Can Economic Policies Reduce Deaths of Despair
Dow, Godoey, Lowenstein and Reich, NBER WP 25787

- Rising mortality rates among less educated americans, driven by increases in so-called "deaths of despair"
 - Drugs, suicides, alcohol
 - Suicides up 33% 1999 2017
- This paper: effects of economic policies (EITC, minimum wage) on drug, suicide deaths for adults with high school or less

- We use data from the CDC all deaths 1999 2015
- No effects of either policy on drug-related deaths
- Economic policies significantly affect suicide rates





- Effects larger for women, young adults
 - More likely to work minimum wage jobs
- 10% higher minimum wages reduce non-drug suicides among Americans with high school or less by 3.6%

Parental Labor Suppy: Evidence From Minimum Wage Changes Godoey, Reich and Allegretto, IRLE WP #103-19

- 30% of minimum wage workers have children
- Could higher wages enable parents to overcome barriers to employment, such as childcare costs?

Key findings

- lacktriangleright Higher minimum wages ightarrow higher employment rates, more hours, less welfare receipt
- This results in significant reductions in child poverty
- Effects of 10% increase in MW on children of mothers with HS or less:
 - All ages: poverty down 5.9%
 - Children of single mothers: poverty down 11%
 - Preschool age children: poverty down 9.7%
