

ALASKA LONG TERM CARE OMBUDSMAN

The Alaska Long Term Care Ombudsman's (LTCO) mission is to reduce abuse, neglect and exploitation of Alaska's most vulnerable elders.

It is difficult for elders to complain about staff as they are dependent on them for their most basic care needs, so it is important for LTCO to visit often enough to develop trusting relationships with the elders.

Staff and Volunteers

- New State LTCO started in December, 2019
- The office has 6 full time staff
- LTCO works closely with community partners including Adult Protective Services, Residential Licensing, Nursing Home Licensing, the Office of Elder Fraud and the Alaska Commission on Aging.
- LTCO leverages community resources through our volunteer program – in FY19 60 certified volunteers logged 903 hours.

Data for 2019

- In FY19, LTCO visited **19** nursing facilities and **269** assisted living homes where **3,305** elders live in **28** communities across Alaska.
- The LTCO made **1,008** unannounced visits to facilities licensed to serve seniors.
- The LTCO resolved **97%** of the **583** complaints to the satisfaction of the elder, including:
 - **25** incidents of financial exploitation; **16** complaints of abuse; **71** incidents of neglect; **114** cases of evictions.
