, Vice-Chair Representative Johnston, and Representatives Ortiz, Josephson, Knopp, LeBon, Tilton, Merrick, Sullivan-Leonard, and Carpenter):

Thank you for devoting your time to consider HB 16, which would expand the definition of herd share to allow value-added products such as yogurt, kefir, cheese, etc. in addition to fluid milk. Pete Kennedy from Farm-to-Consumer Legal Defense Fund stated the legal opinion that "if a person has the right to choose to drink raw milk (which Alaskans do, through herd share), that person should also have the right to have their milk made into the product of their choice, by the person of their choosing."

As herd share farmer/producers ourselves, we are very much in support of HB 16. Broadening the terms of herd share to include other dairy products such as kefir, yogurt, and cheese would be a 3-way win.

Win #1: Dairy producers inevitably see a surplus of milk from spring through fall, and a shortage in the winter. It's a perennial challenge to figure out ways to balance out that uneven supply, and one of the best ways for a goat farmer to put away the maximum amount of milk in the least amount of space is to make it into chèvre (goat cheese) and put it in the freezer for use through the winter when fluid milk production is down. If a herd share farmer could legally market even that one item to herd share members, the added value in "farmer math" would equate to being able to purchase an extra bale of hay from each gallon of milk produced.

Win #2: Consumers would benefit by having more locally made products available. One of the reasons herd share is continually gaining in popularity is that a growing number of Alaskans want to know where their food comes from, and keep the food chain as short as possible. Google "Locavore Movement" and you'll find many websites devoted to this concept. Whenever people taste the cheese we make from our goat milk, the first thing they say (after "Wow!!") is "Can I buy this cheese from you?" My answer is always "Sadly, no, it's not legal in Alaska, even via herd share". It would be wonderful for consumers to have a legitimate avenue to obtain fresh locally made cheese, yogurt, and other value-added dairy products.

Win #3: Because these products would be within the restrictions of herd share, the closed-loop scenario that the DEC values remains intact. Herd share producers keep records and contact info for their consumers, and can easily communicate with them as needed. By the same token, there is a direct line of communication from consumer back to producer in the event of any issues or problems. Unlike public sales at a farmers' market, the traceability would remain unchanged under the terms of HB 16.

Please give your support to HB 16. It will lay the groundwork to solidify and protect the legal standing of herd share and provide an on-going benefit to both producers and consumers of local dairy products.
