Good morning,

I am addressing my brief comments to the Finance Committee. I wish to express support for funding for public radio in general. It's worth is especially noted during this critical time of coronavirus response.

I am concerned about the lack of transparency in oil taxation and in the generous incentives to oil industry to encourage drilling in Alaska. I think this funding could be reigned in.

I firmly support the Alaska Marine Highway System and regular, safe, frequent travel between coastal communities. These ferries are a lifeline to medical services including childbirth services, groceries, recreation, education and business, not to mention visitor travel. Service needs to be strengthened and restored. AMHS is an identified state "essential service" and should be treated as such.

To that end, the \$40 million funding for the proposed Kake-Petersburg Road, the funding for which originated in Roads to Resources, needs to be shifted to the Alaska Marine Hwy System. This proposed road is highly controversial, has wildly speculative benefits, was analyzed by Federal Highways Administration once already and found not to meet its stated purpose, and takes ferry access physically off the island on which Petersburg is located which means foot traffic into our downtown core (and the revenue it generates) will now be eliminated. Andy Hughes of ADOT previously acknowledged to the Petersburg Assembly back in around 2013 that declining state maintenance funds would not likely be available for such a low use road. Senator Stedman seems to be the primary champion of this project, for reasons none of us can determine. Kake residents told FHWA that if built, they would not use the road. Petersburg would have no easy access, as it would require a vehicle and a shuttle ferry to even get to the road. Who would operate that shuttle is a question, as it would not be a profitable private business opportunity. Unlike the ferry system, the road would be unreliable and unavailable during the winter.

I wish to express support for funding for education, including the University system. We need to stop gutting our universities. They provide education, research and economic value as well.

And finally, I advocate an override of the Governor's veto of fund capitalization for Community Assistance, and am in favor of restoration of additional funds to keep communities as whole as possible during these challenging times.
