I write in rebuttal to Matt Alward-executive director of UFA's letter smearing Marit Carlson Van-Dort.

Mr. Alward as the head of UFA, is a Kodiak fisherman. I myself am now a Kodiak fisherman as we do not have a salmon fishery in Chignik for the forseeable future.

His letter is nothing more than a smear tactic due to actions taken by the State Board of Fisheries in what would limit Kodiak's salmon seine fleet to fish at a known area where extremely large amounts of NOT ONLY Chignik bound sockeye in June, but also Cook Inlet bound sockeye post June are intercepted by Kodiak's salmon seine fleet.

This fishing area was an entitlement bestowed upon the Kodiak salmon fleet in 1977-78 by THAT board of fisheries and the Kodiak salmon seine fleet benefitted for decades while taking food off of children's plates in Chignik. Tagging studies indicated 90% of sockeye harvested at Cape Igvak were Chignik stocks, and the harvest numbers year after year when commercial fishing is open at Cape Igvak have been staggering.

This is the director of UFA attacking Marit Carlson Van-Dort much like Louise Stutes did in the 2020 January Kodiak board of fisheries meeting in Kodiak.

The facts are they are trying to reverse a board decision and the first step is to remove certain individuals and replace them with people who will vote the way they want.

As Stutes-Kodiak has introduced 3 times in the last 3 legislatures a version of what is now HB 26, the conflict of interest bill which will make it so normally conflicted out board members may deliberate on issues right up until the roll call vote, with the first filing in 2018 attempting to seat Duncan Fields of Kodiak on the board of fisheries would have then created quite literally a "Kodiak board of fisheries".

The points given in the letter indicate Carlson Van-Dort is the cause of many things, however keep in mind it takes a majority vote for proposals brought before the board to pass, generally speaking a 4 person majority passes proposals within the boards of fish and game.

On multiple occasions, the Alaska Department of Law reviewed Marit Carlson-Van Dort's ethics disclosures and determined that she was fully compliant with the Executive Branch Ethics Act and did not have an impermissible conflict of interest with any of the regulatory proposals that she participated in reviewing and adopting during her time on the Board.

I am 66 years old and I have been involved in commercial fisheries as a boat owner, permit holder, and skipper in the salmon set net, gill net, and seine fisheries. I have also operated my own vessels as a permit holder in the Prince William Sound, Cook Inlet, Alaska Peninsula, and Togiak herring seine fisheries. I have also skippered my own vessels for halibut, crab, and ground fish longlining, pot fishing, dragging, and tendering. I have fished in the areas of Southeast Alaska, Gulf of Alaska, Prince William Sound, Lower Cook Inlet, Kodiak, Chignik, Alaska Peninsula, Port Moller, the and Bering Sea starting in 1976. I have owned my own air taxi and sport fishing business and I am currently a subsistence fisherman where I live at Chignik Lagoon.

I met Märit 36 years ago when she was visiting her grandparents in Chignik Bay. Her grandfather Axel Carlson named his seine vessel the "Miss Mart". Axel was a true gentleman fisherman whose lineage as an Alaska native goes back thousands of years in the Chignik region. Mart was indoctrinated to the native subsistence life in Chignik in the summer month's commercial fishing with her Grandfather, and earning money to attend college and study biology and fisheries. Mart spent the rest of the year growing up in Juneau. At a young age she wanted to be a leader in policy making and she has been building capacity in this area for decades to the point that she is the president of Farwest Native Corp., which is the village of Chignik Bay's native corporation. The job of the Board of Fisheries is to use the best available science to ensure sustainability for future generations to have access to the fish resources of the state.

Despite touting herself as a representative for the commercial sector based on her experience seining in Chignik, Ms. Van-Dort has repeatedly voted against commercial fisherman and in doing so has unbalanced the board to favor sport fish users.

To the members of the Alaska joint legislature,

I am writing to express my adamant opposition to the nominations of Marit Carlson-Van Dort and John Wood to the Alaska Board of Fisheries (BOF). The current member composition of the board lacks the diversity of viewpoints and interests of Alaska's many fisheries user groups, while crusading to impose their own personal interests through the board process. The governor has clearly abdicated his responsibility to nominate qualified and dedicated members to the board. This was made clear at the 2020 Kodiak BOF meeting, where these two members rejected and dismissed the public testimony of our community and arrived in Kodiak with the predetermined intention of reshaping our fisheries in a manner set to benefit their own interests. They have made a charade of community engagement and treated public testimony as little more than a formality that they needed to endure before issuing their predetermined judgments.

Mr. Wood joined the board amidst much skepticism concerning his complete lack of qualifications for the position and has done little to build confidence that he belongs on the board. His deliberations in Kodiak proved that he arrived in our community not as juror or judge to objectively adjudicate interregional disputes, but instead as prosecutor who simply built a case against us without ever considering converse points of view. He showed no interest in any issues that didn't relate to upper Cook Inlet fisheries and made no attempts to learn the intricacies and nuances of our fisheries.

Mrs. Carlson-Van Dort's conduct is particularly concerning in that she neglected to acknowledge her conflicts of interests relating to her home community of Chignik and her engagement and advancement of proposals that arbitrarily limited Kodiak's longstanding fishery in order to re-direct resources to her community. It may be arguable whether her conduct violated the Executive Branch Ethics Act, but it is undeniable that she acted in a way that any reasonable member of the public could claim she was focused on her personal interests over her civic duties.

The conduct of these two members resulted in the complete erosion of trust within the community of Kodiak and will be many years before our confidence is restored and our user groups will consider it worthwhile to even engage in the board process.

I ask that legislators reject both nominations and send a clear message to the governor that is unacceptable to use his power of appointments to the Board of Fisheries simply to advance the interests of handful of individuals. Before voting to confirm Mr. Wood and Mrs. Carlson-Van Dort, each legislator should ask whether they would consider it acceptable to have their home communities treated as second-class citizens in front of the BOF and whether they believe it is important that the public have confidence that executive appointees act in the interests of the State of Alaska as a whole.
