FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2020 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Analysis

This bill redefines registration periods for sex offenders and child kidnappers and allows them to have their information removed from an internet sex offender registry if they petition the court and meet certain criteria. This bill establishes parameters in statute that comport with the Alaska Supreme Courts holding in Doe v. Department of Public Safety, 2019 WL 2480282 (Alaska 2019). It is unclear how much litigation will be generated from this legislation. There are currently 3,451 people on Alaska's sex offender registry. Each of these people would be eligible for a hearing to allow them to be removed from the registry that is published on the Internet if they meet the criteria outlined in the bill. In addition, if they are initially denied removal, they may petition the court again after two years. This may result in multiple hearings for each individual petitioning for removal. The Department of Law has estimated it would need a minimum of two additional attorneys and two additional support staff in order to meet the new workload that is anticipated as a result of this legislation. Based on this estimate, the Office
