## STATE OF ALASKA 2019 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

### **Analysis**

This bill extends the same free annual Alaska State Parks camping pass now available under AS 16.05 to Alaska National Guardsmen and military reservists, and to Alaska veterans rated as at least 50 percent disabled, to all Alaskans receiving compensation from a government agency for being at least 50 percent disabled, or who have an affidavit from a physician declaring them to be at least 50 percent disabled.

The free camping passes available under current law are biennial permits issued in odd years, that expire at the end of even years. The department issued 2,195 such permits in the two years ending December 31, 2018, about the same as in the previous biennium.

The average overnight fee at a state campground is \$15 per night. Those now qualifying for free camping permits use them an average of three times a year, staying an average of three nights each time, for a total of 19,755 overnight stays. The impact of the current statute is: 2,195 biennial passes \* \$15 \* 3 stays \* 3 nights/stay = \$265.3 reduction in state revenue in FY 18. It also costs about \$500 a year to produce the free pass decals.

In comparison, fee-paying campers spent about 41,390 overnight stays in Alaska State Park campgrounds, generating \$620.8 in revenue in FY18.

Estimating the bill's fiscal impact on the department is not possible without more precise and meaningful eligibility criteria. Based the 2016 data that is the most recently available, the Centers for Disease Control estimate that of the 435,598 Alaskans aged 18 or older, approximately 19.2 percent -- 83,634 -- have some sort of disability, whether cognitive, hearing, mobility, vision, self-care, or independent living. However, the CDC data show that approximately 8.8 percent, or 38,332 Alaskans, have just a mobility disability.

It is also not possible to estimate how many disabled non-veteran Alaskans would apply for free camping permits under this bill, or how often they might use them. Regardless, because making free camping passes available to an unknown additional number of people will reduce department revenue by some amount, the department submits an indeterminate fiscal note.
