Last time I was serving on a statewide board I had a training on building community consensus. I was told that 80% of Alaskans are in the middle of most issues, punctuated by 10% on the far right and 10% on the far left. My job was to do what was best for Alaska, as represented by the 80% in the middle. I share that with you, too. I have been affected by Alaska's politics since statehood, and sometimes it has been pretty rough and tumble. We are a lively state, with strong opinions. I do not disagree with Governor Dunleavy that we must have a budget which balances income and expenses. Without placing blame on anyone, I believe we are out of kilter now. Discipline is essential. I do disagree that we can do this in one year. It has taken us decades to get so out of control. However, Alaskans are unique in our coping skills, and also very creative. I look forward to the opportunities to improve what we do in all areas of our budget. I believe the budget which was passed through the Legislative process and given to the Governor in June was thoughtfully prepared. We all know (and agree) that Alaska has to be "open for business" and we need new revenue streams. Those thoughts excite me! My job is to feed people in Alaska who have lost their jobs or had difficulties so severe they need to rely on local food banks. When we have a healthy

economy and lots of jobs available, this food bank does not have as many people to feed. The income stream for the Fairbanks Community Food Bank has been carefully crafted over the years to rely on individual and corporate donations (not government) and earned income in our building (rental space). When individual donors are laid off work and the commercial space rental vacancy rate is growing, our agency funding strategy does not work. Less than 5% of our budget comes through government grants. We work in partnership with our local Borough and State in the Health and Social Services Community Matching Grant process. That is a small grant in Fairbanks which serves, literally, thousands of local people through a highly accountable process. Both the Senate and House loved the partnerships and leveraging of State and Borough funds and included it in their budgets. It is a grant which has been in place over 30 years and has a history of excellence. It has proven to be a very good investment. Please consider putting that back into the State budget. The \$30,000 this food bank receives in that grant process helps us leverage over a million dollars (and 3 million dollars of inkind donations) of local and corporate support so that we can continue to receive free food (salvage 2-5 TONS of food each day from local grocery stores and individual donors) and give it away free to the people who can't afford to buy food today. We also provide surplus food for Meals on Wheels and Rescue Mission and our local Breadline, and 100 other local agencies who have food needs. Thank you for listening (again) and thanks to the Fairbanks legislators who have been part of our local program for 37 years. Let's all be excited about the positive changes which can be made because of this lively debate in Alaska, and let's rely on group wisdom to get us through this tough discussion.

My understanding is that the Permanent Fund was established to provide for Alaska when the oil revenues tapered off in the future and that historically about half of the earnings have been used to pay a dividend and the other half of the earnings were used to inflation proof the fund. But the Governor's recent vetoes to a bipartisan budget that was painstakingly developed have made me feel like I no longer belong, that my family is no longer valued, and that my expertise or the University for which I work is no longer welcome.

I support appropriating a permanent fund dividend of \$1,600, particularly if it means the opportunity to restore funds for critical services vetoed by the Governor. I know there are many Alaskans who rely on the PFD, but it is also clear from the overwhelming response to the Governor's vetoes that we also need a viable University of Alaska, healthcare benefits for the most vulnerable as well as veterans and seniors, the AK Emergency Alert System and public broadcasting more broadly, active arts & culture programs supported by the AK State Council on the Arts, Alaska legal services such as domestic violence legal aid, support of headstart programs and those that support Alaska's homeless. Thank you for taking the time to thoughtfully consider the budget issues facing Alaska, and for not giving up after the first unsuccessful attempt to override the Governor's vetoes. I'm writing to offer my comments as you look at HB 2001. To provide context, I am a lifelong resident of Alaska, have been an Alaska public school teacher for 20 years, received my Master's degree at UAS, and am currently enrolled in the Educational Leadership Program at UAA.

First, I appreciate the difficult work the Legislature has already done to reduce state spending, not in isolation, but actively soliciting the input of Alaskans, and considering short term and long term economic impacts.

I believe that providing a large dividend at the expense of education and other essential services across Alaska makes no fiscal sense. One purpose of government is to achieve together what we cannot do separately, especially in the face of the geographical and economic challenges unique to our state. The permanent fund dividend should be a bonus, not the tail that wags the dog and holds Alaska hostage to bad fiscal policy. By adequately funding programs like early childhood education, public education, and the university system, we are investing in the future of Alaska far more than a cash payout will do. In my experience as a public school teacher, I have witnessed the Alaska Performance Scholarship do two important things: keep high achieving graduates in state for college, and encourage students who would not consider college within their reach go on to successfully attend a variety of post-secondary programs.

Dear House legislative representatives,

I am appalled by the leadership direction of Gov Dunleavy, who insists on holding our state hostage over the promise of an oversized dividend we cannot afford. It is not the only promise he made while campaigning for Governor. I am in favor of HB 2001 for reasons I list in the last paragraph of this testimony. But first, I must expose the hypocrisy of this governor and the reason we're in this dire situation.

During his campaign for governor, Mike Dunleavy offered voters a pleasing picture of larger Permanent Fund Dividends, more criminals in jail, better schools and painless budget cuts of \$400 million to \$500 million that no one would notice.

He falsely claimed the state had 2,000 empty but funded jobs that could be cut to save \$200 million. He claimed the state could save \$100 million with a voluntary plan to consolidate school district health care plans. He claimed that making Medicaid more efficient would save \$150 million.

He now claims that what he said during his campaign about those painless \$400 million to \$500 million budget cuts was wrong because he didn't understand enough about the state budget. Yes, a former Alaskan Senator claiming he didn't understand what the drop in the price of oil means to Alaska's revenue stream! **Any member of the public** has easy access to state Department of Revenue information showing that a \$1 per barrel drop in the price of oil meant a loss of about \$75 million a year in revenue. It's nonsense to claim you didn't have enough access to the inside workings of government.

What Alaska needs now is a reasonably-sized PFD which affords our legislators (yes, YOU!) the ability to make strategic cuts to the budget that will not drain the Permanent Fund unsustainably, cripple Alaska's economy and gut essential services that Alaskans depend on (HeadStart, the UA system, Medicaid, State Council of the Arts, AK Legal Services to name a few).

I might add that I am extremely disappointed that the Legislature continues to ignore potential sources of revenue from Alaska's oil industry - who continue to make record profits and support many high-paying jobs for non-residents. In my opinion, the forgiveness of \$1.2 billion of oil taxes through the oil production tax credits is not working for Alaskans. SB21 is not fulfilling the promise of 1 million barrels, so clearly the subsidy is not worth it. Stop the oil production tax credit.

Subject: ERA for Permanent Fund Dividends

Dear Members of the House Finance Committee:

I am writing to comment on the current budget crisis brought about by the refusal of the administration's refusal to consider the budget set forth by the Legislature and insist on a poorly conceived budget that eliminates valuable state services and provides for unsustainable permanent fund dividend payments. I have lived in Alaska since 1959. I attended Alaska schools through my primary and secondary education and attended one semester at the Juneau Community College before attaining my undergraduate and law degrees in the lower 48.

I came back to Alaska after law school, in part, because I had taken out student loans from the State for both undergraduate school and law school. By returning home I could get part of my student loans forgiven under the loan program as it existed then. Ultimately 50% of the principal was forgiven and I repaid the remaining amounts. Some may scoff at the idea of loan forgiveness; however, that program was partially responsible for me returning home. In the intervening 60 years we have seen our society transformed by technology and the" information age". The most competitive individuals in this world will be the best educated yet the governor and his staff put no value on competitiveness as they gut the State's educational systems. In short, the Governor and his administration are essentially refusing to invest in the citizens of this State.

My name is Dede Allen; I am writing to you as an Anchorage resident and super-voter. I realize most of you are not my "representative", but I humbly ask that you consider my thoughts anyway. I am an Alaskan who cares deeply about the place I call home. I'm a life-long registered Republican and I have lived in Alaska since 1994.

I have been given a furlough notice by the University and am awaiting the effects of the "financial exigency" status that UA's Board of Regents is sure to approve. It's very possible that my department will be cut and that I will be out of a job if this situation isn't curbed quickly." I will be one of those people who would have to leave the state for employment in my field. We are the richest state in the union, so I find this a particularly bitter pill to swallow. I own a house, contribute positively to the community through my purchases, volunteerism and as a solid - tax paying citizen.

Here is an excerpt from a short paper written by Mouhcine Guettabi, associate professor of economics at the Institute of Social and Economic Research, and Nolan Klouda, executive director of the University of Alaska Center for Economic Development, explaining the economic impact of the Governor's Line Item Vetoes...."Jobs in state government or the university are held by residents who often own homes and send children to local schools. Additionally, the majority of university employees compete in national markets. When they are laid off, they will not be taking other jobs in Alaska, they will need to leave to find employment in their fields. The likelihood of out-migration is high, which can affect housing prices

I think this issue is a four legged stool. Don't work this plan from a "cut" side only; this makes no sense in a state where there is no income or sales tax **AND** you PAY people to live here (PFD).

1. Revenue – PFD – <u>TAKE PART OF IT</u>! It may be the "people's money", but there is value to the services that all residents benefit from that should also be considered as payment to the

people. I worry about the people hanging out on the street corners who are already inebriated/high or sleeping it off in the bushes; we have an addiction & homeless crisis in Anchorage and adding \$3,000 to the mix will only fan that flame. If we all understand that Alaska residents own the sub-surface rights to the gas/oil and that we are due a "pay-out" from that, why does it have to all be in the form of cash? Why can't a portion of that pay-out be in the form of vital public services for the "common wealth" of our community? **3.** Re-visit the oil tax credits – I know the least about this topic. I feel strongly that you have to create a stable & uncomplicated environment for companies to stay and continue to invest. They're in business to make money, of which we all benefit from. <u>IF</u>, their deal is truly a bad deal for Alaska, then adjust it, <u>BUT DON'T</u> get greedy and think they have to make up the balance of this mess we're in. The oil companies are incredibly generous with support through donations, corporate sponsorships and volunteerism.

4. Modest reductions or phase outs of programs (e.g. below)

**a.** I think it's unconscionable that the most vulnerable of our elder population got notice the day before their benefits were cut. REALLY? I can see saying we can't continue this program and not accepting any more new applicants.

I support HB 2001, although believe that an even smaller dividend would be better for Alaska in the long run. The 1982 formula it has used must be revised. It is also high time that we return to the state income tax such as we paid from 1963 to 1980.

During my 58 year Alaska residency the state has grown and matured, weathering the early challenges of statehood, the 1964 and other earthquake, volcanic eruptions, recessions, and other hard times. Also it has grown and matured with many important gains, such as the University of Alaska system and its campuses in towns like Homer and Kodiak. However we have relied too heavily on the oil companies' revenues. So we are at a crisis point.

It is hard to understand the desire for a \$3000 PFD when it throws out so many essential services in exchange. Some of the Governor's vetoes in order to give every qualified Alaskan comes at far too great damage to the state. I wonder about whether there have been outside influences with this PFD and its accompanying draconian budget cuts.

Our governor met with our President and 12 newly elected Governors on or about November 12, then again on May 24 at JBR aboard Air Force 1 and again on June 27 at JBR. As our president has said, he loves uneducated people. Could it be that our governor does too, people without college degrees or career centers, not to mention very young ones, and K-12

children in classes with 40 and more students?

We know our president does not "believe" in Climate Change and has gone to extremes to assure its continuation and acceleration. The International Arctic Research Center is part of the University of Alaska Fairbanks. It attracts climate and other scientists from around the world. Fairbanks Republican Representative Steve Thompson in his July 12 testimony remarked that he had heard from individuals in two foreign countries questioning the rationale about the attempt to damage or destroy this research center. Once again, could there have been some conversation about this Center between our Governor and president? Save the University system!

The incredibly destructive vetoes and cuts to education in Alaska potentially harm everything else in Alaska. From Head Start, a proven boost for pre-kindergarten children to the University of Alaska and its campuses must be nearly entirely restored. Without that, we have killed the future of Alaska as a viable state.

Secondly, the cuts to Medicaid make no sense as long as we receive so much more federal money for it so it is hard to understand the mind that created this, be it Arduin or Dunleavy. These cuts could start a domino effect that results in the closing of smaller rural hospitals including our essential and excellent South Peninsula Hospital. Cuts to Medicaid should be drastically reduced to levels that the House accepted earlier. Include in that a restoration of the reduction of the Medicaid dental coverage.

The VPSO program is vital, missing in too many villages. It asked a great deal from the individuals, and now not all positions are filled. I am not happy with the Feds going in but public safety is sorely at risk in the villages now. Some funds must be sent to save the program.

The mean-spirited veto of the #334,700 of the Alaska Court System must be restored in its entirety. It is a drop in the bucket of this cesspool of vetoes and cuts.

The most essential state wide part of Arts and Culture is the state funding for public broadcasting, including TV and radio stations. The \$2.7 cut must be restored. It is the tie that binds all of us Alaskans together. Aside from the emergency and national news that is so important to us, its cut leaves many thousands of Alaskans in islands of silence.

The cuts to Public Assistance are also mean-spirited, harming seniors, needy, aged, blind and disabled Alaskans. Also homeless. It was shocking to discover that here in Homer we had 10 High School students who were homeless, couch surfing and sleeping in cars. How can such a tragedy be occurring here? I dread how the situation is in Anchorage.

Why on earth were any funds removed from Agriculture? How and why were cuts made to marketing (Grown in Alaska) and the state's veterinarian, and the farm-to prison program? Please restore these entirely.

Defunding the Ocean Ranger cruise ship pollution inspection which is entirely funded by the cruise ship industry! is inexplicable. It affects us here in Homer with our fisheries and the health of Kachemak Bay at risk. Like the funds for infrastructure with roads that must be done asap, it makes no sense at all. Please restore the Ocean Ranger program in its entirety.

I'm aware that not all these essential items that affect every Alaskan can be restored, but please do what you can to make sure that our state is not completely destroyed beyond recovery. I wanted to share with you the difference that a strong university system as well as the presence of a regional medical education program has had in my life.

I came to Alaska at 17 years old. At the time I was an emancipated minor and traveled north to define myself and my future. I was a high school dropout and needless to say that particular status left many doors in my life closed. However, while working fulltime I was able to complete my high school education through University of Alaska Anchorage while attending school part time. Known as the UAA Adult Learning center this program was based out of an otherwise unassuming building on Minnesota drive that now houses an urgent care center. Over time this program whether due to budget changes or just changes in the university's mission no longer exists but was pivotal in opening that first door that has ushered me to where I am today.

After recognizing my ability to succeed academically and after several more years in the work force, I decided to pursue an undergraduate degree with the end goal of practicing medicine, ideally here in the state of Alaska. While working fulltime at the Alaska Psychiatric Institute I was able to complete my undergraduate work in natural sciences with a minor in psychology – graduating magna cum laude with leadership honors. Working with some of Alaska's most vulnerable populations at API gave me a passion for mental health, an appreciation for the fragile yet eloquently constructed human form and an appreciate for the hardiness, resiliency and resourcefulness of my fellow Alaskans. These experiences coupled with my passion for the brain, nervous system and mental health have set my course to that of psychiatry and I hope that several years from now I will be returning to the state of Alaska to address the mental health needs of our population.

In 2017, I was afforded the incredible opportunity to be a member of the entering class of WWAMI medical students. The opportunity to train in Alaska within a top ten medical school is really a dream come true. Further, the class itself is composed of 19 of the finest individuals that I have ever had the pleasure of knowing. They are truly Alaska's best and brightest students. I am continually humbled by each and every one of them. Without the University of Alaska system, I am confident that I would not have the good fortune of being where I am today (and Alaska would likely have one less psychiatrist in the pipeline). This university system as well as the WWAMI program allows the brightest stars to

While I recognize that there are enormous funding challenges for our state in the coming years. Dear House Finance Committee Members,

I am writing this letter in protest of Governor Dunleavy's vetoes to the proposed 2020 Alaska State Budget. Alaska's Permanent Fund Dividend was created during an oil boom. We are 50 years past the oil boom. We need to make a different plan. The proverb, "don't put all your eggs in one basket" is something that may help us here. As a state, we need alternate sources of revenue and energy.

Cuts to Education, Public Radio, health care, law enforcement... Living in a place with your proposed budget cuts sounds like living in a 3<sup>rd</sup> world country. The single easiest way to cut costs down the line with crime, homelessness, psychiatric problems, drug problems, and all the other social welfare issues that cost huge amounts of money each year, is by investing more money in children, before they start having problems. Everything you take away today is bigger trouble down the road.

## Conclusion

I understand the goal to balance the budget, but these drastic cuts are way too much, way too fast, and it will devastate the Alaskan Economy. This will lead our best and brightest out of state, furthering our problems into the future. I am against HB 2001 as taking any part of the PFD is an unfair tax on every man, woman and child. The PFD does not belong to the state to spend. It's very simple...HB 2001 does not conform to statute and the legislature needs to follow the statutes.

AS 43.23.005 establishes a contractual relationship between the State of Alaska and individuals who meet certain conditions prescribed in that statute. This is a 'valid' contract according to the principles of business law because there is 'consideration' on both sides of the contract:

Meeting the requirements of AS 43.23.005 is the 'consideration' individuals provide,

The amount determined under AS 43.23.025 is the 'consideration' provided by the State.

The legislature has breached that contract by appropriating less than the prescribed amount for the past 3 years. That contract requires the State to pay approximately \$3000 to eligible individuals this October.

The legislature would be breaching that contract again if it appropriated the amount described in HB 2001. Breaching a contract by ignoring statutes would be considered 'neglect of duty'.

AS 15.45.510. Grounds for recall. The grounds for recall are (1) lack of fitness, (2) incompetence, (3) NEGLECT OF DUTIES, or (4) corruption.

Let me tell you how this will impact me and people I love...

The Aleutians East is a remote school district which has already heart breakingly had to close two schools in the past 7 years. While one of these communities fights to increase their numbers with dreams of re-opening their doors, and a third community struggles to increase enrollment, these cuts will be targeting primarily rural, native communities. These cuts will determine whether they can even keep their doors open. Programs like the life homework help that serve students who need extra help, are critical to some of our students!

The university is facing at 40% cut, and as of today, funding for the Alaska Performance Scholarship and The Alaska Education Grant were included in the sweep, so students depending on these funds will not receive them. My son is in college, as are many other students I care about. They're facing increased tuition, cutting of programs, and with this latest blow, insufficient funding to pursue their education goals. I have an intern who just completed her freshman year at UAA. When she got the email about the APS/AEG funding she was heartbroken, "I don't have enough money to go to school now... This is a \$4,000 loss for me" Later she shared how a friend of hers told her to just use her dividend to pay for school, but with dividend not being the size of the loss, and tuition costs going up, this won't even come close to meeting her needs.

Public assistance for elders has already stopped. In my community, and in fact, I'm sure MOST indigenous communities, when we get together and talk about what our priorities are as a whole, the top two are always Youth and Elders. Cutting assistance to our elders is NOT in line with our traditional values, values most of the State of Alaska hold dear.

The court system took a hit. We already can't get justice served in our rural communities because of the cost associated with trying a case. Nearly everyone charged pleads out, or gas charges dropped because prosecutors can't afford to try cases, and public defenders don't have the time, or the resources to defend those who need them. My father was assaulted on July 11<sup>th</sup>, and the charges against the individual to beat on the head of my 73 year old father were laughable, but I'm sure the officers and DA were just thinking, what can we get with no funds to actually prosecute? So justice, and protection or our elders, in one example, sacrificed. This injustice will only get worse with these cuts!

Never mind what this is going to cost us in actual dollars! School bond debt reimbursement was cut. So, expect to we expect to see increased fish taxes, sales taxes, and property taxes. Then there will be increases in fees as communities try to figure out how to pay the bills left to them by the state. How will this manifest itself? Increased water and sewer? Increased haul out fees? Who knows?

With power cost equalization (PCE) now being considered part of the sweep, I looked at my last 12 months of electricity bills. Without power cost equalization, I would have paid an additional \$1,661.48 in electricity costs. For those of us in Sand Point alone, we remember, TDX told us in 2011 they plan on increasing rates regularly for 20 years to help pay for the windmills. Losing PCE on top of this has me scared of what my electricity bills will look like in a month or two, never mind in the middle of winter when there's less sun light.

This doesn't even take into account other veto cuts which will affect anyone on Medicaid needing dental or behavioral health services, the Head Start and best beginning programs which provide critical services for our youngest citizens, the homeless, communities protected by village protection safety officers, and more.

Please, I know the PFD is important, but so are ALL these critical services. It does not need to be either or. We, the people of Alaska, are depending on you to work together somehow fund these critical programs, and support our states most needy.

Members of the House Finance Committee:

I am reaching out to you today as a concerned Alaska resident in addition to my role as a hospital administrator. My family has made Alaska our home and our goal is to be here for the long term. I am committed to helping find solutions and want to see our state successful.

I knew reductions were coming but I am stunned by the extent on the table. Yes - things need to change and our strategy needs to adapt to our new normal. But, we need a well thought out plan that takes into consideration the consequences of the proposed actions - not just a red pen that makes uninformed decisions as to what brings value or what we can do without.

Without question - the magnitude of these cuts will send Alaska's economy back into recession and result in the loss of thousands of jobs, including jobs in health care.

The Governor cut an additional \$50 million from the Medicaid budget, and has no plan for how to implement this cut. There is no way we will be moving forward with our Behavioral Health Unit if this goes through. With so much uncertainty in the budget and our education system being reduced, the business plan falls apart.

To make unallocated cuts without a plan demonstrates a lack of transparency and accountability. It also reflects a complete lack of understanding of how the system looks from the front lines.

I can tell you one thing for certain. The services being cut will drive up costs - not reduce them. Removing resources for our most vulnerable populations will actually result in increased hospital admissions with higher acuity diagnoses. This is a given - not a "maybe". I can share multiple examples of times lack of access to care has resulted in hospitalization for diagnoses that could have easily been handled in an outpatient environment. Dental care is one of them. Providing hospital care for a patient with an abscess tooth, that has turned a patient septic, far outweighs any savings you may realize by removing adult dental services - especially as those patients often end up in the ICU for their sepsis. I have seen bills as high as \$750k for one patient, when a simple \$100 extraction could have solved the issue months prior. Penny- wise, pound foolish.

The health care system relies on UA grads to fill critical positions, from nursing to social work, pharmacy and other ancillary services. Without these graduates, recruitment and retention costs will skyrocket for health care providers, leading to higher medical costs and increased insurance premiums. I already pay a premium for travelers to fill critical vacancies from other states! This will only get worse.

Other short-sighted cuts, including reducing funds for homelessness, will make our communities less safe and hurt vulnerable people. It is estimated that the Brother Francis shelter will need to reduce its capacity by 50%, putting over 100 more homeless people on the streets every night. They will end up in our emergency departments, either looking for shelter or needing care for frostbite, which adds cost to our system and reduces access to emergency care services for our entire community.

With a glide path, the governor could find efficiencies and improve public services for Alaskans. Instead, he has chosen arbitrary and unwise temporary budget reductions that will raise costs and hurt our economy.

I support deep budget cuts to the public education system and to the university system. Both are failing Alaska's poor and middle class children and nothing will change until the administrators, professors, assistant professors, principals, assistant principals and the school boards are directly affected either by the loss of a job or severe budget cuts.

Over half of high school graduates, most low income and middle class, are required to take and pay for remedial classes if they have any hope of obtaining a college degree. The Department of Education reports only 32% of students who are on a 6 year degree trajectory ever obtain a college degree. Instead, students leave the university in debt, with no degree, and no good paying job. Furthermore, 1/5 of high school graduates with a 2.5 GPA who try to join the military don't succeed because they can't pass the military's written exam. My guess is students are no more prepared for a trade or vocational school than those students seeking a college degree.

I support a smaller PFD and more state revenue (which could be a reasonable seasonal tax and more contribution from oil companies) and continued state services.

1. Medicaid: rejecting federal Medicaid and cutting it will be detrimental not only to people on Medicaid, but also to hard working people who are struggling to pay for insurance/health care.

a. With more people having to access emergency room care as they have no Medicaid to seek reasonable care for basic problems at local clinics means less medical bills being paid and therefore the price that the insured have to pay for services will go up resulting in more out of pocket costs for hardworking families.

b. There is only one insurance company on the market place. Stress them out more and they will be gone too. Then what are hardworking families supposed to do??

c. Less people paying for services will drive out Medical providers and decrease choices for all.

I'm writing as a lifelong, born and raised Alaskan. I remember the economic crash of the 80's. My dad was a builder and contractor here. His business had to close and he had to move out of state during that economic crash. The effects of that poor economy had lifelong impacts on our family. The decisions we are making today threaten to send us back to a devastated economic recession such as the one we barely survived in the 80's.

I'm asking that we reverse the Governor's vetoes in this funding bill, HB2001. Please preserve the budget originally sent to the governor – which had bipartisan support from both houses, and still was able to provide a PFD of 1600 for Alaskans.

I'm writing as a wife of a small business owner. I'm concerned the Governor's vetoes will have ripple effects into the infrastructure and development projects of Alaska, and into travel and tourism, they will impact transportation and many other sectors of our economy and send us into recession.

Additionally I'm concerned about access to quality education here at home. Being able to get my higher education here is a very large part of what has allowed me to keep my talents, treasures and skills in Alaska. Cuts to the university are short sighted. They undermine our ability to grow the workforce we need to address some of Alaska's biggest public safety and health concerns, as well as growing Alaska's STEM leadership for the oil and gas industry and others.

As a social worker I'm particularly concerned about how cuts will increase public health and safety problems such as: Behavioral health, Sexual abuse/violence trauma, Child abuse, Domestic violence, Mental health and youth suicide and homelessness services. These cuts will result in life changing and in some cases life ending impacts as services are severely limited or eliminated altogether.

For many of these problems we already lead the nation. Our existing "safety net" is already woefully inadequate to meet the need even before these draconian cuts. These cuts will have extremely real impacts to nonprofits providing these essential services, many of whom have already shared how entire programs and in some cases entire facilities will close as a result.

As a new mom I'm extremely concerned about cuts to early childhood programs. Access to safe and affordable child care and development programs are essential to supporting working mothers and

families. The science is irrefutable that access to these programs SIGNFICANTLY improves the long term health and wellness of children. In a state with such HIGH adverse childhood experiences scores, these programs play an even more important role in helping to prevent the COSTLY and devastating impacts of trauma – a cost we ALL pay as a society through higher Medicaid utilization and more when children who need these services cannot access them. Most of all, I want to build an Alaska of abundance and opportunity for my son. These draconian cuts have no vision for an abundant future for Alaska. They are heartless and condemning and we as Alaskans are better than this.

We need to achieve a budget that lives within our means, absolutely. We as Alaskans need to find a way to do that without cutting of four nose to spite our face. As I am not able to attend the public meeting about HB 2001, I would like to submit my comments by email.

I have lived in Alaska since I was two years old. While I certainly appreciate the yearly Permanent Fund Dividend check, I am strongly in favor of approving a \$1600 dividend. A \$3000 dividend would temporarily help many people, but will not make up for the lack of investment in education, universities, health, benefits to vulnerable people, and other programs cut in the governor's illconceived budget. Because of the cuts to the University of Alaska budget, my husband and I are both in danger of losing our jobs. Since there will be hundreds of former university employees entering the job market at the same time, chances are very slim of us finding new jobs in Fairbanks. There is a very good chance we will have to leave the state I deeply love. I desperately do not want that to happen; I have worked hard to build a life here, and the thought of being forced to leave is heartbreaking. And getting a \$3000 check in October will in no way make up for losing my job. In fact, I might have to use that money to finance our move out of state.

In terms of the state budget, a \$3000 dividend simply does not make sense. The legislature approved a reasonable budget with a surplus; in return Governor Dunleavy cut essential services and programs, with devastating effects on thousands of people, and those cuts won't even pay for the proposed \$3000 dividend. Why make these cuts if they won't even cover the cost of an increased dividend?

When I was a child in the mid-1990s, I remember receiving a PFD of about \$900 a year. No one I knew complained about the amount being too small. Over the years, the dividend amount has increased, and yet some people remained unsatisfied and keep demanding more money. While I understand that to many people the dividend is extremely helpful, receiving money from the state government is not a right. It is a nice perk of living in Alaska, but it is certainly not something we are entitled to. No other state in the country has this program, and somehow they have managed to thrive.

I would love to receive \$3000 a year, but I would much rather invest that money into building a strong state, with a excellent schools, a robust pre-K system, a world-class university, decent health care, law enforcement in every community, reasonable assistance to seniors and others who need a hand, support for the most vulnerable among us, and an infrastructure that will benefit all Alaskans.

Hello

I wanted to submit a written testimony. I live in Fairbanks. I am unsure what exactly to write here, but I need to say something.

I am a university graduate student in Fine Arts, focusing in sculpture. I am a research assistant for Native Arts and work as a drawing teacher during the semester.

When the budget cut was first announced in February, we were already getting questions about scholarships and funding. When it was reintroduced this summer, largely unchanged, I was very concerned about the scholarships that allowed students to attend classes. Last semester, one of my students had their funding delayed and had difficulty affording materials not only for my class, but books for their other classes.

The majority of my students were not art majors; they were in the sciences or were already working professionals seeking a safe creative space at least, and a thorough lesson in observation at most. The drawing classes helped them approach solutions creatively, slowing them down and making their methods more meticulous. Things they had seen every day all their lives were suddenly interesting and challenging again in a different way. A simple egg became a strenuous thought exercise, and it taught them to really observe what they were seeing, not just record it.

I was a biology student for most of my academic career, and my methods focused greatly on faithful representation of observations. I strongly believe that creative ability and accurate interpretation are incredibly important to being effective in any field. It prevents stagnation of ideas and methods in an ever-changing environment.

Yesterday I received news that the Arts Council would be closing permanently. Fairbanks has a strong art community, one unlike any I've seen in my travels around the US and the world. The first fridays are a big event; people make real plans around these days. It isn't a secret that we will be the only state without an arts council. I am afraid that the community will fall apart, and people may stop supporting local artists who no longer have exposure.

In addition, the impact of such a large cut is already affecting state programs. Homeless shelters and domestic violence aid, for instance, are integral to the health of the community. The crime rate is already incredibly high. Lack of support for victims of extenuating circumstances such as these will cause a drop in productivity, as people with the means to move will do so.

Educators are already leaving. Enrollment will drop because of the lack of funding.

I strongly encourage support for public programs and the university, as hubs of safety and development for all members of the community. Mr. Dunleavy is already being criticized worldwide for what he has done (Australia, France, and Germany are examples I've come across without algorithmic help).

We will remember this in the upcoming elections.

Please see instead the attached document with key indicators for each of the campuses in FY18. Overall, the UA system contributes in significant ways to the well-being of the state of Alaska as documented in previous reports by ISER and Foraker. The governor's cuts will contribute to further 'brain drain' as our best faculty, staff, and students leave the state to pursue a decent education and/or living elsewhere.

Consider reducing 'corporate welfare' (e.g. massive oil company tax breaks) and other options for generating state revenue towards the goal of balancing the state budget. No matter where you lie on the political spectrum, these cuts make no sense except to the absolute wealthy and those outside special interests, sourced by Koch brothers and shaped by Donna Arduin, who support and endorse the governor's budget decisions.

Please, for now, preserve the budget you already drafted and sent—a budget by, for, and of Alaska.

# AN OPEN LETTER FROM ALASKA BUSINESS LEADERS:

As leaders representing diverse industries that provide thousands of jobs and billions of dollars of investment across the state, we ask all of our elected officials to think about Alaska's economic future and its long-term quality of life. We are concerned about the impasse over the operating budget and size of the Permanent Fund dividend. Until we can solve these standoffs, our state's long-term fiscal and political stability is at risk.

## WE BELIEVE THE FOLLOWING:

- 1. Legislators need to convene in a single location so that all 60 members can vote Gov. Mike Dunleavy's budget vetoes up or down. Every legislator owes it to the public to go on the record on this important vote.
- 2. Lawmakers need to adopt and adhere to a new Permanent Fund dividend formula that will not draw down unsustainable amounts from the fund's earnings reserve this year, next year or in any future year.
- 3. The governor's more than \$400 million in budget vetoes, when combined with the \$190 million already cut out of the budget by the Legislature this year, go too far, too fast. Cuts of that size will eliminate critical public services and result in the loss of thousands of jobs, likely pushing Alaska into recession. The public wants a responsible, sustainable budget for years to come.
- 4. The current stalemate is bad for business and for a healthy Alaska where Alaskans want to live and work. The public needs decisions now, not later. And we need decisions that look long term, overlooking short-term politics. Nobody benefits from repeating this debate a year from now.

Dear Representatives Johnston and Foster, and Committee Members:

Thank you for your considered deliberations in developing HB 2001 utilizing the "surplus dividend" option presented to the PFD working groups before this special session began. This represents a prudent starting point in a realistic process that might yet get Alaska to the point where we're envisioning a livable future.

I'm writing as the Executive Director of a statewide nonprofit that primarily serves individuals living with dementia, their families and the workforce that provides their care. Alzheimer's Resource of Alaska, through its care coordination program, also serves other individuals living with disabilities who are on Home and Community Based Medicaid waivers. We know our clients, their families and their circumstances intimately. As a result, we know the impacts that the Governor's budget would have had on them would that be the endpoint.

This impasse is going to break the safety net. At the moment, our compassionate staff are filling gaps where they can - bringing surplus foods to clients whose senior benefits have been eliminated, for example. They're attempting to present calm assurance and de-escalate the rampant fear that grips those like the family caregiver for a spouse experiencing Alzheimer's who just learned that there isn't any money for respite care just yet. But I see how our staff are experiencing heightened stress and anxiety derived solely from the uncertainty. It frankly has me wondering whether more of them will leave the state to conduct their work in other places where the support for safety net services is not so hostile.

During the regular session, I spoke with many legislators and agreed with them when they opined that the Governor's original budget led to meaningful conversations about Alaska's direction. The conversations that resulted in the budgets that were passed reflected careful consideration that we were going to see changes that took into account the impacts of budget cuts. Now it's apparent that the conversations were intramural only. Addressing the PFD through HB2001 would seem to be the avenue to having these conversations with the executive branch as well.

Thank you for your considerable efforts. Thank you for keeping Alaska's seniors and those living with disabilities in mind as you listen this week to Alaskans describe the values they hope to see reflected in final bill.

Good afternoon members of the House Finance Committee. My name is William Topel from Anchorage and I'm representing myself. I came to Alaska in 1966 and remember the days of the formation of both the Permanent Fund and the PFD by bipartisan legislative members of the Republican Party, the Democratic Party, and the Libertarian Party, and Gov. Jay Hammond. I'm a Senior Citizen living on a fixed small Social Security income and occasional part-time or seasonal work. I'm also a four-time UAA graduate. I am NOT a public employee union member. I am NOT representing a state-subsidized non-profit organization. I support a full PFD and the back capped PFD payouts. <u>Regarding HB2001A (as amended), I do NOT support it, but support a FULL STATUTORY PAYOUT as per A.S. 37.13.140 (b), not what the legislators want to arbitrarily give us Alaskans as per SB 26.</u>

As envisioned by its Founders, the PFD belongs to the people, not state government, and it benefits EVERY Alaskan, not just certain special interest groups or government contractors, so every time the legislature tries to tamper with the traditional PFD formula, it makes matters worse. Until recently, Alaskans believed that the PFD was not a part of the state budget but just a transfer. That is because the PFD was a part of the DGF (Designated General Fund) portion of the budget, just like where incoming federal monies are placed that cannot be manipulated by the Legislature. However, under the leadership of the Finance Committees in 2017, the Legislative Finance Division placed our PFD payouts into the UGF (Undesignated General Fund) portion of the budget, so that, when coupled with SB 26 and continued overspending, the PFDs now have to compete with other state funded services and subject to legislative manipulation. It does not have to remain this way. This discussion should NOT be the PFD vs. state services. Quit tampering with our PFD. Quit capping our PFD. Quit stealing our PFD. Honor the time-tested traditional statutory PFD payout formula and pay us Alaskans the FULL PFD AMOUNT, which is estimated to be about \$3,000 this year.

Also, this bill was not introduced legally under the proper venue in Wasilla according to the Governor's 2<sup>nd</sup> Special Session Proclamation, but was first introduced

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by the House Rules Committee on July 8, according to the Legislature's website (http://www.akleg.gov/PDF/31/Bills/HB2001A.PDF). This bill being considered now is another example of some legislators trying to muck things up badly. I would suggest that those legislators who remained in Juneau illegally and unconstitutionally join their fellow legislators in Wasilla to conduct the people's business and to negotiate with Gov. Mike Dunleavy to resolve many of these problems that many of you have created over the years.

In conclusion, I support the FULL TRADITIONAL STATUTORY PFD payout, not your arbitrary half-funded, capped theft. Also, repeal SB 26, restore our PFD payouts to DGF budget status, and let Alaskans have a vote on a Constitutional Amendment to put the traditional PFD into our state constitution. Thank you for your time and this opportunity to testify.

Honorable Committee Members,

I am contacting you regarding the referenced topics as I am unsure if I will be able to attend your legislative hearings in person. I understand that I may call in as well, but I have tried on several other hearings only to remain on hold and to not have my voice be heard.

I am a disabled veteran, single mother, and a very small business owner. I have been a resident of this great state for forty-five years. My father, a Vietnam veteran, brought us here in 1974 while active duty in the United States Air Force. I am the second generation to call Alaska my home and am raising the third generation to hopefully be strong and independent Alaskans.

Firstly, I was able to visit the legislature's second special session the past week and I must say it was disappointing to see many of you not in attendance. This was a travesty to Alaskans and only solidified Alaskans' perception that, regardless of Alaska's Constitution and Laws, you are reprehensible.
