


Senior and Disabilities Services Mission


Senior and Disabilities Services Operating Budget Changes FY2021-FY2022 (in thousands)

 - \$250.0 under SDS Senior and Community Based Grants for Aging and Disability Resource Center grants.

Grant Services



• Children birth to age 3 at risk for or experience a developmental delay.






Senior and Disabilities Services – Medicaid Program

Total Cost \$51,551.9

- Personal Care Services is a State Plan Service with a 50% Federal and 50% General Fund Match.
- Community First Choice is a 56%
 Federal and 44% General Fund Match.






Senior and Disabilities Services – Home and Community Based Waivers

Total Cost \$273,112.7

- Home and Community Based Waivers receive a 50% Federal and 50% General Fund Match.
- Four of five Home and Community Based Waivers are currently going through a five-year renewal period beginning July 1, 2021.






Senior and Disabilities Services – Institutional Placements

Senior and Disabilities Services – COVID-19 Response

Senior and Community Based Grants received:

- \$6,340.0 through Families First Coronavirus Relief Act (FFCRA) and Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Stability (CARES) Act under Title III & Title VII of the Older Americans Act to specifically serve target population of 60+ and caregivers.
- \$300.0 through the Administration for Community Living (ACL) "Special Programs for the Aging,
 Title IV and Title II Discretionary Projects" to serve individuals, all ages and disabilities, through
 Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) Assistive Technology Project.
- \$840.0 through *Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021,* supplemental funding under Title III & Title VII of the Older Americans Act to specifically serve target population of 60+ and caregivers.



Senior and Disabilities Services – COVID-19 Response

Senior and Community Based Grants, awarded:

Last quarter, FY2020:

• \$470.6 to existing Nutrition, Transportation, and Support services grantees (31 grantees).

FY2021:

- \$1,002.5 to existing Nutrition, Transportation and Support grantees (31 grantees).
- \$1,517.9 to existing grantees providing services to seniors through Nutrition, Transportation and Support programs; National Family Caregiver Support programs; Adult Day and Senior In Home programs (20 grantees).
- \$731.4 through a competitive Request for Proposal (8 grantees).
- \$246.0 to Aging and Disability Resource Centers to implement assistive technology in partnership with Assistive Technology of Alaska (6 grantees).
- \$1,200.0 pending award to existing grantees in the last quarter of FY2021, proposals currently being reviewed, final amounts to be determined.

Anticipated, FY2022:

• \$840.0 to be awarded to existing Nutrition, Transportation and Support services grantees.

Electronic Visit Verification	Implemented January 1, 2021.
Appendix K Flexibilities/Post-Pandemic	Received Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approval to extend flexibilities to six months after the end of the federal public health emergency.
Cost Containment	SB 74 (2016) reforms continue; established Aging and Disability Resource Centers as the "front door" to access Long Term Services and Support services; continued refinements in service delivery.
Improving Transitions	Improved processes and communication with Behavioral Health, Office of Children's Services, Alaska Psychiatric Institute, and Community Partners to facilitate safe and Appropriate Transitions from Long-Term Placements
Partnerships	Continuing stakeholder engagement to identify where and how state-funded long-term services and supports can be improved and streamlined
