### **EDUCATION IS AN ECONOMICAL GOOD AND PROVIDES STATE SECURITY**

The University of Alaska Anchorage has been a place that has taught me and qualified me for federal internships at the United States Geological Survey, and the Bureau of Land Management. It has allowed me to become a co-author on a published peer-reviewed Alaskan research paper, as an undergrad. Mentors have applied for grants to support my undergraduate research here and I have traveled to many conferences sharing my research. I am invested in Alaska and as we sit under record-breaking heat waves and watch our waters warm, glaciers melt, and heat stress make trees become vulnerable to spruce beetles and fire. It is appalling that we are willing to consider letting our university system fall. The University system empowers the people in Alaska to do research and understand what changes our state is going through, and then inform the decisions we make so that we can hopefully be most logical. Sustainable Mineral extraction, continued fish harvest, child care, education, real estate, engineering, seismic activity monitoring, economics, art, biology, sustainable revenue, and health care, all of these things are good for our state. These ideas and brain power should come from Alaskan's. The intellectual power and investment of/in our people are what will fuel the state's innovation. It's what attracts experts from around the world to come to Alaska. Oil obviously won't hold us up forever and we are not in a time where people are rushing to Alaska for gold and oil anymore. We can't afford to lose our local professors and professionals, and we can't afford to have an inviable route for the next generation of them in Alaska. Do not burden our state under the barriers limiting access to opportunity and health.

## **LOCATION MATTERS**

I came to Alaska on a 30 ft sailboat through the North West Passage and found myself in Nome. I was a 12-year-old kid and had moved schools and locations my whole life. Nome was the first place I had community and identity truly develop. I Graduated from Nome Beltz Highschool and with the Support of the Alaska Native Science and Engineering program (ANSEP) at the University of Alaska Anchorage (UAA), I transferred from my small off-the-road town to Anchorage. I remembered moving a lot in my childhood and I thought this move would be a simple jump. I was wrong, my first year of college was difficult, not only because of the new homework load, but because for the first time in my life I was without my family and I found myself having to code switch between small town norms to city life norms. Thankfully I had the ANSEP community, and whenever anyone from Nome traveled they came through Anchorage, so I could see them. With the help of these communities, I have managed to stay in school.

I have only been a Nome resident for 10 years, and still, the transition to the Anchorage was a shock to me. I can't imagine how jumping to the lower 48 would have been like. I also know I am fairly new to Alaska. Many of my friends are Alaska Native and not only do they have a strong connection to their communities, but there is also a strong multi-generational connection to the land and the food harvested from it. Programs like ANSEP are meant to help build a community of people experiencing that same transition from hometowns/villages and traditional ways into western education. The UA

system is an opportunity for many local Alaskan's. If we have to outsource our university education because we as collective communities allow our state Governor to deliver a crippling blow to the UA system, it will be like building a wall that is difficult to scale for the majority of our youth especially our rural Alaskan youth.

#### WE WANT CAPACITY TO MAKE OUR OWN CHOICES AS A STATE

We want clean water and air. We want functioning economics and public service. If we kill the state's education at any level including head start, you have kicked the backbone of our state and are making our spinal cord vulnerable to devastating damage as people seek to develop. We need local people as the ones leading our companies and collaborating to solve our challenges and differing ideas. We need good ideas and those are fostered through understanding and learning. Do not take away opportunity and services from the people. Success is a sum of many repeating moments of good choices and decisions along with persistence through failure and applying logic to future decisions. Crippling the university is a bad decision that will leave us pleading for outsiders to teach our children and heal our sick. These outsiders won't stay long enough to really become part of our community or understand our unique needs. It will leave us ignorant, unprepared and surprised when environmental insecurity becomes a larger state cost. It costs money to put out fires, maintain sustainable environmental services like salmon, and design earthquake resilient structures. We don't want to be in the position of having to appease oil companies at the cost of all other state values, just because we did not invest in our people. Instead, we want our people telling the oil companies if their environmental rehabilitation plan actually rehabilitates. We want our engineers selling oil companies the newest corrosive resistant pump design. We want our own electricians figuring out how to build a power grid able to handle varying solar and wind power. We don't want to have to import everything. We want power and control of our own path as a state and in the end, you unlock that power by empowering the local people.

Hello,

I am an art historian, arts administrator and museum consultant as well as a life-long Alaskan (one of only two Alaska Native people to have a PhD in art history). I am deeply saddened by the elimination of

the Alaska State Council on the Arts and hope that the State will consider the economic impact of this loss.

Alaska has a very unique arts industry and the arts bring people to Alaska (collectors travel here to purchase our arts, they visit our communities to see totem poles being carved, and to see public performances). In many communities in Alaska, arts are a form of income to supplement substance lifestyles. Young people learn how to make art through arts in schools programs, master/apprentice programs and community arts programs, all which have been funded by the Alaska State Council on the Arts. In addition, ASCA supported professional development training for artists to help artists learn how to market their work. I'm not sure how Alaska will be able to fill the gap in funding and expertise that ASCA was able to share with artists.

Working in the arts in Alaska as an arts funder for a non-profit organization, I know that ASCA's funding provided much needed support for artists. In the grant program that I run, nearly one hundred percent of the projects that I have helped to fund had matching funds from ASCA. ASCA's loss is a huge blow to our arts ecosystem.

I would urge the house finance department to consider refunding ASCA or to conduct a study to find out what the impact of the ASCA elimination is on Alaska's economy.

In addition to the financial impact, please also consider the impact that ASCA's loss has on the vitality and creativity of our state. I live in Homer, Alaska and I see that the arts have always brought our community together and created outlets for children to grow their skills and confidence. I am will greatly miss having access to arts programming that ASCA supported in my community and throughout the rest of the state.

I was at the University of Alaska for 11 years. I earned a Masters in Biology at UAA, a PhD in fisheries through UAF, and then a prestigious National Science Foundation broadening participation postdoctoral

fellowship (the first ever awarded in Alaska) to do research and engage in science outreach at UAA. One of the most rewarding aspects of my time there was working with the students, the vast majority of whom were local and wanted to obtain a college degree so that they could get a good job in their home state and serve the communities in which they grew up. UAA also serves the community in many ways, through outreach events such as STEM Day, which provides science enrichment activities to more than 500 local families each year, to the Kids2College program, which brings nearly 1000 local middle school kids to the University each spring to help them realize that they, too, can attend college and pursue meaningful careers. The research performed at the University of Alaska helps us to better understand the natural and social aspects of our state. How are we as a state supposed to recruit and retain high quality, educated employees without a strong university?

Although I am a PhD-level scientist and had good job security in my job with the state, I recently resigned from my position largely due to the high cost of daycare for my two young daughters. After paying for their daycare, my take-home income was about \$100 per month. I couldn't justify continuing to work, even though I enjoyed my job and working with my colleagues. And I'm certainly not an anomaly - this is a common narrative for moms in the workforce. Daycare is too expensive and waitlists are too long for it to be a reliable, achievable option for working parents. I added my daughter to the waitlists for the ASD preschool programs, but since they are in such high demand and none are in our neighborhood, we won't get into any. This situation is unacceptable. Too many talented parents are being forced to leave the workforce.

I was also disappointed to see the governor veto funding for the arts. The arts are essential to any community, as they foster an appreciation and understanding of our lives and help people to express themselves. It's vital to expose children to various art forms. I worry about the next generation of children growing up without an understanding of art and culture.

Pertaining to agriculture, I have spoken with several friends who have a shared concern about food insecurity in Alaska. We are too reliant upon exports. Throughout my time in Alaska, I have been heartened by the increases I've seen in locally-produced goods. One example of this is the Arctic Harvest Community Sponsored Agriculture, which I enthusiastically signed my family up for this summer, and the increase in farmers markets. We need to be more self-reliant when it comes to food production. Climate change has real potential to disrupt our world's current agricultural system and an ever-increasing world population strains food supplies. Alaska needs to step up and fund agriculture so we can feed ourselves fresh, healthy, local food. You can also imagine the impact that this can have on Alaskan's health and well-being, if they have access to fresh fruits and vegetables as an alternative to packaged, processed foods.

Over the last three years, I have watched many of our close friends move out of state. These people were all well-educated and worked in education, science research, community health, and the oil industry. The reasons they cite are all the same - there are limited opportunities here. These opportunities are going to become even more restricted if education continues to be de-emphasized and de-funded. My husband and I are transplants from the east coast, but we have called Alaska home for the last 11 years. We enjoy the quality of life and community here. However, we have severe reservations about the quality of education and my limited career prospects. To retain hard-working families, educational infrastructure and the health and well-being of Alaskans need to be prioritized by our government officials.

Hello,

I'm writing to ask you to support HB2001.

I have been very discouraged by the Governor's vetoes which essentially amputate essential services from Alaska citizens. Although Alaska has budget issues because of an over reliance on oil revenue, there is no fiscal crisis except for a lack of political will to broaden revenue sources.

The Legislature has crafted a fiscally conservative budget that has involved many Alaskans. The vetoes have taken this work and dis-emboweled it. This is not the Alaska I know and love. The services cut by the vetoes would fundamentally degrade the infrastructure investments your predecessors worked hard to build over time.

The optics and rationale to degrade this are not good. There is no fiscal crisis, and the architect of many of these vetoes, Donna Arduin, has little credibility (https://www.dermotcole.com/reportingfromalaska/2019/7/11/5k2o9xrbr5inqz0pefzhn1skp1nh6c)

There is a way forward with HB2001 for the short term. Namely, restore the vetoes and pay for it with a reduced PFD. We've had a reduced PFD the last three years and we've survived. If we aren't going to explore alternate revenue streams like modifying oil credits, sales tax, or my preference-an income tax, then the PFD is all we have.

So my request- talk to your colleagues, find compromise, pass a HB2001 that can muster a veto override, don't be part of the decimation of this state. Other states have tried the Governors route, namely Kansas, and it hasn't worked. We can be better than this. Nay, we MUST BE better than this.

### Dear House Finance Committee,

Thank you for continuing to seek community input and find a budget compromise that will ultimately serve and improve our state. I am a Research Professor at UAF. The nine years I have spent here in Fairbanks have been the best of my life. I met my wife here and we intend to raise a family and stay the rest of our lives. However, the governor's proposed cuts will have severe effects on education, the economy, the people of Alaska, and our way of life. They will be catastrophic to the University of Alaska system, interior Alaska, and our entire state. These cuts are so severe that thousands of people will lose their jobs, which will have a ripple effect throughout the entire economy for many, many years. Education and research at UA will be impacted so severely that the repercussions will be felt in the short and long-term. I strongly urge you to find a way to restore funding and find a budget compromise.

UA has taken cuts in the past and is willing to work with the legislature and governor on becoming more efficient. Everyone I know at UA wants a better, stronger Alaska. We work hard and care about the state and its people. We bring in students who end up living and working in Alaska for the rest of their lives. We bring in research dollars that directly benefit Alaskans and help grow our economy. Investment in UA is a proven revenue generator for the state, so any cuts seem extremely counterintuitive and shortsighted.

As a researcher primarily funded on federal money, I rely on the University of Alaska and a steady baseline of state funding to help bring in external research funding. At UAF, approximately every state dollar invested in research brings in over six dollars of external funding, which is an excellent return on investment. The money brought in on these federal grants goes right back into the state through purchases, contracts, and good jobs for Alaskans. Our group at UAF is building an increasingly strong relationship with the Department of Defense, and they want to see our program grow by investing substantially into UAF. Similarly, I also work on natural hazards monitoring that directly benefits the people of Alaska. As was shown during the recent Anchorage earthquake, proper monitoring and mitigation greatly reduces damage, repair costs, and loss of life. If the cuts go into effect, federal funding

agencies WILL be less likely to fund these types of research, hampering our ability to support DoD and monitor natural hazards.

A balance can be reached that provides both a PFD and sustainable budget for the people of Alaska. I also believe there is growing support for an income or sales tax. I urge you to seek a balance working with the governor and rest of the legislature and restore funding for the University of Alaska and other worthwhile organizations.

Ultimately, I plan to attend medical school and become a physician. I have a desire to return to Alaska following medical school/residency and plan to practice medicine here. The recent news that the governor is withholding funding for WWAMI is particularly frustrating as this is the best opportunity for me to achieve my goals in an affordable way. This is also good for Alaska and I do not understand this attack by the governor to such an amazing partnership and program.

I began my undergraduate degree at the University of Alaska Anchorage in the Fall of 2012 and through hard work and dedication to my goals/dreams, I graduated with my Bachelor of Science Degree in biological sciences/microbiological sciences option this Spring, 2019. I recognize this achievement was realized through my own efforts, but I also know that I could not have done this alone. I was enabled to achieve this milestone through the incredible support of my family, my friends, my employers, my clients, my community, my university, and my State. During my time at UAA, I worked a full-time job in my already established career as a hairdresser, as well as working a part-time job as a medical scribe in the emergency room at Providence Alaska Medical Center. I have even found time to volunteer on a semi-regular basis and have been able to shadow doctors in a variety of disciplines to increase my exposure to possible future interests in specific areas of focused medicine. Also, during my time at UAA, I have been exposed to amazing and knowledgeable professors and other faculty. During my Junior year, I was given the opportunity to participate in undergraduate microbiological research by Dr. Khrys Duddleston, Professor and Director of the Department of Biological Sciences at UAA. Through the mentorship by the graduate students in Dr. Duddleston's research lab as well as Dr. Duddleston herself, I have learned marketable skills above and beyond the knowledge obtained in the classroom. Dr. Brandon Briggs, Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences has also been instrumental in my educational experience at UAA. Countless other faculty and professors have inspired and taught me. This has

allowed me to discover new passions and I cherish these opportunities as I have been able to evolve the purpose of my life. I will forever live in gratitude for those relationships I forged during my time as an undergraduate at UAA.

One of the most important skills I learned as an undergraduate is how to write a research grant proposal to secure funding for my own self-designed microbiological research project. I submitted my proposal to the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship which is associated with the Honors College at UAA and it was ultimately funded. This was a big win for me and will open other doors in the future. I am spending this summer doing the work of my research in Dr. Duddleston's research lab and I am enjoying the extended time on campus, post graduating. Research is a fundamental cornerstone and crucial to the success of any institute of higher learning as well as to the progress of any society. At UAA, total research grant awards have been increasing in recent years and since 2013 external research funding has increased by roughly 23 percent. The win rate during FY17 was around 46 percent, well above the national average of 25 percent. At UAF, more that 46 percent of undergraduates participate in research opportunities above and beyond the classroom. Exposure to, and participation in research is a game-changer when searching for employment after graduation. The University of Alaska (UA) system is an amazing institution which we should all be proud of and invested in its success and the success of its students. I understand that one's desire and fortitude play a large role in what that individual gets out of his or her own educational experience, but it is perhaps just as necessary to have the support and mentorship by professors/faculty, and FUNDING. I found all of those components at UAA. So, for me, I do not understand how members of our legislative branch as well as the governor who received their degrees from the UA system can stand on the side that would cripple, perhaps permanently, our State's PUBLIC institution of higher learning. It seems more prudent to invest more, not cut funding. What I hear this governor saying is that the UA system is not worth the investment. I hear him saying that the students and future students are not worth the investment. Well I absolutely do not agree with his sentiment. I recognize the value of our public university and I recognize the world-class educational opportunities afforded me and all students.

I fully understand that our State is NOT experiencing a fiscal crisis, but to quote Senator Bishop, rather a "political crisis." This crisis is being perpetrated by the governor and those lawmakers who entertain him. Unacceptable. We are better than this. I am very disheartened by the fact that the work (quite frankly, the miracle) that was realized in the senate through a unanimous passing of a responsible budget containing modest cuts and providing a \$600 million surplus by the thoughtful diligence of a bipartisan body went largely unnoticed and uncelebrated and eventually vetoed by the governor. Disheartened indeed, especially at a time when we see the breakdown of communication all around us. The governor behaves as though he wants chaos and disruption and he is empowered by the 22 lawmakers who chose to meet in Wasilla last week instead of meeting with the majority in Juneau. This completely overshadowed the big win in the senate we all should have been rejoicing and supporting all so that nearly \$2 billion could be distributed to Alaskans in the form of an unsustainable and unnecessarily inflated PFD. While I am a registered Democrat, I was particularly impressed with some of the comments made by several Republican legislators during last week's floor session, especially Senator Natasha von Imhof; "Sometimes you have to spend money now in order to avoid spending much more money later," as well as "To my fellow Alaskans; what kind of State do you want to live in? What kind of future do you want? I want one we can all be proud of. One based on a shared positive vision, constructed by hard work and cooperation and collaboration. That is what we are elected to do." I agree whole-heartedly with Senator von Imhof's sentiments.

I want to voice my appreciation for the swift response by Representative, Matt Claman to an email written by me and the graduate students in my research lab which was sent last week sharing our stories and voicing our concerns regarding the governor's budget vetoes. It is incredibly important for our representation hear us and listen to us. Also important is the acknowledgement that they are listening to us, their constituents. However, I must voice my frustration with Senator Mia Costello (one of the 22 lawmakers refusing to travel to Juneau last week) who has yet to respond to any phone calls or emails I have sent. Unacceptable. The governor is playing a very reckless political game with real consequences. This is not only willfully ignorant, irresponsible and reckless, but it also seems immoral. The governor does not believe that his actions and his budget vetoes will hurt the Alaska's economy, however there are many more qualified professionals and regular Alaskans who disagree with his narrative.

I appreciate that the House Finance Committee has started a working document called HB2001 which will provide a reallocation of funds previously vetoed by the governor. I support a minimal permanent fund dividend; \$929 I believe is what is being proposed. I would much rather give up my dividend entirely than receive one totaling \$3000 if it meant that funding was restored to every area currently threatened by the governor. I am not alone in this conviction. Polling shows that over 70 percent of Alaskans disagree with the governor and want funding restored. You must listen to your constituents. In case you have forgotten, your constituents are the citizens of Alaska.

Thank you for taking the time read this statement and please restore funding to all the areas and programs being attacked by the governor.

Good morning Co-Chairs Foster and Johnson:

Please restore the vetoes in the 2020 operating budget, address the 'reverse sweep', and fund a capital budget.

These rash vetoes threaten to undermine public health and safety; cause the loss of thousands of Alaskan jobs (in addition to the jobs lost attributable to the lack of a robust capital budget); causes harm to children, the elderly, and the most vulnerable of the Alaskan populations; forces the forfeiture of tens of millions in federal match funds; and will very likely plunge the state into economic turmoil.

Not reversing the 'sweep' of the Power Cost Equalization (PCE) fund into the Constitutional Budget Reserve will have an immediate and negative impact on every person living in rural Alaska. **Subject:** PFD and veto over rides

To ALL legislators:

While I spoke yesterday, the two minutes afforded was insufficient to provide you with all of the information that I think you would find helpful.

As mentioned I am a 45 year resident of the state having come via the military. When we were due for a permanent change of station in 1977, we elected to leave the military and stay in Alaska. This is of course, prior to the Permanent Fund and the PFD. At that time, we paid 11.5% for income tax as well as school taxes, user taxes, sin taxes, etc. This was to balance our budget. The tax burden that year resulted in a payment of \$4290.10 to the State. In today's dollars, that amounts to \$17,797.00. If we are concerned because our expenditure this year results in a need for \$20,000+ then we are only asking for \$3000 more than we had in 1977 AND the Permanent Fund is paying the bill not the individuals through an income tax. Between 1977 and 2019 there has been roughly a 300% inflation rate so \$3,000 does not seem like a large expenditure.

Now remember, before 1980, Alaskans were like every other state and we had all the varieties of taxation available not just property tax and gas tax. Speaking of gas tax, Alaska has the LOWEST gas tax in the country at our current rate. Perhaps that is a source that can be adjusted as I was stunned at the amount that other states add. I have added a copy of the page from the Tax Foundation that illustrates this.

Another curious thing which was surprising to me when I did my research was that Alaska's mean per capita income (PCI) while higher than that of the lower 48 states, indicates that we have NOT recovered as quickly or as well as the Lower 48 states from the most recent national recession. Our PCI has decreased over the last year decreased by 2% and the Lower 48 one has increased by 1.88% over the same period. In the past three years available,( 2017 is the last year reported as 2018 comes out in Sept.) our mean PCI fell .13 % while in the same period the US PCI increased by 8.2%. This is really a telling statistic. One that can easily be used to argue that we cannot allow any cuts that would impair our ability to recover or cause a worsening economic situation.

Obviously, when the economy increases, charitable giving increases, and income increase and many of the issues in terms of funding go away. That is exactly why these funds need to be restored.

In terms of education, it has been noted that many states are increasing their support of universities this next year. The most recent research done on state's spending shows something surprising. For the states that report that education represents the larges percentage of their spending, Alaska is actually one of the lower percentage wise.

Here are the numbers: ( percent of budget allocation to education where it represents the states largest...states not included list health and welfare as their largest percentage amount)

Alaska 24.2 Vermont 35.4

Arizona 30.2 Virginia 35.1

Colorado 29.9 Washington 29.3

Connecticut 30.2 West Virginia 34.1

Delaware 35.7 Wisconsin 33.7

So our spending here is not out of line with other states and again ours is not paid directly by the population.

In terms of per capita debt amount by states we vary from 3rd to 4th depending on the year. New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Massachusetts all vie intermittently for the top spot. New York last year had a state debt of over \$17,000 per capita. Ours shows between \$7700 and \$13,000 but we have an advantage that they do not...we have a piggy bank called the Permanent Fund. They do NOT plain and

simple and they are someday going to have to pay this back on the backs of the people. We can funds ours from PFD if necessary...not a good idea of course but possible.

Please also recognize that if we had stuck with the PFD as proposed and written into law prior to the Zobel law suit, the PFD payment was based on residency and was \$50 per year of residency up to a cap of \$1000. Now the only glitch is that to qualify you had to be present in the three years prior to its inception (1980) which was one of the sticking point for the Zobels. However, had they not won, your job would be a LOT easier. People tend to think of the PFD as an entitlement and every single epithet that has been lobbed at the spending for social programs can easily apply to the PFD. Most would not qualify under Hammond's plan. As far as intent, it was NOT supposed to be a supplemental income program or only the poor would get it. It is a gift pure and simply. Yes, we call it a dividend but in some ways people perceive that a dividend is automatically paid every year. I can tell you from my retirement account that this is a false assumption.

I am just appalled at the misconception that was unintentionally, I hope, re-inforced by the group of people who stayed in Wasilla. Contrary to popular belief the governor has NO ABILITY under the Constitution to determine the amount paid. ALL appropriations must come from the House of Representatives so people need to retake US Government 101 as we are the same as the feds. I am sorry that the Wasilla 22 essentially ceded their appropriation power to the governor by not even participating in the vote to over ride. This is a serious error and a bad precedent. Look at the elected leaders who paved their way to dictatorship by getting concessions just like this from the government until they had all of the power themselves.

The amount paid for the PFD is determined by the legislature pure and simple and this garbage about Walker stealing the PFD is just a seriously flawed perception. The formulation needs changed to establish a statutory cap and this nonsense about the figures from \$3300 to \$7,000 being paid will just stop. If people have never paid income tax up here and understand how it works, then demand a large PFD they are somewhat delusional. It simply does not work that way...of course.

A final thought on the PFD....if the PFD is the thing keeping people here than like our three previous attempts to dissolve the PFD ought to be resurrected as these people are not here for Alaska and its people, they are here for themselves pure and simple.

SO, do I support the new finance bill....of course.

Testimony to House Finance 7-14-19 by Robert Hall, 232-8888

Honorable Chair, members of the committee:

My name is Robert Hall representing the Houston Alaska Chamber of Commerce and presenting the Houston Solution – Which is to simply let Alaskans vote on a new PFD Formula.

Last Wednesday, before the Susitna Rotary Club – Governor Dunleavy said Yes, - If asked, he will consider expanding the call to the special session to include an advisory vote on a new PFD formula.

The Governor further said he hopes the public will be allowed to vote on any changes to the PFD formula.

There will be no long term-term solution to the budget without a long-term agreement on the future amount of the PFD.

The simplest formula would be based on a percentage of market value (POMV).

The Governor also said if the PFD is based on POMV; first the legislature needs to decide on a total payout percentage and then he believes half of the POMV total payout should be paid as PFDs. If the total POMV payout were 5% then the PFD total payment would be 2½%.

However it is the responsibility of legislature to decide the percentage of POMV dedicated to PFDs. The legislature could decide on a special one-time first year payment and then revert to a formula. But please let the people vote on the new PFD formula.

A public advisory vote has several advantages.

- 1. An Advisory vote makes it easier to get a majority of the legislature to agree to "let the people vote".
- 2. An Advisory vote makes it easier to avoid a veto.
- 3. An Advisory vote makes it easier to avoid a referendum to overturn the new formula
- 4. An Advisory vote is the right thing to do. The PFD is an important part of Alaska and it would be proper to ask Alaskans to approve changes to the PFD formula.

The Houston Chamber of Commerce passed a resolution stating that:

If the legislature proposes a new PFD Formula reducing the PFD to 1% of POMV then for the first year of the new formula the PFD should be a special one-time payment of \$6,700, paid out of savings; which is the amount that PFDs have been reduced via the "subject to appropriation" clause. A \$6,700

one time PFD would also encourage voters to support lower future PFDs. (Houston Alaska Chamber of Commerce Resolution 19-01)

First, one or more legislators should ask the governor to expand the call to include an advisory vote for a new PFD formula.

Then the legislature should hold hearings and decide on a new PFD formula based on POMV and then let Alaskans vote on it.

After Alaskans approve the new PFD formula the legislature should pass a sustainable balanced budget.

To the State of Alaska House Finance Committee,

I am writing in support of HB 2001, for payment of a Permanent Fund Dividend (PFD) of \$1,600, as a step towards balancing the state budget through a reasonable PFD. The PFD should not be any higher; in fact, the PFD should be lower in order for the state budget to support state services provided through the state budget.

With this support, I urge you to enact the CS for House Bill No. 2001 (Fin) Work Draft HB 2001 that restores services to the State of Alaska that were eliminated through the Governor's vetoes. In this Work Draft I see hopeful action to support the current and future economic stability of Alaska, an economic stability that has been destroyed by the Governor's line item vetoes. I do not have a full understanding of the legislative process surrounding the CS Work Draft, but I hope that it represents the work of the committee to restore state services denied by the Governor's vetoes.

The Governor's vetoes are devastating to my community and my family. Our PFD, no matter how large, can not provide the equivalent support for my children's education and future opportunities than the state can collectively. My daughter, as I write, is participating in an Alaska Native Science and Engineering (ANSEP) summer program through the University of Alaska; this program is accelerating her desire to learn and her interest in her state as a next generation workforce. This program is severely damaged in the Governor's vetoes. My daughter is devastated that a lifeline for her future is being taken away. Our confidence in our state to support its constituents is damaged.

Other programs that support our children's education need to be reinstituted: Alaska State Libraries for long distance learning; Council of the Arts for Artist in Residence and Sitka Fine Arts programs; Public Broadcasting for our one radio station; among others. To support our community, the following programs need reinstituting, among others: Early Childhood Education, civil air patrol, veteran services, community initiative matching grants, public health laboratories, senior benefits, water quality, etc.

I am disheartened that the hard and conscientious work on the state budget that your committee and the entire Alaska Legislature was dismissed by the Governor's vetoes. I am dismayed that you are back in session to rectify the wrongs done by the vetoes. I greatly appreciate your work to uphold the state of Alaska, to respond to the majority of Alaskans who are speaking up against the Governor's vetoes. Thank you so much for your service. We are counting on you to find a responsible and rational solution in the short term, and long term. We are counting on you to fund education and economic opportunities that secure the future of our children and our communities and our state. This year, minimize the PFD. Next year, decrease state tax credits to oil companies and start work on a state income tax.

I really hope the classes I need in spring will be there. I hope my degree will still be accredited and that I can graduate in next May. The uaa debate coach is applying for jobs outside of AK. He was a huge player in our community and he gave me the beginnings of my voice. He will take his wife and two kids with him. This is just a start of those who can leave, leaving for healthier environments. This leaves those of us behind who can't afford to leave, and we begin an unnecessary struggle with worse problems than the day before. It's a quality problem to debate over which degree opportunity I want to take advantage of. A lower quality problem is one where I wonder if I will be able to even get my degree in Alaska. One of the only Alaska Native PHD professors I know who has come back to Alaska to empower their community now faces uncertainty in their job. They are doing awesome research with many students on how gut microbiota impacts organisms. Understanding these interactions applies to our understanding of how microbes impact us and evolve with us. My friends and I are looking at credits, and costs and losing sleep, this uncertainty is taking a toll. With lack of location, facility, and job security at the university grant and research funding is at risk of being disrupted. The state budget has been over simplified. We have been oversimplified. We are the present and we are the future. Invest in us. Invest in how we can lead this state and educate the world. Alaska's needs are different form the lower 48, we can't survive drastic budget cuts as easily, we are bridging a large geographical space. Yesterday UA met to decide if they should delay financial exigency or start cutting right away. They voted to wait until July 30 just Incase funding cuts change. We are strung out watching our professors become vulnerable and afraid as everything they have worked so hard for is lined out on the cutting board. We are looking at the many younger students just graduating highschool and panicking as we get strings of emails telling us we better find other financial sources as merit based scholarship accounts are drained. We feel almost powerless in a world where climate change is heavy on our generations shoulders, we stand to get educated, to contribute, to make a change. What is worth taking away our viable paths to further

education? How is this logical? We are told to stay clam and just be present at classes. Yet president of the university Jim Johnsen said closing all rural campuses only saves 30 million. Getting rid of degree program duplications between the universities only saves another 20 million. The university needs to save more than that. People say I should be mad at my university for depending on the state and not operating more efficiently, but right now I am mad at my state political leaders because they do not collectively value us and this university system enough to work as one team. Right now 17% of the overall university system budget is going to be cut. For what, a one time PFD high? Many have written from the lower 48 and even other arctic research universities and it's clear a cut like this is too deep. Mistakes will be made and adaptation will be rushed and sloppy, and we will see our communities pay for it. That big of a cut in one year will be devastating. We are caught between if the PFD is right or wrong. Maybe the PFD is a good idea, but maybe income tax is a good idea too. I just know that education is very important to myself and and my community and that education is how we make sure we are ready for what's next. In life it's best to invest in skill because skill is hard to take away from people once they have it. Skill is what was has empowered humans to survive and compete, don't take away our institutions of skill acquisition and learning. Please give us hope and local access to higher education. Don't make us endure unnecessary gutting of our university.

Good day.

This is my testimony for the 07/15/2019 committee meeting on the PFD.

In 2017, the Finance chairs at the time, particularly Senators Anna MacKinnon and Lyman Hoffman, as well as Senate President Pete Kelly, Majority Leader Peter Micciche and Rules Chair Kevin Meyer, and the LFD, decided to reclassify the PFD. This is what made the statutory POMV look more attractive or even necessary, and set us up for the situation we are in today.

By this slight of hand, in true Alaska Legislative fashion, they ignored LegFin's own test for whether a category qualifies for DGF:

"Designated general funds include;

- 1) program receipts that are restricted to the program that generates the receipts and
- 2) revenue that is statutorily designated for a specific purpose. Other funds have stricter restrictions on usage, and federal funds originate from the federal government and can be used only for a particular purpose."

This sneaky way of doing business, along with SB26, put the PFD squarely, and unconstitutionally, in the hands of politicians - many of whom have an agenda that does not align itself with the majority of Alaskans.

This is the same illusion that allows Senators, such as Chris Birch, to attempt to snow the Alaskan people with his "how can we afford the PFD? We NEED your money!" Rhetoric.

The PFD was never designed for this. It belongs to the people, NOT YOU! This sneaky way of reclassifying the relatively tiny amount of money that Alaskans get for their oil wealth demonstrates the single solution mind-set of many legislators.

Regarding the Operating Budget vs. "traditional PFD" amount, there are some factions who refuse to diversify the state's income by the mistaken thinking that we can balance the state budget by simply cutting it. All that approach does is shift the financial burden to the various communities in the state.

Although it may be past time to consider other revenue sources such as a state <u>payroll</u> tax, revising our oil production taxes, a sales tax, (even if it's just seasonal) and possibly a motor vehicle fuel tax increase, (that could apply only to those communities on the 'road system'), as far as I can tell, modifying the PFD formula (since banishing it outright isn't an option) in order to fund essential services is the responsible and prudent thing to do. Hello my name is Christopher Smith, I am an Alaskan working for the Geophysical Institute at UAF researching wildfire risk and prevention strategies. I am frankly dumbfounded by the lack of legislative support towards education in Alaska from a Pre-K to a university level, especially considering the irony of the Governor (Dunleavy has a masters from UAF in education, how can he logically move forward with his proposed budget).

A state funded university creates opportunity for the youth of Alaska and illustrates the importance of education to future generations, creates the educated professionals that fuel the future of the state, and produces world-class research (UAF is a tier-1 research institution and is a worldwide leader in Arctic research because of institutions like the Geophysical Institute and Institute of Arctic Biology). All of this will be stripped away if appropriations are not made to restore the states funding to the university!

There are outcries across the world from people advocating for the University of Alaska, one of the top Arctic Research Universities. Many funding agencies at the federal level are already saying they want to help pick up the slack from the state (NASA, NOAA, NSF, etc.) however, this federal funding will not be a long-term solution because researchers and faculty earning grants from these agencies will look for positions elsewhere because of the insecurity of the university system caused by upheaval at a state level. As researchers, faculty, and grad students look for opportunities elsewhere this federal funding will be stripped from the University of Alaska system as well.

It is sad how the federal agencies seem to care more about the integrity of the state's public education system currently than the state itself. As a state, the legislature should be protecting Alaska's public education, especially since Alaskans are so geographically cut off from the rest of the U.S. Every \$1 spent by the state on the university returns about \$7 in grant money from other sources, like the National Science Foundation or other federally supported agencies. In order to maintain these funds and grant money from other sources, state funding is required to maintain that faculty that help bring in federal funds.

Good Morning House Finance Committee,

Today I am writing you to provide a brief written testimony of my thoughts regarding the purposed budget cuts. I have had the opportunity to call Alaska home for almost 13 years and dearly love this state. I have spent a large portion of my time in the state enrolled at the University of Alaska Anchorage. At this time I am enrolled as a PhD student in Alaska's only APA

accredited Clinical Community Psychology program through UAA. I am in my sixth year in the program and am currently working on completing my dissertation which I plan to defend in the next few months. I have had the opportunity to work at Providence Family Medical Center, which specializes in serving the underserved, and I currently work at North Star Hospital, another organization which serves many of our underserved community. As it is apparent, I have a strong stake in what happens to UAA and what happens to our mental health resources in our community. There are several topics that I would like to address that affect me directly as a student, a mental health care provider, and as a member of this community.

To begin, I would like to express an understanding that this is a difficult decision to make with multiple viewpoints to consider. However I also believe that there is a correct choice, a choice that will benefit the community both immediately and in the future. While this budget cut may lead to an immediate increase in money for those in need, it will also result in an immediate loss of income for those who no longer have jobs due to the budget cuts, a loss of this state's ability to grow its own professionals, and increased barriers for individuals trying to access healthcare and mental health services. It will also result in an *immediate* deprivation of resources to our community members who are already struggling.

These are all things that Alaska cannot afford. As a community we already struggle to fill professional positions and meet the needs of our underserved. The loss of educational programs would force Alaskans to go outside of the state to pursue their education, which would lead to a decrease in young professionals in our community and decrease the potential that these individuals would return to our state. I have witnessed first-hand that we also struggle to meet the needs of our low income and vulnerable portions of the community. Cutting Medicaid would increase these barriers that our most vulnerable neighbors face and lead to an increased deterioration of both of physical and mental health.

In conclusion, I implore you to reflect on how the budget cuts will not only affect the welfare of our community but our students' ability to give back and support our community. If you would like to discuss this further please do not hesitate to email me or call me at 907-250-8334.

Dear Honorable Representatives:

The following are my thoughts some of which have been printed in the *Anchorage Daily News* prior to the Governor's Vetoes and reflect my on-going concerns.

I believe that the legislature worked hard to develop a budget that was created through compromise and respect for the people. The Governor's Vetoes do not reflect my values and hopefully not yours.

From the Constitution of the State of Alaska, Article I Section I. Inherent Rights- *This* constitution is dedicated to the principles that all persons have a natural right to life, liberty, the pursuit of happiness, and the enjoyment of the rewards of their own industry; that all persons are

equal and entitled to equal rights, opportunities, and protection under the law; and that all persons have corresponding obligations to the people and to the State.

Budgets are moral documents and the Governor's Vetoes and the impacts on the budget do not reflect my values. I specifically want to reiterate that *all persons have corresponding obligations to the people and to the State*. We are the government and together we provide the things that we, as individuals, cannot provide alone. This includes the care of those who are unable to care for themselves. It includes the education of our children and the education of our young adults. It includes our seniors, our infirmed, and our indigent.

People of Alaska, legislators, government employees, hardworking individuals in private industry, entrepreneurs, and those who struggle to live each day, we are all here together. We are fighting over "our" piece of the pie. There are needs and there are wants. There is enough to go around and for everyone to get what they need and to get some of what they want. We are not going to get all that we need, let alone what we want, unless we look at revenue instead of cuts. It is time for compromise and clear understanding that the conditions that have gone into effect, or will go into effect, do not reflect our values. This state is wealthy and can provide for today and the future with careful consideration for the good of all. We have the knowledge of how to invest our wealth that will benefit all if we choose to be creative and caring.

As a person of faith, I am grounded in the American Baptist traditions, covenants of faith, and liberty of conscience. I follow Jesus as a Christian. I am a Matthew 25 person." ...as you did it to the least of these you did it to me" (NRSV Matthew 25:40 b).

Yes, the budget is about education, healthcare, safety, transportation, and quality of life. The politics of scarcity and dominion over those deemed unworthy or "disposable people" is not who I am. I hope it is not who you are. I cannot support the disregard for "the least of these" that is blatant with the actions of the Governor's Vetoes.

An example of the issues is happening today, not somewhere in the future, occurred in a local nonprofit that provides services to mental health clients, those with traumatic brain injuries and those reentering society from prison. These people have lost the access to services due to grants not being distributed by the state even though the grants were approved. Others have lost services due to no knowledge whether the grants were approved or not. The people who were to provide the services are furloughed or laid off with no certainty of returning to work. The consumers or clients are not receiving food, shelter, medical assistance and the possibility of returning to health and work. There are no feelings of certainty due to the lack of the State's follow through on these agreements. Even if the dollars come through now (we hope when not if) unnecessary anxiety has been inflicted upon all of the people in the process. The trust in the system is gone and people have been harmed.

Please consider passing appropriations that will meet our needs and provide a healthy future for the citizens of Alaska.

Governor Dunleavy and Legislators:

Last night the Alaska State Council on the Arts (ASCA) closed its doors after both state and private philanthropy funding was vetoed by Dunleavy's disastrous moves. This after 53 years serving the people of Alaska. We are now the only state without an arts council.

As an Alaskan schoolkid in the 90's, I was a direct beneficiary of the arts education programs ASCA supports. It was working artists in my schools who first helped me know that art is a thing a person can do.

I credit ASCA entirely with jumpstarting my career as an Alaskan artist over the last five years. My first arts education jobs were through the amazing Artist in Schools program that ASCA supports. I attended two state-wide arts conferences organized by ASCA, and met working artists and representatives from arts organizations across the state. Through those conferences I was connected with a fellowship program with the Center for Performance and Civic Practice, which trained me as a civic artist. ASCA tied me to artists and arts organizations across the state. ASCA helped me not feel alone, helped me not feel isolated in my small town and life, helped me know that there are brilliant people making brilliant things in this state, and that I could know them, learn from them, and make my own work better and better. ASCA supported the idea that by working together we could build our communities and our state. ASCA staff, and the people they bring together, are so kind and generous. Such community builders. They answered the phone when I called. They responded to my questions about taxes, gave advice when I was nervous about an arts program I was running, helped me find places to sleep. You could not ask for better humans. I was just recently thinking... oh I need to call up Keren Lowell and ask her to connect me to this person and that person... and now the phone lines at ASCA will be dead.

It is absolutely imperative that we bring ASCA back. Not just for us working artists, but for the culture and vibrancy of our communities and our state.

I do NOT support the Governor's plan for a \$3,000 PFD. I do support receiving a smaller PFD and supporting key public services in our state, including ASCA, public education, public safety, public transportation, and services for seniors. The vast majority of Alaskans support this as well. Please do your work to represent us and the future of this state. I would much rather have a future for Alaska than \$3K in my pocket for one year. Without a university, ferry system, pioneer homes, arts council and the economic power these systems create, \$3K won't get me much more than a ticket out of here.

I've decided to just say who I am and why we know cuts to early childhood education will be more expensive in the very near future. I sincerely hope that I receive a response that is more than just the "cookie cutter" we've received your email jargon. I hope that someone reads this and takes some action. We all know that there must be cuts, but this is not the place.

I am going to stay focused on what we, this state and the rest of the nation, 100% know about early childhood education and how we also know that it directly affects the budget in the very near future. So here we go.

My name is Janene Lovelace. I am an Early Learning Coach in Kenai for thread, I've been in early education for over 10 years now. thread is Alaska's Child Care Resource and Referral Network. My job is to train, educate, and coach early care providers (in child care homes & centers) and preschool teachers for multiple school districts and Head Starts across the state of Alaska from Barrow, to Nome, to Fairbanks, to Sitka and everywhere in between.

Here is what we know, from the piles of existing data we've now collected about early childhood education; how very important early care and education is during a child's most vulnerable years. The brain requires multiple inputs: It requires stimulation and care to spark neural connections across multiple regions of the brain. It requires access to good quality early childhood education programs that provide children with early cognitive and language skills, build social competency and support their emotional development. It requires good health and nutrition to feed and nourish the architecture of the body, including the brain. It requires safety and protection to buffer against stress or trauma and allow absorption of nutrients for growth and development of the nervous system - including the brain. Early stimulation and interaction with qualified, educated caregiver's jump-starts brain development and promotes well-being.

We don't have to prove it anymore and we can't pretend we're not aware. We know that children receiving quality early care have shown improved cognition and language skills, have lower school drop out rates, and are even less likely to commit crimes...I'm seeing a huge savings here...how bout you? We know that the impact we have in those early years, and the advantages that we give children by providing quality care has long lasting affects on their success in life.

We need to stop looking to early childhood care and learning to make the sacrifices. Investing in Early Education doesn't just save the state money, it **BUILDS** the economy.

As a parent, an educator and a concerned tax paying Alaskan...I cannot possibly imagine a more important segment of the population to invest in. The health and education of the very youngest in our communities needs to become a priority to Alaska for their future and for ours.

Hello,

As you can see from my signature block, my life work involves efforts related to FASD but I think this disability intertwines with virtually every aspect of the proposed bill.

Medicaid is critical healthcare for thousands of Alaskans and needs to remain as fully funded as possible. Reducing the provider reimbursements is going to impact my team colleagues further (and they have already reduced the # of Medicaid clients they will see due to previous reductions). Most of the team members' current reimbursement rates are pretty pathetic and I am lucky they still want to work with the team to do this complicated diagnostic work.

Treatment programs for Behavioral Health, Addictions, Hiland Mountain, and therapeutic courts are also critical programs in my view. If we had a way to screen the folks in these programs effectively, I would venture that a fairly high percentage are seeking solace in bottles and substances and/or are in trouble with the law because they have a) trauma history and b) undiagnosed brain-based differences that are negatively impacting their ability to function effectively in adulthood without supports. If someone has an FASD and has gone through most of their life without a diagnosis, I can vouch for the fact that they believe it is their fault and they are a bad person...because they tell me this and their self-soothing behaviors are the option they've selected for treatment (often when treatment programs are SO limited...or do not meet the needs of someone with an FASD). I had one birth mother tell me that it was easier to go to the liquor store than to jump through all the hoops for a behavioral health appointment/service.

Individuals who are 'failing adulthood' end up homeless, in the OCS system, may need public defender services (because they get into trouble on a recurring basis) and would benefit from supportive special needs housing. I know this because I have worked with thousands of high social risk women over the years and know their life stories/trajectories. Homebased services & interventions made a difference for some of these women (the program Nutaqsiivik is still in operation at Southcentral Foundation today). We got some of them a diagnosis, they then qualified for supportive services, could keep a child when they had stable housing. The 'have a baby, OCS take the baby away' cycle shifted for these women once they had the correct supports in place.

Early Learning programs are well-researched and we know that children who attend these programs benefit long term AS DOES THE STATE in terms of future life prospects for these kids as they age. This funding needs to be supported at the highest level we possibly can manage.

In times of financial difficulty I would like the State to truly look at the redundancies that may exist between agencies (i.e. ABADA, AMHB, Trust; I'm sure there are many others that overlap & could be

merged) and believe that while travel for the Governor's Council group is important we have ways today to do effective meetings using online platforms that allow for visual and audio interaction and this needs to be considered as the way they do business for now.

I DO support the travel for OPA because GALs and others really do *need to see kids in their environmental setting* to make a good assessment & plan.

Thank you for your efforts to restore a sane budget for the coming year.

I was recently awarded a highly, competitive Centennial Post-Doctoral Fellowship, which promised to provide my employment for the next 18 months and with the eventual possibility to join UAF's research faculty. I was supposed to be hired this month, but now, because of the governor's extreme budget cuts, my fellowship funding may be taken from me in order to pay to balance a non-sensical budget. The university has already suffered repeated cuts year after year, but this unprecedented evisceration of university funding would be so destructive to the UA system that it may take more than a decade to recover. Thousands of people would lose their jobs (myself included), Fairbanks would lose one of its main sources of employment and culture, and the Alaskan economy will suffer needlessly as a result! First, I must mention that I find myself full of emotion. However, in an effort to temper emotions, I have decided to write my statement to the House Finance Committee and email it to the body. I was born in Fairbanks in 1975 and consider this great State my home. I graduated from Wasilla High School in 1993 and have lived both here at home and in the lower 48 ever since. After having lived in San Francisco for seven years, I moved back to Alaska in 2012. Through the "Come Home to Alaska" program which offered Alaska-born people who had moved out of state an opportunity to return home and receive a quality education at an in-state tuition cost prior to requalifying for the permanent fund dividend(PFD)/residency, I was essentially provided an affordable pathway to become formally

educated. Ultimately, I plan to attend medical school and become a physician. I have a desire to return to Alaska following medical school/residency and plan to practice medicine here. The recent news that the governor is withholding funding for WWAMI is particularly frustrating as this is the best opportunity for me to achieve my goals in an affordable way. This is also good for Alaska and I do not understand this attack by the governor to such an amazing partnership and program.

I began my undergraduate degree at the University of Alaska Anchorage in the Fall of 2012 and through hard work and dedication to my goals/dreams, I graduated with my Bachelor of Science Degree in biological sciences/microbiological sciences option this Spring, 2019. I recognize this achievement was realized through my own efforts, but I also know that I could not have done this alone. I was enabled to achieve this milestone through the incredible support of my family, my friends, my employers, my clients, my community, my university, and my State. During my time at UAA, I worked a full-time job in my already established career as a hairdresser, as well as working a part-time job as a medical scribe in the emergency room at Providence Alaska Medical Center. I have even found time to volunteer on a semi-regular basis and have been able to shadow doctors in a variety of disciplines to increase my exposure to possible future interests in specific areas of focused medicine. Also, during my time at UAA, I have been exposed to amazing and knowledgeable professors and other faculty. During my Junior year, I was given the opportunity to participate in undergraduate microbiological research by Dr. Khrys Duddleston, Professor and Director of the Department of Biological Sciences at UAA. Through the mentorship by the graduatestudents in Dr. Duddleston's research lab as well as Dr. Duddleston herself, I have learned marketable skills above and beyond the knowledge obtained in the classroom. Dr. Brandon Briggs, Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences has also been instrumental in my educational experience at UAA. Countless other faculty and professors have inspired and taught me. This has allowed me to discover new passions and I cherish these opportunities as I have been able to evolve the purpose of my life. I will forever live in gratitude for those relationships I forged during my time as an undergraduate at UAA.

One of the most important skills I learned as an undergraduate is how to write a research grant proposal to secure funding for my own self-designed microbiological research project. I submitted my proposal to the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship which is associated with the Honors College at UAA and it was ultimately funded. This was a big win for me and will open other doors in the future. I am spending this summer doing the work of my research in Dr. Duddleston's research lab and I am enjoying the extended time on campus, post graduating. Research is a fundamental cornerstone and crucial to the success of any institute of higher learning as well as to the progress of any society. At UAA, total research grant awards have been increasing in recent years and since 2013 external research funding has increased by roughly 23 percent. The win rate during FY17 was around 46 percent, well above the national average of 25 percent. At UAF, more that 46 percent of undergraduates participate in research opportunities above and beyond the classroom. Exposure to, and participation in research is a game-changer when searching for employment after graduation. The University of Alaska (UA) system is an amazing institution which we should all be proud of and invested in its success and the success of its students. I understand that one's desire and fortitude play a large role in what that individual gets out of his or her own educational experience, but it is perhaps just as necessary to have the support and mentorship by professors/faculty, and FUNDING. I found all of those components at UAA. So, for me, I do not understand how members of our legislative branch as well as the governor who received their degrees from the UA system can stand on the side that would cripple, perhaps permanently, our State's PUBLIC institution of higher learning. It seems more prudent to invest more, not cut funding. What I hear this governor saying is that the UA system is not worth the investment. I hear him saying that the students and future students are not worth the investment. Well I absolutely do not agree with his

sentiment. I recognize the value of our public university and I recognize the world-class educational opportunities afforded me and all students.

I fully understand that our State is NOT experiencing a fiscal crisis, but to quote Senator Bishop, rather a "political crisis." This crisis is being perpetrated by the governor and those lawmakers who entertain him. Unacceptable. We are better than this. I am very disheartened by the fact that the work (quite frankly, the miracle) that was realized in the senate through a unanimous passing of a responsible budget containing modest cuts and providing a \$600 million surplus by the thoughtful diligence of a bipartisan body went largely unnoticed and uncelebrated and eventually vetoed by the governor. Disheartened indeed, especially at a time when we see the breakdown of communication all around us. The governor behaves as though he wants chaos and disruption and he is empowered by the 22 lawmakers who chose to meet in Wasilla last week instead of meeting with the majority in Juneau. This completely overshadowed the big win in the senate we all should have been rejoicing and supporting all so that nearly \$2 billion could be distributed to Alaskans in the form of an unsustainable and unnecessarily inflated PFD. While I am a registered Democrat, I was particularly impressed with some of the comments made by several Republican legislators during last week's floor session, especially Senator Natasha von Imhof; "Sometimes you have to spend money now in order to avoid spending much more money later," as well as "To my fellow Alaskans; what kind of State do you want to live in? What kind of future do you want? I want one we can all be proud of. One based on a shared positive vision, constructed by hard work and cooperation and collaboration. That is what we are elected to do." I agree whole-heartedly with Senator von Imhof's sentiments.

I want to voice my appreciation for the swift response by Representative, Matt Claman to an email written by me and the graduate students in my research lab which was sent last week sharing our stories and voicing our concerns regarding the governor's budget vetoes. It is incredibly important for our representation hear us and listen to us. Also important is the acknowledgement that they are listening to us, their constituents. However, I must voice my frustration with Senator Mia Costello (one of the 22 lawmakers refusing to travel to Juneau last week) who has yet to respond to any phone calls or emails I have sent. Unacceptable. The governor is playing a very reckless political game with real consequences. This is not only willfully ignorant, irresponsible and reckless, but it also seems immoral. The governor does not believe that his actions and his budget vetoes will hurt the Alaska's economy, however there are many more qualified professionals and regular Alaskans who disagree with his narrative.

I appreciate that the House Finance Committee has started a working document called HB2001 which will provide a reallocation of funds previously vetoed by the governor. I support a minimal permanent fund dividend; \$929 I believe is what is being proposed. I would much rather give up my dividend entirely than receive one totaling \$3000 if it meant that funding was restored to every area currently threatened by the governor. I am not alone in this conviction. Polling shows that over 70 percent of Alaskans disagree with the governor and want funding restored. You must listen to your constituents. Subject: Testimony on Alaska Budget

Education must be supported in this state. If you do not act in this session and the next to protect it, this will be the only state in the union without a University. This could happen either through hesitancy, through inaction, or through participation in hyper-partisan drama. Partisanship will not help us right now. Political self-protection will not help us. We need leaders who are willing to take a stand for all of Alaska.

Every state in the US has a state university, and every state supports social programs that help the vulnerable, protect the arts, and help people gain skills leading to employment. Every state except Alaska also has some kind of state level taxation. Alaska did, too – until the oil boom arrived, with its promise of oil profits, and the tax was repealed. If we had a state tax at this time, whether it were an income tax that progressively targets those with higher incomes, or a sales tax that could take advantage of out-of-state dollars, we would not be talking about this now.

Oil, as everybody knows, is a non-renewable resource. No state government can depend indefinitely on such a resource. Diversification is a basic principle in investment, as it is in everyday life; it cannot be avoided in government. Other sources of revenue must be found and used in order to support a state government and basic services to the population.

This crisis has produced a lot of public comment that has been very educational for me. I have read online postings recently from those who work for the state, insisting that the state will never be the same if the cuts to education and social services go through. I have also read postings from people who believe that it is important to restrict the power of governments over the people they govern, and that this can be accomplished in part by limiting the money that these governments spend. I support both these positions philosophically, but neither position leads inevitably to the deletion of government

support for education and services for the vulnerable. Support for education, in fact, is required by the Alaska Constitution. Support for vulnerable residents of Alaska should be a high ethical priority. If the question is how to pay for what our government should be doing, the answer must include consideration of revenue as well as expenditure.

I believe that the way to solve our problems is to impose a state tax. If this were to be an income tax, I would propose that PFD distributions not be taxed; at present, they are taxed federally, and if they were taxed at the state level as well, this would be a hardship to recipients. Taxation need not disturb PFD distribution, which many feel is a uniquely important aspect of Alaska residency. I see the imposition of a reasonable level of state taxation as a good way to regain control of our budget.

I am a proud UAA Alumni and a current UAF Graduate student. I am a parent of two children, my son thriving today in part, thanks to early interventions in Head Start and the MSBSD preschool program. I have worked in rural Alaska in the Head Start program and seen the positive impact on many children and families. Early intervention is an investment in Alaska's future.

When I first enrolled at UAA my children were toddlers, we were homeless and lived in shelters. With a lot of hard work and support from many of the programs the Governor's vetoes will defund, I have been able to reach many of my goals and today serve my community through my work in the non-profit sector. We continue to struggle with bills at times and not receiving our full PFDs has had a huge impact on our lives, I understand those frustrations. Hacking a way at basic public services is not the way to solve this. As an Alaskan I believe other Alaskans deserve these same opportunities, public services and resources, please, do not let those bridges crumble by allowing the Governors Vetoes to stand. Receiving a bigger PFD is not worth the cost of the well being of our community.

Many of my peers in the non-profit sector are at risk of loosing programs & jobs and we are all fearful of what will happen to the clients we all serve without these programs.

Our Elders, including my children's grand parents, who have built and served this state have lost their safety net of Senior Benefits and some at risk of loosing their housing.

Thousands of Alaskans will loose their jobs in the coming months. Rural Alaskans will face energy costs that will make it even harder to for Villages to survive. Homeless Alaskans will die on the streets of Anchorage and woman and children will stay in abusive relationships with out adequate funding for homeless shelters.

We are not a resource colony for the oil companies. We are Alaska we share common values, we know how to take care of each other, as our Representatives & Senators we ask that your actions reflect those values. These cuts will tear our state apart, i have only listed a few of the impacts we will all feel, they are not good for our economy or our people, those that are the most vulnerable hit the hardest. # My testimony:

#### Honorable Committee members:

Please accept this email as my written testimony in support of HB 2001, the "surplus PFD bill, as introduced Monday, July 15, 2019—hopefully without any modification. I was in State government when the Permanent Fund was created; it was a thoughtful, well considered effort established to secure Alaska's future when the oil revenues ran out. Like many sovereign wealth funds however, it almost immediately came under scrutiny by many of the time viewing it as a potential source of funding to be plundered and spent for whatever needs or wants select legislators and their base thought important at the moment—business loans, new construction projects, etc., etc. To protect the corpus from being so plundered, then Governor Hammond and others proposed giving out a small portion of the Fund's income to all Alaskans, placing priority on their respective longevity in the State. Thus was the PFD born, reasoning that the citizens would thereby protect the corpus from being frivolously spent.

Well, the concept worked for awhile, until (1) the courts removed the longevity constraints and (2) the corpus grew until the outdated formula for computing the PFD distribution caused it to grow into the voracious monster it now is with its \$3000 valuation. At the same time, as predicted and understood by the founders of the fund, oil revenues have fallen through inevitable production decline and world markets to the level that Alaska now needs substantial income from the PF to support its core needs and institutions as the founders originally intended. Sadly though, despite fantasies of a minority of Alaskans there is not enough PF income to justify both a \$3000 dividend and covering the State's basic needs.

Thus, while I agree with then Governor Hammond that a small dividend is probably a useful tool to protect the corpus of the PF, it should be reduced to a modest level comparable to the original 1982 dividend of \$1000 or less. HB 2001, the "surplus PFD bill" does exactly that. I am counting on you to pay the bills, keep the lights on and if anything is left, then and only then consider a small dividend.

Esteemed members of the House Finance Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify last night in Anchorage. Here are the remarks I shared, in writing:

I am here today as a mother of two young children, and as a member of a grassroots group of parents and caregivers called Growing Alaskan Leaders. As we consider this appropriations bill, our hearts and minds are of course with children, and with that frame we ask you to do what is right for Alaska's children and Alaska's future, and use HB2001 to restore all of the vetoed funding and restore the designated funds lost in the sweep.

We know that not only our children, but ALL Alaska children matter. What happens to children early in life shapes their brains and bodies for the rest of their lives. If infants, toddlers, and preschoolers lose access to early childhood programs vetoed by the Governor, this will affect their brain development, their readiness for kindergarten, their high school graduation, their ability to parent and earn an income when they themselves are adults.

With children on our minds, we think about families fleeing domestic violence, and we ask you if you can preside over a budget that throws them to the streets (or, more likely, back their abusers). We ask you if this aligns with your tough on crime stance, and our shared dedication to reduce domestic and sexual violence, which is a tremendous problem for Alaska that I know you all care about.

With children on our minds, we think of the millions cut from mental health and rehabilitation grants, which pay for services that are vital for ending the cycle of child abuse and neglect that so plagues Alaska. With children on our minds, we think of parents with untreated dental disease trying to parent.

With children on our minds, we look at all of the cuts, and what kind of Alaska it creates for our kids. And for your kids, and your grandkids. A state that throws away the arts. A state that says to families in rural Alaska, "You can go cold in the depths of winter." A state that says, "Work hard in K-12 and then leave for your post-secondary education, because we don't want trained professionals here. And we don't want doctors here."

What kind of state is that? Is that the Alaska you envisioned when you ran for office? I know it's not.

I think if you search in your hearts and beliefs, most of you don't want the kind of state that the Governor and his Outside budget director are vying for. It is a deeply cynical vision they have for Alaska. And it is an outsider vision. It is a Koch Brothers vision. It is not our Alaskan way. We have always been a state that did things our own way, not the way that failed ventures from Kansas have done.

So, the question before you is: Which Alaska will you be remembered as working towards? Which vision for Alaska's children and families do you want on your name? Which future do you want to be responsible for?

Dear Members of the House Finance Committee -

I urge you not to follow the statutory formula for determining the Permanent Fund Dividend.

Following that formula will result in an unsustainable dividend this year and, increasingly, in future years. Soon, paying a statutory "full"

dividend will have to become the dominant state expenditure, forcing further annual reductions in all functions of state government. It won't be many years before there is little money for anything other than the dividend. Smart financial planning would have us reducing the amount of the dividend now.

In my opinion, funding the essential operations of the state, including the university, must take precedence over paying a dividend. I would be more than happy with the ~\$900 dividend that is apparently possible after Gov. Dunleavy's \$444 million in cuts have been reversed and without dipping into savings. Don't dip further into savings; doing so is unsustainable!

The PFD was originally supposed to build consensus for the protection of the Permanent Fund. Ironically, it has instead built a consensus for itself, which may eventually result in the demise of the Fund through overspending. If this happens Alaska will truly be poor.

Dear House Finance Committee Members,

As a lifelong Alaskan I am deeply concerned by the current budget situation. I now believe that establishing the permanent fund with dividends to all citizens was the greatest mistake ever made in our state. For many people a check in the mail each year has become more important than caring for our less fortunate citizens; than having excellent higher education opportunities to help keep bright people in the state; and than the arts which both enrich our lives and, in some cases, save our souls.

Seeing the greediness that is rampant in our state right now, my preference would be to abolish payments from the permanent fund. But I do realize that the funds have become a part of the annual budget for some of our citizens. And for that reason, I would support a more modest payment this year (closer to amounts paid out in past years). Ultimately, our state needs an income tax, which would be much fairer to everyone, particularly in light of how many people live outside but work in Alaska, paying nothing into the system.

Should the governor's vetoes go forward, and the dividend amount paid be as high as the \$3,000 being discussed, we will destroy many functions in our state and rob our children's future. Huge payouts are not sustainable. How many more services do we cut next year to keep paying out huge dividends. All the university? All of law enforcement, not just in rural Alaska? All road maintenance?

I am particularly distressed about the cuts to the university. Despite what many people seem to believe, the campus I am familiar with here in Fairbanks is a world class institution in many disciplines. I was a former dean at UAF and have already been asked by several faculty for letters of reference for jobs elsewhere. These are people who will easily get jobs at other institutions. We will lose the best and brightest. And, we will no longer have a world class institution for our children.

In talking with people, most are very supportive of the university, but several people have said they don't really care because they want "their" \$3,000 and the university being decimated won't affect them. In Fairbanks the university is a huge economic driver in the community. Every single person in this community will eventually feel the effects of losing much or most of our campus. There will be fewer people who need water delivered so water delivery drivers will be laid off. There will be fewer people to buy cars and need them worked on. There will be less incentive for stores to stay open and many will go out of business. And more.

The legislature worked hard to propose a budget that was reasonable and that would not destroy the economy of Alaska. Please use reason in setting a permanent fund amount for this year that will allow for the vetoed funds to be restored and for us to have a future. If reason does not prevail this year, I fear the situation will only be worse next year.

We had both done our PhD at UAF moved on to jobs first in Tennessee and then Montana, but it just wasn't Alaska nor Fairbanks. We were getting ready to start a family and we sat down one evening and listed the places we would most like to live that would lead to the highest quality life for us and our kids. Fairbanks was number 1 on our list because it was a vibrant college town offering many of the things we value in life with Alaska as it's backyard. Fortunately, in 2001 I landed a job at UAF and my wife a position with the National Park Service. We had our first child in 2003 and second in 2007 and until recently things have been pretty great.

However, the recent cuts proposed by Governor Dunleavy and the minority caucus are compromising our dreams. I ran my own business full-time for ten years and currently work for the University of Alaska Southeast. I have a sixteen-year-old daughter who will enter her junior year of high school this fall. I am writing to ask you to support and move forward with HB 2001 in order to overturn Governor Dunleavy's vetos.

The legislature passed a responsible budget that included cuts. It was great to see the legislature work together, make compromises, and responsibly represent the people of Alaska.

Governor Dunleavy's vetoes and proposed cut of \$135 million is not responsible. If it stands the damage will be difficult and perhaps impossible to reverse.

While I understand the dual appropriation was meant to protect the community campuses, because the services they rely on are part of the main campus budgets, and they are not setup (or accredited) to operate independently, they will likely suffer significantly, and some will likely close.

For the record, my name is Kevin Maier (spell out, not M-y-e-r-s). I'm calling from Sitka today, where I'm visiting to watch my son play in a little league baseball tournament. I have lived in Juneau since 2004, where I'm raising two boys, and work as a fishing guide and professor.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **favor** of HB 2001. And thank you for the hard work you are doing to find sustainable fiscal solutions.

I agree with the Governor that the PFD is important to Alaskans—especially our most vulnerable residents. I do not believe, however, that we should be forced to choose between funding PFDs on the one hand, and, on the other hand, funding K-12 and higher education, homeless shelters, and the countless essential services we rely on to live in this great state.

The Governor believes his budget is "sustainable, predictable, and affordable." While I'm not sure what it means for a budget to be "affordable," recent evidence suggests its ongoing reliance on the non-renewable resource of oil will mean it is neither predictable nor sustainable.

**Subject:** Medicaid Testimony

My name is Rosalie Makar. I'm 30 years old with Cystic Fibrosis and I rely on Medicaid for life saving treatments, medications and medical care. Cystic Fibrosis is a disease that affects the lungs and digestive system. My body produces thick sticky mucus that clogs my pancrease and lungs, and I spend a lot of time in my day to do medications and therapies to alleviate my symptoms, especially in my lungs. Because of a lung function of 40%, I can only work 15 hours a week, so I cannot afford my own insurance.

Currently I am in a review process that can take up to 90 days for a decision, and I am about 3 weeks from that 90 day mark, still without a decision. My coverage for Medicaid ran out in March and I am currently unable to have my nutritional supplies that only Medicaid covers. Which means I'm losing weight, and I need that weight to stay healthy, I was barely at a normal weight when I ran out of supplies. Supplies I rationed. Without Medicaid I am also unable to cover my Medicare Premiums, necessary tests, blood work, and possible hospitalizations. This is only a 90 day review that started before the veto.

With Medicaid's budget slashed to the bone with this veto, waiting for decisions and time spent waiting for meetings with case workers will increase because the case workers will be even more overloaded than they already are. People will lose badly needed programs. People like me who depend on these programs to live. Alaska's most vulnerable will suffer. Alaska will suffer.

As a 27-year resident of rural Alaska, I support House Bill 2001 -- with its substantially reduced PFD. Reducing the PFD is necessary to fund the items cut by Gov. Dunleavey.

Holding state services hostage to full funding of the PFD is absolutely irresponsible and is just pandering to individual pocket books. In fact, Gov. Mike Dunleavy's consistent promise to deliver a full statutory \$3,000 dividend is like that of a high school student council candidate who runs on a platform of lengthening the lunch period by 10 minutes and shortening the school day by an hour -- not realistic and counter to the mission of the school. In the same way, the state government is charged with managing the state for the greatest good; emphasizing a PFD over everything else is counter to that mission.

There is no way that even a full PFD would mitigate the impact of losing all the services that would be eliminated by the extreme budget cuts. Here are just a few examples:

Alaska would no longer be an attractive place to move to -- new residents, including qualified professionals whom we need, would face a state barren of services and not get the PFD anyway! Strong high school students would leave the state rather than attend of a university at half mast. The cost of living in rural Southeast would sky rocket without the ferry. I support HB2001. Please restore funding to all of the vetoed items.

The Governor made sweeping cuts with no consideration about long-term impacts (or short-term impacts, by the look of it). The Legislature, on the other hand, carefully weighed each line item, reduced greatly from prior years, and worked together to find compromise. These vetoes are a slap in the face to your hard work, as well as to the people of our great state.

I can't emphasize enough how short-sighted these cuts are. Many of them fund prevention programs, whether it's Medicaid, homelessness services, mental and behavioral health, or early childhood (which bolsters protective factors). All these services pay at returns of at least 7 to 1, and cutting them will end up costing the State much more money in both the short and long term. This doesn't even take into account the millions and millions of Federal matching dollars Alaska will lose out on. These cuts make Alaska a far less hospitable place to live and I personally know people who are already leaving or actively looking for jobs in other states.

Speaking of jobs, not only will all these services be cut, but so too will multiple hundreds of jobs be lost, creating an even bigger population of people who will need some of those very services. And when unemployment rates go up, alcohol misuse increases by 17% and DUIs go up 35%.

Arts, education, public radio are all equally important. Please do not pit these non-profit services against each other. Connection and access to art is a protective factor in all people, education *should* speak for itself, and public radio is absolutely critical for our communities in this state as a source of information. I could give statistics and numbers for each and every one of these devastating cuts, but they've been told to you repeatedly already. You are all fully aware that people will die because of these cuts, or you are denying data and will likely continue to do so. I recognize the importance of the permanent fund dividend and would much rather pay a more equitable income tax than make these regressive changes to the PFD that will have greater impact on folks with lower incomes, but it seems too late for an income tax this year. A bigger permanent fund will do nothing to save any of us, and these cuts will result in increased unemployment, increased homelessness and alcohol misuse, and death. Please Save Alaska.

# Dear government,

Alaska needs you to stand up for the invisible, and the dismissed. We are treading on dangerous ground by destroying all of our programs for not only the Arts council, education but those that assist our most vulnerable.

I need you to think about this for a moment, this has been my experience in this past several years, and it is a sad state of affairs..

Also note, I have attached my story of how I became disabled below.

Recently, due to what appears to be my belief system, I have been written off by a person I have known my whole life, no worries, I am sure there are several more that feel the need to use that as a weapon to shut me down, and shut me up. Just an FYI, how is that working for you? Love you all still. But here are a few things that has been gnawing at me from the inside out this last several years.

I have been trying to figure out and unfortunately, there is not a lot in the literature on disabilities and the role that religion, culture and beliefs play in sustaining discriminatory practices against persons with disabilities, but it has become even more blatant in the past couple years. O, and try asking someone, yeah, you will get no where, they are so blind in their justification of what they do, and because you don't want to hurt anyone's feelings, you find yourself stuck in

another prayer session where you are the one they are praying for. No I have not been fully healed yet, and no it hasn't gotten better. Thank you for thinking it though.

Many of these practices are exclusionary in nature and unfair. They are either embedded in or sustained by religion, culture and beliefs about disability and persons with disabilities. Everything in religion screams at a person with a disability and trains those who attend, that "hey look, someone who is worse off than you." It is sometimes hard to take the high road when every day there is someone pointing their fingers and telling a person with a disability or other life challenges, that it is their fault they are the way they are based on their culture, practices and belief system.

Some how we believe in a just world, which is the idea that all things happen for a reason, and that people like myself have a disability or became disabled, because they do not have enough faith, or They must have done something to deserve what happened to them, or maybe they didn't pray enough or they have hidden sins. Well I am curious to know what people think I did that was so bad that it justified a 20- ton boulder on my leg. Also, I would like to know where all these people who think they can cure me by touching and praying over me came from overnight. Not to be hurtful to those I know who believe this, but I am sorry, O, Wait, Sorry, I am not sorry, because what you do is hurtful, and although you mean well, you inflict shame, pain and self-proclaimed dominance upon me every time you think you are doing me a service. Love you, but

24 years, 1½ months and 2 days, I have come to terms with my disability, my feelings regarding those involved, and the pain I wake up to every morning. O and for those people who would like to lambaste me, or before someone decides to blast me about whining or using my disability to get sympathy, or that I don't know real pain... You don't get to trivialize my experience or anyone else's experience because you still haven't worked out your anger and feelings of loss

Over the better half of the last 4 years I have notices a steady growth in the lack of empathy, which has been taken over by an all-out mixed sick twisted, love and joyful celebration by those who look down upon those who are less fortunate. The sound of people nudging each other because those who didn't plan or made mistakes early in their lives are now getting the shaft and will have to pay for their mistakes. Dear Legislators of the Finance Committee:

I am sending this letter to you to express my deep concern over the State budget and to ask you to find funding for many of the areas Governor Dunleavy vetoed.

My family has lived in Alaska since about 1915, and this is the first time in my life that I have actually been afraid for our wellbeing and future. Citizens should never have to live in fear because of their own leaders actions or inactions.

My daughter intends to start her freshman year of college at UAA in the fall; that education is now up in

the air due to the 41% cut to UAA's budget. At a difficult time for any young person and their family - the transition into adulthood, this makes the future even more uncertain and difficult to navigate.

My son will be entering his senior year of college in the fall. In the summer he works for ADF&G counting fish at a weir. He has to have the money he makes at this summer job to be able to afford to pay for his college. I understand that the budget for his position is potentially in jeopardy.

I work for the local school district. Governor Dunleavy has cut the bond reimbursement for our new high school which leaves about a 2.6 million dollar deficit in our Borough's budget. Drastic cuts may be necessary in our school district to accommodate this massive shortfall. My position may have to be cut, which would leave my family unable to meet our financial obligations.

I have thus far only mentioned some of the personal ramifications to my family; I can only imagine that most citizens of Alaska will be impacted in someway by these vetos.

I know that our state has to make some sacrifices to be able to survive economically, but to strip our entire state of infrastructure like education, jobs, natural resource management, law enforcement, and medical coverage, is counter intuitive to the goal!

My primary concern is for my family of course, but I fear that without your intervention my family as well as the rest of the residents of our Alaska will be forced to move out of state or stay here enduring a substandard life.

I also feel that not enough has been done to procure other revenue sources - new industries, state sales or income tax, taxing oil companies at a higher rate, etc... No one can reasonably expect to maintain public services and have a healthy economy without diversified revenue streams.

You have the ability and duty to ensure that Alaskans can continue to maintain their standard of living despite fiscal challenges. This in an historic undertaking that can either set a good or fatal precedent for the way Alaskans will be treated and valued. As a lifelong Alaskan born in 1983 my parents weathered the 1987 housing price collapse and ended up underwater on their mortgage for many of my formative years, I know a lot about budgeting and making do with what you've got, but I also know about taking 2 or 3 jobs to make ends meet because some things are too important to cut.

As a business owner and entrepreneur I am appalled at the inability of our legislators to acknowledge that SB21 was an abject failure. the air due to the 41% cut to UAA's budget. At a difficult time for any young person and their family - the transition into adulthood, this makes the future even more uncertain and difficult to navigate.

My older son will be entering his senior year of college in the fall. In the summer he works for ADF&G counting fish at a weir. He has to have the money he makes at this summer job to be able to afford to pay for his college. I understand that the budget for his position is potentially in jeopardy.

I work for the local school district. Governor Dunleavy has cut the bond reimbursement for our new high school which leaves about a 2.6 million dollar deficit in our Borough's budget. Drastic cuts may be necessary in our school district to accommodate this massive shortfall. My position may have to be cut, which would leave my family unable to meet our financial obligations.

I have thus far only mentioned some of the personal ramifications to my family; I can only imagine that most residents of Alaska will be impacted in someway by these vetos.

I know that our state has to make some sacrifices to be able to survive economically, but to strip our entire state of infrastructure like education, jobs, natural resource management, law enforcement, and medical coverage, is counter intuitive to the goal!

I would also like to mention that more should be done to procure other funding for out state - encourage new industries, sales and income tax, higher taxes for the oil companies. No reasonable person believes that our public services and state of our economy can be maintained without diversifying our revenue stream.

My primary concern is for my family of course, but I fear that without your intervention my family as well as the rest of the residents of Alaska our will be forced to move out of state or stay in here enduring a substandard life.

You have the ability and duty to ensure that Alaskans can continue to maintain their standard of living despite fiscal challenges. This in an historic undertaking that can either set a good or fatal precedent for the way Alaskans will be treated and valued. Please make the difference that will set us back onto a prosperous path for future generations by ensuring they can be educated, employed, and live in this great state.

I hope that you will find funding to counteract Governor Dunleavy's vetos, and work double time convincing the Governor not to again veto your efforts.

Thank you for your time and hopefully for serving the best interests of your constituents.

I was moved to tears by Senator Click Bishop's testimony to the Board of Regents of the University of Alaska Fairbanks. I am a lifelong, born and raised Alaskan. What Dunleavey is doing to the budget of the university is more than a travesty. It is unconscionable. Please restore the budget that the legislature approved, which already represented a \$5 million cut to the university. That was painful but manageable. \$134 million is devastating, and completely unnecessary.

A friend of mine was approved for a loan to replace the leaking roof on their cabin. They were going to close on the loan soon. When the governor's vetos were announced, the credit union called her and said that the board of the credit union had decided not to loan any money to UA employees, because of the threat of layoffs. If he had ever called the police, a fire department, or an

I write to you today in support of the committee substitute for HB2001 - restoring funding to the parts of the capital budget that were unfunded, all funding vetoed by the Governor, and a reduced dividend.

The governor's budget as proposed <u>does not</u> reflect fiscal responsibility. Instead of taking a measured and metered approach to cutting State spending - an approach that would allow individuals, organizations and institutions to adequately plan and prepare for funding cuts over several years - the governor has taken a slash and burn approach, leaving many Alaskans reeling particularly those most vulnerable in our communities. I'm also writing on behalf of my parents, who have property and a home off Petersville Road, Trapper Creek.

We four constituents are extremely concerned that the budget cuts of Gov. Dunleavy's line item vetoes are already tipping Alaska into recession. "Recession" was what I read national economists predicting after the veto, and it sounded like a distant, but logical, possibility. After the Legislature failed to override the vetoes, "recession" no longer seemed distant. Almost everyone I've talked to is discussing their exit plan from the state. Friends with high school-age kids are no longer considering UA for their kids.

Please understand, this is NOT JUST GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES PLANNING TO LEAVE. How do we do the most possible with so little? The result of the Governor's vetoes would be to do the least possible. They are indicative of an administration whose priorities are far out of line with the people and particularly of the next generation of Alaskans. I find this reality to be very deeply disturbing.

When I think about the many reasons I've chosen Alaska as my forever home, what always stands out is the collective sense of community here. Southeast Alaska is a foggy place. If you live here long enough, you'll experience the phenomenon of being fogged out when trying to fly home, when the clouds are too low or the wind too strong for an aircraft to safely take off and land. This happened to me for the first time several Februaries ago in Ketchikan, Alaska. And as a 747 of disappointed people, some with small children, deboarded the plane and headed for the mainland, there was an overwhelming sense of us all being in the same boat, partly because we were--the airport of course being connected to the city by ferry. Ketchikan is a small community. There weren't enough hotel rooms that night to host everyone. As we waited in the first lobby, the rooms filled up, and as expected, not everyone got one. So we made our way to the next hotel, spirits high, pairing up so that when we inevitably ran out of rooms again, we could share what was left so everyone had a warm place to sleep that night.

Alaskans take care of each other. We look out for one another. After several jobs, I obtained a Special education endorsement at UAA and was immediately hired at East Anchorage High school where I worked for 29 years.

My wife and I have three amazing kids, all born in the early 1990s. We invested all their PDF dividends, ranging from \$800-\$2000 per year. Upon graduation the kids each had about \$45,000 for college.

Our oldest daughter had several nordic ski college scholarship offers from around the country. But she chose to attend UAA. She also received the Alaska Performance Academic Scholarship.

She graduated 4.5 years later with a civil engineering degree, gpa of 4.0 and was an all American skier collegiate skier three years straight. She now works for BP has a well intervention engineer with a very important job for Alaska. For over 5 years, she examined poorly producing oil fields and remediated them, making them producers. More importantly, she put more oil in the pipeline. She's gave back to the Alaska that invested in her, providing oil revenues that can be use for other Alaskans future.

My older boy also went to UAA, with the help of his PDF savings and AK performance scholarship. He received a civil engineer in degree and works for Stantec Alaska. His latest projects include working on erosion control near the trans Alaska pipeline as well as earthquake damage assessment and repair designs for bridges, roads and buildings infrastructure throughout the southcentral Alaska.

Lastly, my youngest boy decided to go to University Nevada Reno and major in electrical engineering. Here's the difference, he didn't have close education or economic ties in engineering firms in Alaska. He wasn't able to find a job up here and now lives and works as an electrical engineer in California. He was not given the opportunity to get back to Alaska like his siblings.

I fear that if UA loses 41% of it's funding, facility, and programs, our currently and future high school grads, will not have the opportunities my children enjoyed. Cutting UA is short changing our future generations.

Some Alaskans may disagree. They may see only dollars this year. They may see a checkbook that is running out of money. They may think overriding the vetoes is irresponsible govt.

I respectfully disagree. Without a strong University system, students will be limited and not given the opportunity to give back to Alaska. An investment in education dollars is well spent and has rewards. Our children depend on what legislators do this week. The vast majority of Alaskans hope they do what is right for them, their children and what's right for a future, strong Alaska!

To Whom It May Concern,

I would like to voice my opinions on some of the governor's vetoes.

First of all, I retired from teaching history at UAF in 2014. I taught there sometimes part-time and occasionally full-time from 1966 until 2014 with the exception of the academic years of 1969-1974, when my husband and I went out of state to obtain our doctorates. So I do feel a certain loyalty to the University of Alaska. I would like to point out that not only will cutting the University budget by 41% at this time devastate the economy of Fairbanks and the interior (which I think almost all the legislators from the interior realize), but the university itself will take at least a full generation--if not longer--to recover. Why? Because if the president of the university is forced to issue a declaration of financial exigency, meaning that he can fire tenured faculty, among other things which he would have to do), no self-respecting scholar will be willing to come here to teach anytime in the foreseeable future, even should full funding be restored in a year or two. It would simply not be worth the risk of having something similar happen again.

Secondly, I am recently widowed, and I do wish to that all members of the legislature for the Legislative Memoriam that they sent me this year.

As a widow, I have a limited but adequate income. My husband was vested in TRS (Teachers Retirement System) for many years, and he paid in extra all those years to cover me should he predecease me. As a result, after withholding, I receive slightly more than \$2,600 per month. I was never full-time long enough to vest in TRS. so when I was full-time I paid into ORP (Optional Retirement Program). My ORP account is administered by TIAA-CREF, and I receive from my retirement about \$11,000 per year. This comes in once a year payouts in December. Fortunately, we had the good luck to be able to save a lot of our money, and I have savings accounts in four Fairbanks banks. Also, my house is paid for. I own it free and clear. In other words, I am pretty well off financially. I do not need a \$3,000 PFD. I recently saw a letter in the Fairbanks Daily News-Miner suggesting that if people don't want a "full" PFD, they can donate it to the university. I wouldn't mind doing so, but that won't work, because the president of the university has to know up front how much money he has to work with. He can't wait until October and hope the donations trickle in.

I am also concerned about the people who have already lost their senior benefits. In my opinion it's really cruel to do that to one of the most vulnerable segments of the population. Dear House Finance Committee and Reps LeBon and Thompson--

Thank you for your time and attention in reading this message.

I'm an old guy.

5 years ago, I started spending my summers in Fairbanks.

I'm now an all-year resident of Fairbanks. I work here full-time. I love this place.

But I have a few observations:

We Alaskans are spoiled. We don't pay state income tax, and we don't pay sales tax (mostly). And yet we get fabulous services.

High-quality infrastructure, education (at all levels), good libraries, social services, arts, etc. And all across a far-flung geography with a relatively small tax base. And on top of that, we get a dividend, just for living here. It's really nice. I love it.

But how is this possible?

The answer, as we all know, is fairly simple.

Through a combination of luck, vision, good planning and management by past leaders, Alaska has benefitted from fabulous oil wealth for a generation or more. Oil exports are the goose that has laid the golden eggs. It's been great.

And we've become accustomed to it. Most Alaskans have never known a different way of life. We've come to accept all these services and dividends as normal. And when our sweet deal is threatened, we get very angry. "We deserve all of this. It's our right. Don't you dare take this wealth away from us. Don't ever ask me to pay taxes. It's my right to get great services without paying for them." As I say, we've been spoiled.

But the goose is getting old. It's the sad truth. Oil production and revenues are down. The golden eggs are getting smaller. There may be ways to delay the inevitable, but loss of state income is real, and no one wants to face it.

So what's a state to do?

In Ohio, where I lived most of my life, there's a constant discussion about what the state and local governments should do. And the benefit of each government function is weighed against the cost and who will pay for it. Should we borrow money to make this happen? Or raise taxes? Or cut services? It's never pretty or easy, and political power is always a big factor. But everyone accepts that, at some point, you have to pay for what you're going to get.

Alaska has had the luxury, for many years, of not making these tough choices. It's time to start.

Where do we begin?

I will start by pointing out that there are some human needs that are best met by individuals making choices about their own money\*. There are other needs that are best met by businesses competing in a free market\*\*. But there are also significant needs that are best met by governments\*\*\*: things that individuals can't do, and businesses won't do.

We Alaskans need to decide what these government-based needs are. Which ones are worth paying for, and how to pay for them.

As we decide, there will be people on one extreme, pushing extreme ideas, and loudly convinced that they are right. And at the other extreme, people will be equally vocal, emotional, and full of anger. And equally convinced that they are right. The extremes will not understand or accept each other.

But that's not what we need. We don't need ideology. We need ideas. Long-term vision. And honest discussion about how to best reach that vision. Meeting in the middle. Pragmatic trading of practical plans.

It is clear that, without the oil income of the past, Alaska cannot maintain its current level of spending long-term. And yet the state has real needs. We need to take care of our people now. We also need to build a sustainable future.

Taxes will be needed. I'm sure of that. I'm willing to pay for what we get. And I'm not the only one. It will take courage for a politician to ask for taxes in this environment, but it is necessary.

Alaska is a great land, with great institutions, great people and great resources. Please don't throw away our future greatness, in the name of false short-term economy.

Once again, thank you for your time and attention in reading this message.

Thank you for taking all that testimony, thank you for serving, and keep your chins up as you continue your important work.

Bradley K. Cruz, MD 1964 Loussac Drive Anchorage, AK 99517

I am a physician retired from private practice and now volunteering as WWAMI faculty member, as well serving as the Medical Advisor to the UAA Ultrasound Training Program.

I came to the public hearing today to urge the legislature to reverse sweep the previously approved funding for the UAA/WWAMI medical school. WWAMI funding was not vetoed outright by the Governor but the medical school was defunded nonetheless by the failure to protect the funds from being swept back into the general fund.

It would be a colossal error to close the medical school which operates economically at about a third of the national average per capita cost yet has the 2nd highest return rate (61%) of its graduates in the nation. That is 12 alumni, on average, return to Alaska to practice each year. Additionally, we gain another 2 physicians per year from other WWAMI schools. If you count only the 12 WWAMI grads we get back each year and divide by the annual state appropriation for the medical school, which I'm told is only about \$2.4M per year, Alaska is paying about \$200,000 per doctor. That is remarkably low. Common values cited for the cost of training medical students range from \$100,000-\$150,000 PER YEAR per student, or about \$400,000-\$600,000 per graduate.

How can the UAA/WWAMI school operate so inexpensively? They leverage volunteer time and efforts of local physicians, including many Alaska WWAMI alumni. They also have low salaries generally, so low that it is hard to recruit of state talent to come teach here. Most importantly, they leverage funding from the University of Washington. It is

true that the state pays the University of Washington \$70,000 per student but UW funds several faculty positions at the UAA/WWAMI campus and they provide the administrative overhead, which includes managing accreditation and faculty training/credentialing. That was the whole point of partnering with the other small northwestern state and the University of Washington: little states share the costs rather than pay the whole cost. UAA/WWAMI is cost effective.

Another thing to consider is that many physicians and other professionals who might want to move here will be deterred from coming to a state where there is no place for their children to get good local college training and, should their children aspire to become physicians. local medical training.

The bill under consideration in this Special Session concerns the PFD. Most Alaskans recognize the special importance of the PFD to Alaskans with incomes near or below the poverty level. However, the Governor's use of this issue looks like a cruel and cynical way to buy support for his widespread destructive budget cuts that will plunge the state into a protracted recession, harming a huge swath of the state's peoples but falling most heavily on the very people who are most dependent on the PFD. Even a full PFD calculated by the original formula will not make up for the economic losses that will result from the Governor's approach to the budget.

The bogus aspect of the current debate is the false choice of budget cuts vs PFD. I don't pretend to understand all the details of the various State savings accounts and the Permanent Fund's various categories of funds but surely there are other possibilities for funding the capital and Operating Budgets AND making a useful PFD payment. I leave to others the conjecture about the hidden motives that may be driving the effort to defund the government and other important institutions. The existence of a hidden motive would explain why the false choice and its associated nasty, divisive narrative have been pushed so hard.

Another concern I have is that full funding of current PFDs and rebating previous shortfalls in the PFD, as some have demanded, is a means to another end which is the long cherished goal, in certain quarters, of killing the PFD.

I applaud the legislators in the House Majority Caucus for standing up in opposition to the Governor and his vetoes. I hope that you can convince enough sensible legislators to reverse the Governor's course and avert the looming economic catastrophe.

I also hope that in the next regular legislature session next winter the legislators will make a more courageous attempt to raise new revenues AND cutback on payments to oil companies. Speaking for myself and my wife, we would not mind paying a simple and reasonable tax. It could be a simple tax formula since progressivity is not needed; it would be already built in by the presence of the PFD, which is like a poverty allowance tax credit or tax offset. You might get some popular support if the tax applied to money earned in this state by non-residents.

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## Dear Alaska Legislator:

Happy Fourth of July to you, and thank you for representing Alaskans like me. I know your time is valuable. I wrote a short email to you recently, asking you to vote to override the governor's vetoes, and I wanted to follow up with a longer one. I do not expect any response, but I will hold faith that you will have a chance to read it.

I'm a seismologist at UAF (Associate Professor of Geophysics). Here is one example of what I do: <a href="https://youtu.be/SsR\_fRDIQXk">https://youtu.be/SsR\_fRDIQXk</a>

This is a computer simulation of the magnitude 7.1 earthquake near Anchorage in November 2018. It was featured the day after the earthquake in an ADN story, and it has been viewed by 15,000 people (which is pretty good for a science movie). This is one example of the topics I study for my job. Later I will explain how I came to this job.

My main hope is that, as you contemplate voting to override the governor's vetoes, you take the time to recognize the three-part scope for the University of Alaska:

- 1) teaching
- 2) research
- 3) public service.

Most people equate 1) with a university's primary mission. For 2) I will offer my own story, below. I am also copying an email I received today from a highly respected person in my field. I was struck by his concern for our state and university, given that he is from outside the state and not even a collaborator of mine. Like me, he sees great opportunities for Alaska.

Instead, this governor will set the system back a half century, with horrible consequences for the state and its people. It's sad this governor is taking the approach to gutting the university that he is, but it's not unprecedented given the history of leadership of the state. His name will be indelibly written in history for this folly.

I hope you and your colleagues at the Geophysical Institute and the UA Fairbanks will be able to survive this attack, and continue the outstanding work that benefits the entire scientific community, and not just the people of Alaska.

I wanted to share my story about education in Fairbanks. In 1982 my dad (Walt Tape) accepted a one-year job to teach math at UAF. Along with him came my mom (Jeanne Tape), my brother Ken (age 5), and me (age 3). My dad wound up accepting a permanent position the following year, and we were here to stay. I regularly run into people in town or at UAF who tell me, "I took math from your dad." My mom taught English as a second language throughout the school district. She was an avid volunteer in Fairbanks. Although she wasn't much of an athlete herself, she recognized the positive impact of recreation on the community. She founded women's soccer in Fairbanks in the early 1980s, and she founded the high school soccer program (on virtually no budget) in 1993. Her name is on the pavilion at the FYSA soccer fields in Fairbanks.

I went to Woodriver Elementary School, Ryan Middle School, and West Valley High School in Fairbanks. Having grown up in Fairbanks, I was excited at the opportunity to pursue higher education outside Alaska. I attended Carleton College in Minnesota, then Oxford University on a Rhodes Scholarship (MS Geophysics), then California Institute of Technology (PhD Geophysics), then Harvard University (postdoctoral fellowship). For me, education was an opportunity to reach the highest level within my profession of seismology. The opportunity came along in 2010 when I noticed a national search for a tenure-track position in seismology at UAF. The main reason I pursued this job was the academic opportunity of world-class seismic data (Alaska Earthquake Center) combined with world-class high-performance computing (Arctic Region Supercomputing Center). It is difficult to envision any other career opportunity that would have brought me home. Luckily, I got the job.

I have a 12-month appointment at the Geophysical Institute at UAF. I receive 4.5 months salary for teaching at UAF, up to 3 months salary from Geophysical Institute (via State funds), and at least 4.5 months salary from federally funded, highly competitive projects that I pursue. 100% of my external funds are from federal sources, including the National Science Foundation, the USGS Earthquake Hazards Program, and the Department of Defense (Air Force Research Laboratory). Example projects include seismic hazards in Alaska and also global monitoring for nuclear explosions. Over the first five

years of my appointment, while bringing in my own 6 months salary per year from these projects, I have brought in \$2,154,983 to UAF as Principal Investigator, including \$640,649 in indirect funds that help support a wide array of services at UAF and UA. As co-Investigator on grants, I have helped to bring in \$3,685,033 to UAF (includes \$1,100,231 indirect funds). These funds (indirect and direct) help support a range of jobs at the university---not just the graduate students under my direct supervision. Funding from the State to Geophysical Institute is vital for me to pursue federal funding. In essence, the state is investing in me, and I am providing a strong return on the investment.

My brother Ken is a research professor at the Geophysical Institute at UAF. He does exceptional science and outreach at the interfaces between ecology, climate, wildlife, and snow. Last week he and his collaborators received an \$800,000 grant from NSF to study how beavers are expanding their territory into northern Alaska and impacting fisheries. Like all external projects, the funds for the project and the outcomes of the project will support a wide range of people in Alaska and at its university. Succeeding in such a project requires a healthy foundation of people and facilities at UA.

Education in Fairbanks, from elementary school to UAF, runs deep in my family. My children, 6 and 9, attend Pearl Creek Elementary School. Pearl Creek is an excellent school, though it is strained under large class sizes and stressed under continual discussions of budget cuts. Education brings everyone upward. Everyone. I am proud of Fairbanks and the people it produces. I want to remain a part of this community and continue to contribute to it. I need education to remain strong.

Please make every effort possible to support the University of Alaska and public education in the state of Alaska. Please have the courage to override the governor's vetoes and do what is best for the future of Alaskans.

Dear House Finance Committee Members,

I wish to testify in favor of a reduced PFD, restored funding for the items the governor vetoed as well as restored funding for items the governor swept including the power cost equalization fund, and the Higher Education Investment Fund.

I want to live in an Alaska that values education at all levels and public safety, that holds out a dignified helping hand to those who need it, and a state that celebrates our unique way of life through its arts.

My husband and I didn't move to Fairbanks for UAF, but we stayed because of UAF. The presence of a vibrant university campus in Fairbanks made our initial move here seem less risky in case our jobs in the private sector didn't work out. I eventually ended up working at UAF, and I've worked with students facilitating their research in fisheries, in geology, in biology, in engineering, in the arts. These students research herring and salmon fisheries stock management, new economically viable ore bodies, discover a new insect species, study better ways of building arctic roads, and making pottery glazes with Tanana river silt. The work of these students and their mentors make Alaska a better place, enhance economic activity in fisheries and mining, improve transportation infrastructure, discover more about the naturally inspiring world around us, and enhance our Alaskan culture with their art.

Like many employees in the UA system, I have taken advantage of the employee tuition waiver, taking classes to make me better at my job, and I'm currently pursuing a phd in geology. My phd research has been partly funded by Pogo Mine to study their gold extraction process, with the goal of improving their gold recovery. My phd research is an outstanding example of UA research partnering to the benefit of Alaskan industry.

While the cuts to the university system are personally gut wrenching, I'll probably be okay, the skills I've obtained at UAF make me an attractive employee in the lower 48. But I worry about my co-workers and their economic pain, I worry about arctic research that will be left undone by my colleagues who will leave. I worry about students who worked hard to become UA scholars and now may not be able to afford college. I worry about people whose teeth hurt and won't receive treatment. I worry about our seniors who can't afford groceries. I worry about the kids at The Door and where they'll go. I worry about folks in villages who need public safety help and none will be coming in time. I can't fix all these things with my pfd, despite my trying. But I can implore my legislature to help fix these things, because YOU CAN HELP FIX THESE THINGS!

FIX THESE THINGS! Restore the funding via a lower pfd. And add some taxes. I want to help pay for the Alaska I value.

My name is Chris Coffman and I have been a Fairbanks resident since 2005. I'm writing to express the urgency of passing HB 2001, which restores the funding to state agencies that was irresponsibly vetoed by Governor Dunleavy. Whereas his cuts would hurt thousands of vulnerable Alaskans, dismantle the university, increase crime, and plummet Alaska into a recession, HB 2001 would fully fund the capital budget and designate a predictable PFD while preserving valuable services that support the security and well-being of Alaskans. HB 2001 will secure a strong future for our state.

I would like to see funding broadly restored for the state services that Dunleavy would cut, and can speak in particular to the great importance of restoring funding to the University of Alaska as I have been a faculty member at UAF since 2005. During my work at UAF, which has ranged from first-year and community college level students through to Ph.D. candidates, one overarching theme has emerged: the key role that education plays in giving students a leg up in life. Although many of my students have experienced considerable hardship, their ability to access a world-class education at UAF has made their lives much better and interior Alaska's communities much stronger. The university shapes productive citizens and supports a strong Alaskan economy. Governor Dunleavy's veto would drastically reduce future students' options for education in their home state. Those who can afford to do so will likely leave for Outside schools, never to return. The loss of the large numbers of faculty and staff who will be forced to take their talents Outside will diminish the quality of remaining students' education. Moreover, as university personnel often stay in Alaska for decades, making major purchases from local realtors and businesses over a period of many years, these departures will throw our communities into a recession. Alaska will be far weaker because of these losses.

HB 2001 can prevent these losses to Alaska, and I urge you to support it. Thank you for your service in the Alaska House at this critical time—a time that offers you the opportunity to be on the right side of history by rising above those who would divide Alaskans and by voting to secure a viable future for our state.

# Resolution 19-50 Urging the Legislature to Reverse the Vetoes and Restore Critical Funding

WHEREAS, Maniilaq Association (Maniilaq) is an Alaska Native regional nonprofit organization providing health, social, and tribal government services to twelve communities in Northwest Alaska; and

WHEREAS, Maniilaq is also a tribal organization, as defined in the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act, under which authority Maniilaq compacts and contracts with the Indian Health Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs to provide programs, functions, services, and activities on behalf of the federal government; and

WHEREAS, Maniilaq's vision is, "Healthy people, thriving communities" and its mission is "Savaqatigiiksugut (we are working together). Working together to provide high quality, culturally relevant health, social and tribal services"; and

WHEREAS, The State of Alaska has a constitutional responsibility to provide for the public education, public health, and public welfare of all Alaskans pursuant to Article VII of the Constitution; and

WHEREAS, On June 28, 2019, Governor Dunleavy vetoed \$444 million from the FY20 operating budget, which together with the \$190 million in reductions by the Legislature represents the largest single-year reduction in State history; and

WHEREAS, The Alaska Legislature failed to override the vetoes during a special session; and

WHEREAS, The vetoes will cause a statewide economic recession and immediate, irreparable harm to residents of the Maniilaq Service Area, with basic human needs going unfulfilled, increased stress, increased medical and behavioral health needs, and a sharp decline in quality of life; and

WHEREAS, Examples of vetoes of concern are as follows:

- Complete elimination of Medicaid Adult Preventative Dental will result in the loss of thousands of jobs, send the State back into recession, and will require provision of more expensive acute and emergency care;
- Cuts to Medicaid will restrict Maniilaq's ability to provide health care to children, the disabled, and the elderly;
- A 15 percent cut to behavioral health grants will reduce Maniilaq's ability to provide critical mental health care services to at-risk clients, in a region that has among the highest suicide rates in the nation;
- Elders, recipients of public assistance, and the homeless will suffer without the modest assistance from the State and services, and they will place increased demands on Maniilaq and similar organizations lacking a budget for filling this unexpected gap in funding:

- The public safety crisis plaguing Rural Alaska will be exacerbated; even under FY19 funding levels villages in our Service Area only had a part-time public safety presence;
- Elimination of early childhood education programs will undermine the health and wellbeing of Alaska's children and jeopardize the future of our State, and cuts to the University of Alaska will negatively impact the pipeline of health care and other professionals from the U of A to our organization;
- Elimination of funding for the Alaska Legal Services Corporation (ALSC) will result in no comprehensive legal support to the low-income Alaskans served by the Kotzebue ALSC office.

WHEREAS, The Governor has clearly expressed intent to eliminate the Power Cost Equalization, Community Assistance, and other important programs for Rural Alaska; and

WHEREAS, The failure to secure a ¾ vote to utilize Constitutional Budget Reserve funds and conduct a reverse sweep jeopardizes nearly \$1 billion in federal infrastructure spending and critical programs, and has resulted in a complete lack of funding for Power Cost Equalization, among other programs, which will create tremendous hardship in our Service Area and will cripple Rural Alaska.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Maniilaq Association Board of Directors implores the Alaska Legislature to prevent an economic recession and put Alaskans first by passing budgets that honor all Alaskans, including the Elderly, children, and Rural Alaskans.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Maniilaq Association Board of Directors urges the Alaska Legislature to reverse the vetoes in the FY20 operating budget without delay.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Maniilaq Association Board of Directors urges the Alaska Legislature to conduct a reverse sweep to restore funding to the Power Cost Equalization Program.
